4	Operations, I'm told that is the right place for it.
5	Commissioner Melendez, is that all?

10	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Be careful of what you

12	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Right. And that
13	was for the month of March.
14	III. ANNOUNCEMENTS
15	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Congress has
16	designated the month of March as National Women's
17	History Month. During this month, we recognize and
18	celebrate the rich and vital contributions of women to
19	the history and culture of the United States. The
20	vision and determination have both strengthened and
21	transformed our country.
22	Our nation is one of great opportunities
23	and today women are seizing those opportunities to
24	shape the future of America in all walks of life. A
25	record number of women are serving the halls of
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Congress. The number of women who owns businesses continue to grow. Women in the Armed Forces are making a vital contribution to our nation's security by serving the cause of freedom and peace around the world. During National Women's History Month, we

7 honor the staff leadership and the hard work of American women. The U.S. Commission on Civil Rights 8 9 calls upon public officials, educators, librarians, all people of the United States to observe this month 10 11 with appropriate programs and activities that 12 highlight and honor the contributions that women have made to our nation. 13

IV. STAFF DIRECTOR'S REPORT

15 VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: And with that, we 16 turn to Staff Director's report. Dr. Lerner, will you 17 please provide the Staff Director's report?

Thank you. 18 DR. LERNER: Let me just 19 discuss briefly the Six Sigma Process. At the most recent business meeting, the Commission heard from 20 21 Booz Allen Hamilton's Ken Thompson and our then staff director just to describe the process by which he 22 23 might improve our performance in both the rechartering process and in streamlining report writing. Here is 24 25 where it stands now. What I'm going to give is a

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progress report.

2 Regional staff has had training in the SAC rechartering process. And it might add to this and I 3 participated in this myself and I discussed with some 4 5 detail how the SACs assisted by their regional offices 6 could help in producing our annual statutory report in 7 a more systematic way than has been hitherto been done by helping us to produce case studies are particular 8 problems, the one qoverned in this case by the 9 statutory report in their particular locale. 10

This information is actually quite useful. 11 12 Just give an example, this current year, to the the SACs in the Western Regional Office 13 report, 14 produced some important and interesting information 15 about religious discrimination and the processes of 16 meeting such religious discrimination in Oregon and 17 Washington.

Now where does the process stand? On the 18 19 SAC rechartering that are on the agenda for today the 20 processes outlined in the Six Sigma Report are not 21 However, in future rechartering, used. we were follow the procedures outlined 22 expecting to and 23 therefore approved.

The report part of the process has not moved forward because, in fact, it was unclear to the

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1 staff exactly what was agreed upon at that 2 particular meeting. So we wanted to wait to qet direction from the Commissioners as to how we should 3 4 proceed and are ready to proceed. 5 Let me just say a couple of other Okay. 6 announcements. As many of you know, we have a brand 7 new phone system and it's working quite well. Pam and her staff deserve a lot of credit for getting this 8 thing operational. I want to add one thing. 9 10 VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Thank you, Pam. Yes. I believe that that's 11 DR. LERNER: 12 gratitude for that. I would just make one comment. When we were having training, the woman 13 who was conducting the training sessions commented that our 14 15 previous phone system was so old that she had never 16 since she started doing training in 1993 had seen a 17 system so old. So she was totally unfamiliar with it. So this is a change long overdue and I thank you, Pam, 18 19 and your staff for making it work. One other comment is we have two interns 20 21 working on the statutory report. Neither is present because Friday is not a day they report here. 22 One is 23 Kelsey Barton who is a junior and Political Science major and Afro American Studies major at Howard and 24

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the other is Andrew (A.J.) Schiera who is a junior and

