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VA DATA AND INFORMATION SYSTEMS:

- 1. Copayments for VA Outpatient Medical Care and Extended Care Services Provided to Veterans Researchers investigating out-of-pocket expenses for veterans may be interested in two recent Veterans Health Administration (VHA) directives:
- (a) VHA Directive 2008-066: Copayment for Outpatient Medical Care Provided to Veterans by the Department of Veterans Affairs (September 30, 2008) includes a table of Decision Support System (DSS) identifiers or stop codes and their corresponding copayment classification, including special health services not subject to copayments. (b) The November 5, 2008, VHA Directive 2008-076: Copayment for Extended Care Services Provided to Veterans by Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) defines VA policy for charging copayments for extended care services. Long-term care copayment tests must be completed on all veterans in receipt of extended care services. Non-exempt veterans are obligated to pay a monthly extended care copayment based on available resources. 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2. Palliative Care Consult Teams

Researchers investigating issues in end-of life care may be interested in *VHA Directive 2008-066:*Palliative Care Consult Teams (October 23, 2008), which establishes Palliative Care Consult Teams (PCCT), the role of PCCTs at each VHA facility, and the coordination of these teams at the VISN level. Professionals from medicine, nursing, social work, mental health, chaplaincy, and other services comprise the interdisciplinary Palliative Care Consult Teams. The responsibilities of these teams include promoting and disseminating educational expertise to staff members providing end of life care, and ensuring that

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3. National PBM Drug Safety Alert Distribution

The VHA has issued two directives outlining drug safety alert policies:

- (a) VHA Directive 2008-078: National PBM Drug Safety Alert Distribution (November17, 2008) establishes a consistent means of disseminating drug-related safety information from the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and other sources to providers and, when appropriate, to patients. According to this policy, the role of the Pharmacy Benefits Management (PBM) Services Office is to develop and disseminate drug-related communications from the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and other credible sources to providers and, as needed, to patients. - (b) Directive 2008-072: Research Personnel Notification of Pharmacy Benefits Management Drug Safety Alert and Adverse Drug Events Related to Interventional Human Subject Research Studies (October 30, 2008) establishes policy and procedures for promptly notifying Research and Development Services of all VA Pharmacy Benefits Management (PBM) Services alerts. These prompt alerts will allow for the highest level of protection for human research subjects and the timely inclusion of patient or research subjects' information into the VA Adverse Drug Event Reporting System (VA ADERS) and the FDA Medwatch System.
