Visitation is on the rise at Colville National Forest as spring enthusiasts venture out to enjoy the first warm days of the year. Soils are saturated, making resources especially susceptible to damage at this time. Your careful actions can minimize impacts and create a more enjoyable experience for everyone.

Avoid driving on wet and muddy roads. Both on and off-road vehicles can cause wheel ruts, erosion, potholes, and mud bogs if they are driven on roads that are too wet. In particular, mud running causes unreasonable damage to roads, meadows, prime camping sites and valuable grazing areas. Any activity that causes such harm is never appropriate. Please report any damage that you see so that the area can be repaired and reseeded as quickly as possible.

The 2007 Interim Motor Vehicle Use Maps, which depict the existing system of roads and trails, are still in effect until the 2008 map is published later this year. These maps are available at any of these Colville National Forest offices:
