Calls for the largest tax increase in history, raising marginal rates, cutting child credit in half, re-imposing marriage penalty. Failed to patch AMT until 19 December 2007, delaying 13.5 million taxpayers' ability to file returns.
Wasteful Spending		Proposes to reduce or terminate 151 programs, for savings of more than \$18 billion.		Fiscal year 2008 appropriations contain more than 11,000 earmarks, costing more than \$16 billion.
Entitlement Reform		Moves toward fulfilling missions of major entitlement programs by moderating spending growth and reducing unfunded obligations by almost one-third.		Failed to adopt any entitlement reform, allowing unsustainable spending rate to continue, and proposed various increases that would worsen the problem.
Discretionary Spending	0	Holds 2009 nonsecurity spending growth under 1 percent, below the inflation rate.		Attempted to add \$22 billion (\$204 billion over 5 years) to President's request.
Defense	0	Provides increase of 7.5 percent for DOD budget.	0	Cut DOD budget by \$3.5 billion.
