1. Human Subject Protection and Financial Conflicts of Interest.

A conference was held August 15-16, 2000 at the National Institutes for Health (NIH) in Bethesda, MD in order to: (1) implement one of the Secretary's five initiatives to strengthen human subject protection in clinical research; (2) remind participants of current PHS/FDA regulations, guidelines and guidance through documents and presentations; (3) present examples of how the issue of financial conflict of interest is dealt with at the level of institutions, IRBs, and clinical investigators; (4) receive public comments on questions posed in the *Federal Register* announcing the conference; (5) receive public comments on the NIH guidance on Financial Conflicts of Interest; and (6) provide information for the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to develop more useful and detailed guidance to implement current regulatory requirements. 2. Health Information Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA)

The implementation of these rules must occur within 2 years and 60 days, except for certain healthcare plans that have an additional year for implementation. 3. Rural Health Research Agenda

The National Rural Health Association, the federal Office of Rural Health, the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality, the Department of Veterans Affairs, and the U.S. Center for Mental Health Services met for a two-day conference August 13-15 to discuss the direction of a national research agenda and national policy formation for rural health issues. Specific topics in the breakout sessions were: Medicare Financing, Medicaid Financing, Quality of Care in Rural Areas, Rural Public Health, Hospital and Community Systems, Health Professionals, Access to Services, Behavioral Health and Long-term care. This resource reports on national trends in health statistics on topics including birth and death rates, infant mortality, and life expectancy, to mention a few. 5. News From the Office of Information

A “One-VA Smart Card” for the veteran that will be used by VHA, VBA, and NCA is being planned at the direction of Acting Secretary Gober. The current plan targets Proof of Concept Demonstration (August 31, 2000), Initial One-VISN Implementation (January 2001), and National Rollout (January 2002). Functionality will include express registration and availability of eligibility and emergency medical information. The One VA smart card will be a portable card that will contain administrative and clinical data on the veteran. It will allow administrative and clinical personnel, with appropriate security clearance, access to the veteran's electronic files regardless of geographic location. One VA card will enable the veteran access to information through a web-enabled system to make and/or change clinic appointments, as well as change specific administrative information, at medical centers, regional offices, community based clinics and other kiosk locations. 6. New Veteran Population Figures To Be Released

At a breakout session during the Information Technology Conference (ITC'00) in Austin, TX on August 8, 2000, Dr. Stephen Meskin, VA's Chief Actuary, announced that new veteran population estimates and projections would be available by September 30, 2000.