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1	Political Science major at the University of
2	Pennsylvania. The staff has found them very helpful
3	indeed.
4	That's the end of my report.
5	II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES (Cont'd.)
6	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Okay. So we now
7	return to the question of approval of the January 11,
8	2008 minutes. Michael, yes. Michael.
9	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Is the Chair
10	recognizing Commissioner Yaki?
11	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes, I am
12	recognizing Commissioner Yaki.
13	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Thank you, Madam
14	Chair.
15	A question about the Lean Six Sigma
16	Process that goes through issues brought up the former
17	staff director. In his report on Lean Six Sigma, he
18	noted that there would be required, probably be
19	required, changes to our administrative instructions
20	with regard to how we handle briefing reports if we
21	were to adopt Lean Six Sigma for national and briefing
22	reports.
23	How is that being accommodated and when
24	will those changes be brought up to a vote (1) and (2)
25	are those processes being used on the national report
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1	right now?
2	DR. LERNER: I can answer some of that.
3	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: The Staff Director
4	is going to answer those.
5	DR. LERNER: Yes, the changes that are
6	going to make as far as report writing processes to
7	the administrative instructions are going to have
8	There are going to be changes in two kinds of things.
9	One is the nature of the first draft that
10	Commissioners will be receiving. This provided for
11	the Commissioners to receive an executive summary of
12	two to three pages long rather than the full scale
13	first draft that we have previously provided.
14	And that also will change the review
15	process. Commissioners will have 21 days to review
16	rather than the prior 30 days that were given and
17	because But in a sense and in exchange for that,
18	Commissioners will gain an additional 12 days of
19	review time altogether. They will be given 30 days to
20	review the second draft as opposed to the 14 days
21	currently allowed. Also the Commissioners will have
22	15 days to review before a vote is taken instead of
23	the seven to ten days currently allowed.
24	The changes to the administrative
25	instructions, Commissioner Yaki, that's quite right
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1	and AI 1-6 will have to be changed. But as I said
2	before, none of this has been done because it was
3	unclear to us exactly what the position the Commission
4	had taken. In other words, did the Commission intend
5	for the adoption of the Lean Six Sigma Process from
6	rechartering and report writing or simply for
7	rechartering? My reading of the minutes was ambiguous
8	I must admit. So we thought it was wise to await
9	instruction by the Commission before we proceed with
10	it.
11	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: And I would like
12	to have a motion to adopt this new process for our
13	statutory and briefing report as well as to authorize
14	the Office of the Staff Director to edit our
15	administrative instructions as needed to ensure this
16	occurs.
17	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: This is Commissioner
18	Taylor.
19	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes.
20	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: If I may. I think
21	just so the record is clear, I believe, we should have
22	a motion with respect to how the Lean Six Sigma
23	Process applies to our statutory reports and our
24	briefing reports and would it be an appropriate time
25	to make that motion?
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1	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes.
2	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: After we adopt the
3	January 11 th minutes.
4	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: It's I mean, we
5	should have a motion on the approval of the January
6	11 th and then a discussion and that discussion would
7	have included Commissioner Yaki's remarks. But I
8	think at this point we do need, yes, a motion to adopt
9	the process to the reports.
10	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: This is Commissioner
11	Reynolds. I move that the Lean Six Sigma Process be
12	applied to both SAC recharters and reports, both
13	briefing and statutory reports.
14	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: And we have a
15	second on that?
16	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: With a friendly
17	amendment if I may.
18	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Sure.
19	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: That the motion
20	should make clear that we're talking about the fiscal
21	and non-statutory report and briefing reports going
22	forward, so we don't undo what we've already done.
23	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes. And you had
24	to announce your name. That was?
25	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I'm sorry.
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1	Commissioner Taylor. I apologize.
2	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: So we accept that
3	friendly amendment.
4	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: This is Commission
5	Reynolds. Yes, I did.
6	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Okay. So we have
7	a motion on the floor. We had a second on that
8	motion. Yes, we have with Commissioner Taylor
9	seconding it with his friendly amendment. So
10	discussion.
11	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I have a question,
12	Madam Chair.
13	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes.
14	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Commissioner Taylor
15	rightfully talked about this as a prospective motion.
16	However, in the discussion that I believe we just had
17	with the Staff Director, it appeared that the $`08$
18	statutory report was being processed in accordance
19	with Lean Six Sigma. Is that correct?
20	DR. LERNER: No, it is not.
21	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Is not?
22	DR. LERNER: No. It's being processed
23	under the current regime.
24	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Okay. That was my
25	point of clarification.
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1	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Are we ready to
2	vote on this? Everyone in favor please say aye.
