The **Baltimore** VAMC displayed 40 posters during research week. Clinical displays focused on obesity, the MIRECC, and employee wellness. Ten medical equipment vendors exhibited equipment and supplied lunch. The keynote address, given by Kris Ann Oursler, MD, was titled "Healthy Aging and HIV: Challenges for the Treatment Era."

Congressman Arthur Davis (right) received an appreciation award from the director of the **Birmingham** VAMC, YC Parris, for his support of VA research. Research week was further commemorated with poster displays, speakers, and a kickoff campaign for the Health Services Research plenary session.



The **Bronx** VAMC reported a successful research day thanks to the efforts of their research staff and speakers. The large audience included representatives from the Congressional offices of Nina Lowey and Jose Serrano; veterans; VA employees; and Lehman College students. A tour of the research building followed lectures and presentations by researchers.

Research posters were a hit at the **Cincinnati** VAMC Research fair, as was a tour of the General Clinical Research Center. There were nearly 280 attendees, including representation from Congressman Steve Chabot's office.



An open house was held at the **Buffalo** VAMC, including a display of research posters, a tour of the Veterinary Medicine Unit, and participation in the Center's "Service Line Spring Fling."

A poster session was held at the **Clarksburg** (WV.) VAMC featuring a keynote address titled "The New Strategic Research Plan." A one-hour education credit was given to those in attendance.

The Cleveland VAMC hosted lunchtime lectures on March 28 and March 31, focusing on research advances in diabetes and vision.



Posters highlighting current research projects were displayed in the Dallas VAMC hospital atrium, and the research group with the "best poster" received a gift certificate. A reception was also held recognizing Research Service employees.

A research symposium was held at the Detroit VAMC. The annual event featured poster presentations, discussions, refreshments and day-planner mementos.



Congressman Gene Green presented opening remarks at the Houston VAMC. Posters, displays, and information booths were set up in the hospital lobby. An educational seminar titled "Writing Budgets for Clinical Trials" was well-attended by researchers and staff.



Nearly 150 people attended the events at the **Gainesville** VAMC, including staff, patients, and VSO representatives. Activities centered on speakers, poster presentations, and refreshments.

Guest speakers at the Phoenix VAMC included scientists as well as research study participants. Poster presentations, lab tours, and refreshments were part of the events.

White River Junction celebrated with an Open House, where more than 40 posters were presented and a light lunch was served to some 70 attendees.

Researchers at the San Juan VA sponsored a breakfast and lecture series for patients and research participants on sexual dysfunction and general nutrition. Participants completed surveys regarding their overall program satisfaction.


