Upper Oso to Little Pine Loop (15 mile loop)

Santa Barbara Ranger District Los Padres National Forest



Directions to trailhead: Highway 154 to Paradise Road, and then travel 5.7 miles on Paradise Road to the first crossing of the Santa Ynez River. Just after crossing the river, and before crossing the bridge, turn left onto the road that goes to Upper Oso Campground. At Upper Oso Campground, take the road around the lower loop of the campground until it comes to a parking area adjacent a locked gate. The Camuesa Connector Trail Loop begins here.

Description of trail: The Little Pine Loop contains 10.3 miles of dirt roads and 4.5 miles of single-track trail. There is over a 3000 foot elevation gain from Upper Oso Camp-ground to the top of Little Pine Mountain and Happy Hollow Campground. Most mountain bike riders take the Camuesa and Buckhorn road to the top of the mountain, and the steep Santa Cruz trail back down. Motorcycles and ATVs are allowed to use the dirt roads but not the single track trail.

The Little Pine Loop:

Section 1.

Camuesa Road (3.8 miles/dirt): Start at the locked gate and hike to the intersection of the Camuesa and Buckhorn roads. One-half mile from the locked gate, you will reach the single-track Santa Cruz Trail on the left hand side of the road. The Camuesa Road then begins to gain elevation on its many switchbacks. Continue past Hidden Potrero Campground to the intersection of the Camuesa and Buckhorn Roads where you will see a large wooden trail sign. Turn left onto the Buckhorn Road.

Section 2.

Buckhorn Road (5 miles/dirt): Take the Buckhorn Road for 5 miles and then turn left onto Little Pine Road. There is a big cement water tank on the left just before this junction.

Section 3.

Little Pine Road (1.5 miles/dirt): Take Little Pine Road for 1.5 miles heading toward the top of Little Pine Mountain and Happy Hollow Campground.

Section 4.

Little Pine Connector Trail (.5 miles/dirt): The Santa Cruz Trail can be reached via a half-mile connector trail which is on the right side, just before Happy Hollow Campground.

Section 5.

Santa Cruz Trail (4 miles/dirt): Turn left at the connector trail/Santa Cruz Trail junction. Take the Santa Cruz Trail downhill past Nineteen Oaks Campground, that is ¼ mile off of the trail and approximately 1.5 miles from the Camuesa Road. This section of trail is very steep and narrow.

Section 6.

Camuesa Road (.6 miles/dirt): Turn right onto the Camuesa Road and travel .6 miles back to the Upper Oso Parking Lot.

Fees: The Forest Adventure Pass is needed for day use recreation in the Santa Ynez Recreation Area. This area is all managed by Rocky Mountain Recreation Company. A separate fee is charged for camping in the area. 
