INTRODUCTION

Materials in the Dwight D. Eisenhower Library relating to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization constitute a largely untapped resource. This special guide to the Library's holdings has been prepared to assist potential researchers in identifying pertinent primary source materials concerning this subject area. Separate listings of the Eisenhower Library's oral history transcripts and audiovisual holdings pertaining to NATO are also included.

The guide should not be considered definitive, as the search for materials was conducted primarily at the level of folder titles rather than documents. Many of the collections cited undoubtedly have additional NATO-related materials in folders pertaining to such foreign policy topics as the Geneva Conference and the Suez Crisis. Still other collections which probably contain readily identifiable NATO materials have not been included because of either the low level of information or the small quantity of documentation on NATO.

Until very recently, a great deal of the relevant documentation on the role of General Eisenhower as NATO Commander remained security classified. In June of this year, however, approximately twenty-five hundred pages of documents were declassified and opened for research in Eisenhower's Pre-Presidential Papers. Several of the collections in this guide, notably those pertaining to Eisenhower's presidential years, still contain large quantities of security classified materials. Requests for declassification of individual documents by the originating agencies can be placed at the Library through the mandatory declassification review process.

A complete list of Library holdings is available upon request. Copies of finding aids for individual collections are available through interlibrary loan.

Persons who wish to use materials in the Dwight D. Eisenhower Library are required to complete and submit an application form, stating the scope and purpose of their research. Advance application to the Director facilitates the processing of the request and allows staff archivists time to prepare materials for the research visit.

3. DULLES, JOHN FOSTER, Secretary of State, 1953-59: Papers, 1951-59. 29 ft. (NATO: 2 ft.)

John Foster Dulles was Secretary of State from 1953 to 1959. This important collection of his papers contains much high level correspondence. Approximately four thousand pages of letters, memoranda, summaries of telephone calls, memoranda of conversation, reports, speech and letter drafts, and schedules comprise the NATO-related materials in this collection. Subjects documented include the Status of Forces Treaty, NATO anniversary, EDC, military planning, nuclear strategy, NATO ministerial meetings, American foreign relations with NATO countries, and NATO relations with various member and non-member nations.

Dwight D. Eisenhower kept diaries during most of his adult life. This collection contains diary entries which span the period while he served as NATO commander. Topics covered include accounts of NATO meetings and discussions on the purpose of NATO.

5. EISENHOWER, DWIGHT D.: Papers, Pre-Presidential, 1916-52. 138 ft. (NATO: 2 ft.)

In December 1950, Dwight D. Eisenhower assumed command of the armed forces of the newly formed North Atlantic Treaty Organization. During the year and a half that he

served as SHAPE commander, General Eisenhower organized a unified command over European forces. This collection of his pre-presidential papers contains approximately three thousand pages of letters, telegrams, messages, cables, memoranda of conversations, transcripts, reports, memoranda, briefing papers, and trip reports. Subjects discussed include the selection of SHAPE headquarters, NATO structure and organization, allocation of military supplies, Eisenhower's evaluation of member nations, and training of NATO troops. Of particular interest are letters between General Eisenhower and Averell Harriman, Special Assistant to the President for Foreign Affairs during the Truman Administration.

6. EISENHOWER, DWIGHT D.: Papers as President of the United States, 1953-61 (Ann Whitman File). 122 ft. (NATO: 1 ft.)

Dwight D. Eisenhower was President of the United States from 1953 to 1961. This key collection of his papers includes high level correspondence on virtually every major foreign policy topic. Approximately two thousand letters, memoranda, diary entries, phone call summaries, memoranda of conversations, reports, summaries of discussions, briefing books, letter and speech drafts, telegrams, personnel rosters, no tes, and news clippings make up the NATO-related materials in this collection. Some of the major subjects documented include NATO military strategy, U.S. military assistance, Charles De Gaulle and his role in NATO, Status of Forces Treaty, NATO meetings, Soviet perceptions of NATO, NATO organization, and atomic stockpiles.

7. EISENHOWER, DWIGHT D.: Papers, Post-Presidential, 1961-69. 935 ft. (NATO: 50 pages)

Dwight D. Eisenhower's Post-Presidential Papers are largely unprocessed and unavailable for research at this time. However, a few folders have been reviewed and are available to researchers. Of the reviewed materials, there are approximately fifty pages of NATO-related documents. Consisting of memoranda of conversations, memoranda for the record, and letters, this collection contains material on Charles De Gaulle and his role in NATO, U.S. involvement in NATO, and the decision to move NATO headquarters from France.

Dwight D. Eisenhower's Records as President, or the White House Central Files, are made of several segments, including the Confidential File, the Official File, the General File, the President's Personal File, the Pre-Inaugural File, and the Alphabetical File. The first three segments, the Confidential File, the Official File, and the General File, contain approximately six thousand pages of materials relating to NATO. These documents include letters, memoranda, reports, telegrams, press releases, route slips, news clippings, cross reference sheets, referral sheets, notes, drafts, and lists. Some of the topics which receive the most substantial coverage are U.S. aid to NATO countries, the Status of Forces Treaty, the NATO ministerial meeting, North Atlantic Council, and the NATO Defense College.

The major topics documented by these materials are the 1957 NATO Conference in Paris, the President's statements on NATO, and accreditation of press representatives.

12. JACKSON, C. D.: Executive at Time Incorporated, 1931-64; Special Assistant to the President for International Affairs, 1953-54; Speechwriter and Consultant to the President, 1958: Papers, 1931-67. 36 ft. (NATO: .2 ft.)

C. D. Jackson was an executive with Time Incorporated from 1931 to 1964. During World War II, he served as deputy chief of the Psychological Warfare Division, Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force. After the war, President Eisenhower often used C.D. Jackson as a consultant. As Special Assistant to the President for International Affairs, Jackson was concerned with furnishing ideas to the President, the Secretary of State, and other policy makers on scoring propaganda points against the Soviet bloc. His papers contain approximately four hundred pages of materials relating to NATO. These items consist of letters, memoranda, notes, itineraries, diary entries and printed material. The American Council of NATO, the future of NATO as an organization, and disarmament are some of the topics documented in this collection.

AUDIOVISUAL COLLECTION

The audiovisual collection of the Eisenhower Library has a large number of photographs illustrating both General Eisenhower's career as NATO commander and his association with the treaty organization during his presidency. Official duties such as troop inspections and meetings with NATO leaders, portraits, and social events make up the majority of SHAPE period photographs. For the presidential years, there are photos of the President's meetings with other NATO leaders and NATO meetings. Although the Library has a small number of color photographs on NATO, the great majority are black-and-white.

In addition to still photographs, the audiovisual collection also has approximately two dozen motion picture films dealing with NATO. These include television documentaries, newsreel films, and television interviews showing General Eisenhower assuming command of SHAPE, discussing his role as NATO's chief military officer, and meeting with the leaders of NATO countries.