3	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I have one more
4	question.
5	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes. Sure.
6	COMMISSIONER YAKI: For the Will this
7	also apply to the backlog of reports that we currently
8	have or only for reports as we begin to new reports
9	for new briefings subsequent to this motion?
10	DR. LERNER: Our hope is that and our
11	expectation is that it will be applied to only
12	subsequent reports and briefings that are to be done,
13	not reports based on previous briefings. So in other
14	words, the old briefing reports that we're working on
15	for the Commission will be done under the old process
16	and the new ones going forward perhaps from April will
17	be under the new process.
18	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Just as a point of
19	inquiry, would it make some sense to Since this
20	apparently is a more streamlined functionality
21	approach toward reports, wouldn't it make sense to
22	apply it to some of the incredible number of backlog
23	reports that we currently have?
24	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: We've gone through
25	a lot of the process of those reports.
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1	DR. LERNER: Right.
2	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: This is Commissioner
3	Taylor. One of the meanings to my friendly amendment
4	and, Commissioner Yaki, just to let you know my
5	thinking is frankly, I think, by making a clean break
6	and making this a prospective motion it would give us
7	a better sense of whether or not the Lean Six Sigma
8	Process is effective and improving our work product
9	and is timeliness. If we go back and rejiggle some
10	old ones the picture tube just won't be as clear. So
11	I'd like to do it prospectively so we all know whether
12	or not the process is effective and worthwhile.
13	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: There's also a
14	problem I believe with having to first amend the AIs
15	before we would If we're going backwards, we can't
16	do that without first amending the AIs.
17	COMMISSIONER YAKI: That's correct. Okay.
18	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: So I don't think
19	this is a possibility, Commissioner Yaki.
20	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Okay. Got to help
21	move things along.
22	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes. No, I
23	understand. So let's have a vote on the motion.
24	COMMISSIONER YAKI: A lot of doggies still
25	in that corral back there.
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1	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Pardon me?
2	COMMISSIONER YAKI: There are a lot of
3	doggies back in that corral.
4	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: We know that and I
5	hope that under the new process that in fact deadlines
6	will be taken seriously by everybody and that
7	everybody includes me because there has been a problem
8	of deadlines. For various reasons we just have not
9	met.
10	But, in any case, let's have a vote on the
11	motion that's on the floor. All in favor indicated by
12	saying aye. This is prospective only on reports.
13	COMMISSIONER YAKI: The motion included
14	the SACs.
15	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Okay. The motion
16	included the SACs.
17	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Yes, it did.
18	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: That we had
19	already agreed on previously as I understand it.
20	COMMISSIONER YAKI: The Commission voted
21	in favor of it.
22	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes. All right.
23	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Aye.
24	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Is there
25	(Laughter.)
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1	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Nay.
2	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: All in favor
3	please say aye.
4	(Chorus of ayes.)
5	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I move to divide the
6	question.
7	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: It's too late to
8	do that, Commissioner Yaki. We already have a motion
9	and it was seconded and we are voting on that motion.
10	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Until the vote is
11	taken, I can
12	DR. LERNER: But we're halfway through it.
13	COMMISSIONER YAKI: She didn't call for
14	the vote. We just said aye.
15	DR. LERNER: No.
16	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I did call it.
17	(Off the record comments.)
18	DR. LERNER: She did, yes.
19	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: So all in favor
20	please say aye.
21	(Chorus of ayes.)
22	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: Kirsanow aye.
23	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Kirsanow aye.
24	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I abstain.
25	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Reynolds aye.
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1	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Taylor aye.
2	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Taylor aye.
3	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Abstain.
4	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: So we have two
5	abstentions. Commissioners Yaki and Melendez have
6	abstained and the rest are ayes and no opposition.
7	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Now the minutes.
8	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Now that we've
9	settled that question can I have a motion to approve
10	the minutes of January 11 th ?
11	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: So moved, Reynolds.
12	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second, Taylor.
13	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: I have some
14	questions.
15	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I'm opening that
16	up to discussion right now.
17	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: On the Staff
18	Director report.
19	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Questions on the
20	Staff Director report. Why didn't you bring them up -
21	-
22	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: We're still under
23	that rubric, aren't we?
24	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: We can finish the
25	vote on this and then go back to the Staff Director's
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1 report. So let us -- We are now since we have a 2 motion simply to approve the January 11th minutes. We 3 have a motion, a second. All in favor -- Is there any 4 discussion of those minutes?

