The Fairfield Ranger District is proposing to manage dispersed recreation use, located throughout the area known as Kelly Creek Flats. The area is a very popular site for dispersed camping and OHV riding. The amount of use has resulted in the creation of multiple routes by full size and Off Highway vehicles, soil compaction and vegetation loss in riparian zones and social conflicts with various users. The goal is to manage dispersed recreational use so it can be sustained at this popular site without unacceptable impacts to public health, vegetation, soil, water quality, fish and wildlife habitat, and the overall recreation experience of users. Management options proposed include: designation of dispersed sites, 2 CXT toilet installations, the development of a group use reservable site on the NW side of the intersection of the South Fork of the Boise River and the Baumgartner Bridge. The entire project area is described as portions of sections 7 and 18, T3N, R13 and portions of sections 12, 13 & 14, T3N, R 12E. A separate decision will be made by September, 2006.
