

OEF/OIF Program

It is our duty and privilege to provide veterans with the best care available. The VA has set up a program designed to meet the needs of veterans returning from Operation Enduring Freedom (OEF) and Operation Iraqi Freedom (OIF). Many of our veterans have suffered illness and injury related to the Global War on Terrorism. Our goal is to make sure these veterans receive the highest quality of care in a timely manner. Your VA Heartland Network will continue to look at the needs of OEF/OIF veterans and provide services to meet those needs. Please let us know how we can improve our service to you, the deserving veteran.

Available Health Care Services:

- ★ Hospital, outpatient medical, nursing home and community-based residential care
- ★ Dental, pharmacy and prosthetic services
- ★ Mental health services
- ★ Sexual trauma counseling
- ★ Specialized health care for women veterans
- ★ Outreach programs for homeless veterans
- ★ Readjustment counseling
- ★ Alcohol and drug dependency treatment



As of January 2008, approximately 800,000 service members of Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom have separated from active military duty.

Of the nearly 300,000 OEF and OIF veterans receiving VA health care, 51% have been members of the Reserve or National Guard.

The most common health problems of these veterans have been musculoskeletal ailments, mental health problems and nervous system/sense organs diseases.





The primary factor in determining basic eligibility for VA benefits is "veteran status."

- ★ Active duty in the Armed Forces with a discharge or release from active service under conditions other than dishonorable conditions establishes veteran status.
- ★ Reservist or National Guard members can establish eligibility for VA health care benefits only if the President activated them for federal duty.
- ★ Reservists that are never called to active duty may qualify for some benefits through the Veterans Benefits Administration (VBA).

Online Enrollment

To receive health care benefits, all veterans must enroll. You may enroll online at www.va.gov. Click on the "Health" icon. Then click "Returning Service Members," then locate "To apply for health benefits online." This will open the electronic application for health care benefits (Form 10-10EZ). You may pick up this application form at any VA Medical Center or clinic.
