Tuition Cost: \$6,000 (plus international travel) Application Deadline: October 17, 2008 The International Field Course on Wildlands and Protected Area Management, cohosted by the Center for Protected Area Management and Training at Colorado State University and US Forest Service International Programs, *held entirely in Spanish*, presents key concepts, principles, and methods of protected area management while emphasizing field-based practical exercises. Participants will interact extensively with local resource users, various local, state, and federal agencies, collaborating private conservation organizations, and other citizen groups involved in natural resource management. This interaction will provide participants hands-on experience with solving complex biodiversity conservation, natural resource use and management problems, as well as in interacting with the many types of stakeholders involved in real world situations.

The International Seminar on Protected Area Management is held in the northern Rocky Mountains of the western United States. Designed for senior level planners and managers of nationally significant protected areas worldwide, this integrated state-of-the-art course examines strategies to conserve the world's most special places. The program, sponsored by the US Forest Service International Programs and the Universities of Montana, Idaho and Colorado State, will evaluate policies and institutional arrangements that sustain both people and natural resources.

The International Seminar on Forest Administration and Management, cohosted by US Forest Service International Programs and Northern Arizona University, presents a broad spectrum of natural resource management techniques and institutional arrangements so that participants may selectively gather ideas for improving management. The seminar focuses on strategies and methods to develop, manage, and conserve natural resources for the sustained delivery of goods and services to meet the full range of human needs.

The Latin America Seminar on Forest Administration and Management is a two-week course held in Bolivia targeting senior natural resource professionals from Latin America. The seminar, an intensive two week program, will promote the transfer of knowledge and examine a range of tools, incentives, approaches, lessons, and techniques to improve the management of forest resources in their respective countries. Participants and instructors will discuss and debate integrated issues such as legal and policy foundations, public participation, scientific knowledge, economic growth, and social sustainability. The seminar will be conducted in Spanish and focus on topics of particular relevance to the region.

Hosted by US Forest Service International Programs and the International Centre for Protected Landscapes in Wales, **The African Leadership Seminar on People and Conservation** is an intensive one week program held in southern Africa. The seminar seeks to facilitate shared learning around the pressing issues of people and conservation for natural resource managers and policy makers in the region. The seminar will promote the transfer of knowledge and examine a range of tools, incentives, approaches, and techniques. These lessons learned will help inform and influence conservation management, research and policy reform. Issues that are addressed include: conservation challenges; HIV and AIDS: community based conservation and collaboration, social aspects of conservation, transfrontier conservation, financial incentives, education, research, the conservation agenda; and leadership and conservation. The University of KwaZulu-Natal 's Centre for Environment, Agriculture and Development implements this seminar which is conducted in English.
