## REHABILITATION RESEARCH DAY A SUCCESS

On May 2, 2005, the Department of Veterans Affairs, the University of Florida and the Brooks Center for Rehabilitation Studies presented the second annual Rehabilitation Research Day at the MSB Auditorium on the University of Florida campus. The program ran from 8:30 am through noon. Douglas Barrett, MD, UF Vice-President for Health Affairs began the conference with his introductory remarks.



The new Director of the Institute on Aging, Marco Pahor, MD delivered the opening keynote address. Other speakers included RORC Director Pamela W. Duncan, PhD, Thomas Mulligan, MD from the VA Geriatrics Research, Education and Clinical Center (GRECC) and the Division of Geriatrics, Leslie Gonzalez-Rothi, PhD, Program Director for the VA Brain Rehabilitation Research Center, Ann Horgas, RN, PhD, from the Department of Adult and Elderly Nursing, Kimford Meador MD, Department of Neurology and Clinical Alzheimer Program, Patricia Kricos, PhD, Center for Gerontological Studies and Department of Communications Sciences and Disorders and William Mann, PhD, Rehabilitation Engineering Center for Successful Aging and the National Older Driver Rehabilitation and Training Center.

## FEATURED INVESTIGATOR

**Elizabeth "Lisa" Hannold, PhD**, is a Research Health Scientist at the RORC and serves as a Courtesy Lecturer with the Rehabilitation Counseling Department at the University of Florida's College of Public Health and Health Professions. Dr. Hannold is a qualitative investigator with the RORC's Focus 3 group, where her research has focused on the psychosocial impact of locomotor training (treadmill training with body weight support) on veterans with incomplete spinal cord injury.



Dr. Hannold has an MS degree in Counseling Psychology/Community Counseling from Gannon University (Erie, PA), and earned her PhD in Rehabilitation Sciences from the University of Florida in 2004. Dr. Hannold was a recipient of a 2002-2003 Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Pre-Doctoral Associated Health Rehabilitation Research Fellowship. While a doctoral student, Dr. Hannold received a 2001 Graduate Student Teaching Award from the University of Florida's Office of Research and Graduate Studies, and the 2003 John Muthard Research Award from the University of Florida's College of Public Health and Health Professions, Department of Rehabilitation Counseling. As a former independent living center program manager, Dr. Hannold has 12 years of experience meeting the peer support, independent living skills, and rehabilitation-to-community transition needs of persons with physical disabilities. Dr. Hannold currently serves as a Member of the Board of Directors for the Center for Independent Living of North Central Florida, and is a member of the Citizen's Disability Advisory Council for the City of Gainesville, Office of Equal Opportunity.

## FEATURED RESEARCH

Effects of Locomotor Training on the Psychosocial Adaptation of Persons with Incomplete Spinal Cord Injury\*\*
Principal Investigator: Elizabeth M. Hannold, PhD

Locomotor Training (LT), or treadmill training with body weight support, is an emerging rehabilitation therapy used to improve walking in persons with central nervous system (CNS) damage. The intervention involves providing manual assistance to a participant while he or she steps with body weight support on a treadmill. Despite the increasing scientific interest in LT, few studies have examined its impact from veterans'/participants' perspectives.

Dr. Hannold's study aim is to explore the effects of LT on the psychosocial adaptation of persons with incomplete spinal cord injury (I-SCI). Specific objectives include: to define and describe 1) participants' experiences of LT, 2) participant-therapist interactions during LT and 3) to explore the impact of these interactions from participants' perspectives. Understanding the experiences and benefits described by LT participants will better prepare clinicians to meet the comprehensive needs of persons undergoing the therapy, and contribute to the development of participant-centered treatment approaches and better outcome measures. The sample included 16 participants (13 males, 3 females) currently or formerly enrolled in an ongoing LT study. All participants completed 45 sessions of LT. Qualitative research methods were used for data collection and analyses. Data were obtained from 42 in-depth, participant interviews and 100+ observations of participant-therapist interactions during LT sessions.

Preliminary data analyses have revealed numerous findings related to participants' LT experiences and to the LT therapeutic process. Prevalent themes include experiences of the changing body, experiences of the cognitive and physical demands, and the role of empowerment in the therapeutic process. Participants identified many benefits of LT, including increased role participation, knowledge of ambulation, social support, hope, confidence and self-esteem. All participants preferred LT in comparison to conventional gait therapies.

## REKER/HUBBARD TO INVESTIGATE WHEELCHAIR USE BY VETERANS WITH STROKE

Dean Reker, RN, PhD and Sandra Hubbard, OT, PhD recently received approval to conduct an RR&D investigator initiated project. The project has several aims: 1) To describe demographics, utilization, and functional gain of veterans who have had a stroke and received ADL and mobility-related devices (wheelchairs, scooters, walkers, canes, crutches, braces, bathing, toileting, dressing, and grooming devices) from the VHA, and 2) To compare the provision of VHA versus CMS ADL and mobility-related devices to veterans over 65 years of age who have had a stroke. To achieve the aims, the NPPD will be joined with the National Patient Care Database (NPCD) to explore variation in utilization by factors such as age, gender, race/ethnicity, and region (VISN). These analyses will be able to identify potential areas of over- or under-utilization. The NPPD will also be joined with the Functional Status Outcomes Database (FSOD) and the Decision Support System (DSS) cost extracts to explore functional and cost outcomes while controlling for case-mix. The purpose of these analyses will be primarily descriptive to guide future analyses rather than establishing definitive relationships. Finally, Medicare data on the cohort of stroke patients greater than 65 years will be joined to obtain a complete picture of ATD provision, costs, and utilization of services by veterans, and to understand how the two-payer system may complement one another, and at the same time identify potential duplication of services and equipment.

Information gained from this study will increase the efficiency of the prescription and provision of prosthetics to veterans with stroke by providing functional benefit in association with cost and provide utilization data for policy makers.
