Where?: Meet in the parking lot of the picnic area at Coldwater Lake. Follow State Route 504 43-miles east of Interstate 5 to the turn off to Johnston Ridge. Two miles past the turn off, turn left to Coldwater Lake and then bear right to the picnic area. See Mount St. Helens Recreation Map

Who?: Students, community groups, businesses, and volcano enthusiasts of all ages are needed to come out and join in the fun! Lunch will be provided by the National Forest Foundation and sponsors. Please bring water bottle(s), work gloves and wear sturdy hiking or work boots. Please come dressed for mountain conditions that range from hot& dry to cool & moist.
