PROPOSED 5-YEAR PROGRAM OF WORK

Background

The Cibola National Forest and Grasslands is proposing future management of developed recreation sites through a process called "Recreation Facility Analysis (RFA)." This is part of a national initiative conducted by all national forests to improve management of their developed recreation sites.

We want to provide healthy, safe, and well-maintained recreation opportunities for local communities and visitors to our area. Through the RFA process, the overall goals of our recreation site program are to:

- Focus management resources on the most appropriate recreation opportunities to respond to changing public desires and demands appropriate to the natural setting that we manage.
- Maintain or enhance visitor satisfaction with the sites and services provided.
- Meet health and safety standards at all developed recreation sites.
- Be financially sustainable.
- Be environmentally sound.
- Maintain community sustainability.

Many of our facilities were built 30-50 years ago and are in need of major maintenance or reconstruction. A few facilities receive little use, and no longer serve the demand that existed in years past. The fundamental premise of the program of work is to provide developed recreation which is sustainable and flexible enough to be annually adapted to any changes in demand, available resources, and opportunities.

The RFA process involved several steps: gathering inventory and financial data; identifying the forest recreation niche; evaluating each developed recreation site against established national criteria and ranking the recreation sites according to those criteria. Using this analysis, as well as professional judgment and assessment of our ability to meet current and future demand, the Forest has documented a proposed 5-Year Program of Work. We welcome your comments and suggestions on this proposal.

What's Happening on the Cibola National Forest and Grasslands?

A Forest's recreation niche defines the best-suited recreation experiences or benefits that the forest can provide. The niche is defined from those components that make a forest special, and fosters quality recreation versus quantity, or trying to be all things to all people. It provides a good description of the uniquely specific recreation opportunities provided by the Forest and Grasslands within the context of the forest's ecological features, opportunities provided by others in the area, and the demands and desires of recreation visitors to the area now and into the future. The Cibola National Forest and Grasslands niche is:

Taking the Memories Home - Traditions, Cultures, Landscapes

From sunrise over the vast grasslands on the Southern Great Plains to sunset behind the Zuni Mountains on the Continental Divide the Cibola NF and NGs offer an array of settings and amazing night skies. Diverse biomes including grasslands, desert, forests, and mountains create a rich landscape for wildlife, scenery and people. Ancient and modern routes have connected people spiritually and physically to this timeless landscape for generations and now reach out to an increasingly urban population through hiking, gathering, enjoying scenery, and watching & hunting wildlife. The land maintains its cultural and natural integrity even in the face of intense urban growth from metro Albuquerque and cities in Oklahoma and Texas.

This niche provides an umbrella context for all recreation programs on the Forest and Grasslands and helps us match up what is most wanted with what we can best provide, to create the most value for the public within our available resources.

Through this Recreation Facility Analysis, we are proposing a 5-year program of work to bring the Cibola's recreation infrastructure into alignment with the forest recreation niche and the resources available to operate and maintain these sites to Forest Service standards.

This proposed program of work is also important to address the backlog of needed maintenance at facilities that has been increasing over the years. Reducing this backlog is important for addressing health and safety concerns, and concerns related to the loss of visitor satisfaction. This backlog is referred to as "deferred maintenance." Less than one-quarter of all Forest Service developed recreation sites nationwide are now being operated to meet all quality standards, and the Cibola National Forest and Grasslands has similar challenges. The amount of work needed in sites nationally has reached \$346 million. On the Cibola National Forest and Grasslands, the backlog of deferred maintenance is over \$2 million.

More about the Recreation Facility Analysis:

The Forest and Grasslands completed an evaluation of each developed recreation site using established national criteria, ranking our recreation sites according to those criteria, and making a recommendation for a Proposed 5-Year Program of Work using this information as well as professional judgment, and ability to meet current and future demand. The criteria include:

- Conformance to the forest niche and amount of recreation use
- Financial efficiency
- Environmental and community sustainability.

We also considered if sites were under some type of operational or contractual agreement whose terms are longer than the 5-year period of the RFA (i.e. a partnership agreement with another federal agency or county).

The Cibola National Forest and Grasslands evaluated a total of 137 developed recreation sites. The following table summarizes the number of recreation sites evaluated by "site type."

These particular results focus specifically on financial sustainability, reduced deferred maintenance, and meeting health and safety standards at all developed recreation sites.

¹Appropriated funds available are reflected using FY 2006 as the baseline funding year, with the assumption for this analysis that developed recreation funding will remain flat (subject to forest and regional priorities).

²Other Funds Available include funding from partnerships, grants, and other funding made available that are not appropriated funds or fee receipts.

³The baseline condition represents funding levels available during fiscal year 2007 to manage and maintain developed recreation facilities.

⁴ The program of work changed condition represents funding levels anticipated funding levels needed to manage the recreation facilities to meet prescribed standards within five years if this plan is implemented.

We will also continue to monitor visitor satisfaction with the sites and services provided and consider how our developed recreation program contributes to local community stability. Some of the proposed actions will require full National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) analysis, assuring environmental sound decisions.

How quickly the Forest implements the plan will depend upon available funding and resources, as well as the public's interest, and in many cases, involvement and partnership to enhance our recreation program. Summary of the Proposed Management Actions

There are three categories of management actions being considered for the Cibola National Forest and Grasslands. The first are administrative actions. The types of administrative actions include reducing the length of season that a recreation site is open, reducing the number of services, and performing needed maintenance. These actions do not require additional public involvement to implement.

The second category being considered is the increase or initiation of recreation use fees under the Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act (REA). Before establishing a new recreation fee or increasing an existing fee there will be additional opportunities for public feedback. Policy directs that there will be a notice published in the Federal Register six months in advance and in local newspapers and publications located near the site at which the recreation fee would be established or changed. This notice will include the fee proposals and outline the public involvement process.

The third category includes sites where construction, reconstruction or demolition is being proposed. These types of projects will require further analysis and public involvement prior to making a decision to proceed in compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.
