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Role of the Policy Academy Team in Ending Homelessness

The State of Rhode Island, Housing Resources Commission is responsible for policy, planning and coordinating the agencies and subdivisions of the state in order to provide housing opportunities for all Rhode Islanders. The Commission's Office of Homelessness and Emergency Assistance is responsible for coordinating the homeless system toward the goal of ending homelessness. As such, it serves as the Policy Academy Team work group to implement Rhode Island's Plan to End Homelessness for the State's Interagency Council. Members represent every segment of the public and private sectors that have involvement or concern with homelessness in Rhode Island. The State of Rhode Island, having attended the Policy Academy on Chronic Homelessness in 2003 and on Family Homelessness in 2005 has determined that a single integrated plan would best serve the needs of the state. Local efforts, the State's Continuum of Care, the United Way Housing Subcommittee, Housing Works, a broad based advocacy coalition, and the Governor's Steering Committee on Re-entry are all linked to the plan. The Office of Homelessness and Emergency Assistance is located in the State of Rhode Island, Division of Planning so is also integrated with the state's housing, land use, and transportation plans, as well as the Community Development Block Grant Program.

The state's largest homeless agency that provides housing, services, treatment and employment.

Homeless This is defined as having no permanent place of residence.

Housing Works A broad based advocacy coalition that promotes affordable housing.

HRC The Rhode Island Housing Resources Commission, an agency, established by legislation, within the State Office of Housing and Community Development.

Implementer(s) The persons or agencies responsible for carrying out the action.

LEA Local Education Authority, the school system of a city or town.

Manager(s) The person(s) who are responsible for seeing that the action can be carried out through authority or provision of resources.

OHCD The Office of Housing and Community Development, a housing policy and planning office within the State of Rhode Island, Dept. of Administration, Division of Planning

created to coordinate housing policy, planning and activities within state government.

OHSEA The Office of Homelessness and Emergency Assistance is responsible for homeless policies and resources.

One Stop "netWORKri" employment centers offer a variety of services to locate employment including services targeted to those with disabilities at a "one-stop" location.

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People to End

Homelessness A group of homeless and formerly homeless persons who advocate for housing and services for those who are homeless.

PHA Public Housing Authority, the local administrator of federal housing programs.

RICH Rhode Island Coalition for the Homeless, a group that provides advocacy and selected direct services to member agencies and those who are homeless.

RIDE State of Rhode Island, Department of Education.

RIDOC State of Rhode Island, Department of Corrections.

RIH The state's housing and mortgage finance agency that administers a number of federal programs including the McKinney Vento Homeless Assistance Grant Continuum of

Care.

SHAC The Statewide Housing Action Coalition, a coalition of community housing advocates.