5 COMMISSIONER YAKI: Just а point of 6 information. Wasn't the fact that they were ambiguous 7 in the first place the reason why we just had this corrective vote? So therefore should the minutes 8 9 reflect, be amended to reflect, that the ambiguity was not resolved and perhaps the way the minutes thought 10 it was? 11

VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: It seems to me with the vote today that it's perfectly obvious that we are resolving an ambiguity and the minutes should reflect the ambiguity that existed at that time. Unless somebody has a different view, they should speak to it.

COMMISSIONER YAKI: Because the discussion
before was that there's a discussion whether there was
an ambiguity.

VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: No, but really the motion assumed there was an ambiguity that needed clarification and so we've taken a vote on that. We have clarified it. The minutes stand as minutes of that meeting with the ambiguity buried in it. That

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1	ambiguity has been recognized and voted on and we
2	move forward.
3	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Okay. Remove the
4	question.
5	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Thank you. All in
6	favor of approving the minutes of July 11 th please say
7	aye. We have two We've already taken a vote on it.
8	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: January.
9	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: January. We've
10	already taken a vote. There were, do I understand
11	correctly, two nos and the rest
12	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: No.
13	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: No.
14	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: No. I'm sorry.
15	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: That was on
16	something else.
17	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I'm sorry. Okay.
18	Let's have a vote. All in favor please say aye.
19	(Chorus of ayes.)
20	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Reynolds aye.
21	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: Kirsanow aye.
22	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Taylor aye.
23	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Thernstrom aye.
24	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Yaki abstains.
25	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yaki abstains.
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1	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I abstain.
2	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Abstain.
3	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Three abstentions.
4	Commissioners Gaziano, Yaki and Melendez abstain. The
5	motion is approved.
6	Okay. Now further questions on the Staff
7	Director's report.
8	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Yes, this is
9	Commissioner Melendez. I had a question whether or
10	not we responded to the Congressional request. I
11	think there were some letters that came in as per some
12	information. Did we respond to those?
13	DR. LERNER: We are in the process of
14	responding to them, yes. There was a fair amount of
15	information that was asked for and the staff is
16	pulling together the responses.
17	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Okay. What is the
18	status of the campus anti-Semitism campaign? Are we
19	still working on that? I know we
20	DR. LERNER: I believe so. Sock-Foon, do
21	you remember the status? What is the status of the
22	campus anti-Semitism campaign?
23	MS. MacDOUGALL: This is Sock-Foon
24	MacDougal. As my schedule permits, I continue to
25	research groups which we send campus campaign

2	(Off the record discussions.)
3	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Anyway, your
4	question on this is, Commissioner Melendez?

22	these interrogatories to and how many institutions
23	you're planning to contact?
24	DR. LERNER: Yes. Because of the nature
25	of the OMB limitations and also the nature of the time
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1 involved we are not able to do a full-scale survey 2 which, of in an ideal world would be course, So we selected specific cases suggested by 3 desirable. 4 both people who had participated in the briefing 5 session and elsewhere. We asked them to indicate 6 instances that might select out. A thought might be an especially egregious violators of religious right 7 of prisoners and we tried to select what we would call 8 9 in statistical jargon a purposive sample that would 10 reflect it, meaning that we can't generalize as you would in the statistical sense. But this should give 11 12 a kind of a representation of those prisons and jails where these deprivations of rights might be occurring. 13 Again, Sock-Foon, is there anything you 14 would like to add? 15 16 MS. 2	notifies the Staff Director or his designee of the
3	appointment dates, terms and party affiliation. Under
4	this motion, the Staff Director will ensure that this
5	information is posted on the Commission's website as
6	part of the Commissioner's biographies and any changes
7	to this information will be immediately distributed to
8	Commissioners in order to update it within five
9	business days of such notice. The Staff Director
10	shall prepare an administrative instruction to
11	implement this policy.
12	And I have a
13	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I will make a
14	similar motion.
15	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Does anybody want
16	to move this and then we can ask for a friendly
17	amendment?
18	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: That's fine.

21	anyone's moved it.

4	want a friendly amendment.
5	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Since there's
6	disagreement, let me just Who has made the motion?
7	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I just did.
8	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Okay. Let me just
9	make a friendly motion then. I don't know. There may
10	some Commissioners who don't know what the right term
11	is. I think it's improper
12	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: What do you mean
13	by "term"?
14	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: There seems to be
15	disagreement between branches of government as to when
16	certain terms begin and end. Isn't the I think the
17	real issue of concern is whether a Commissioner's
18	party affiliation is stable or whether a
19	Commissioner's party affiliation changes during the
20	course of their tenure so that the appointing
21	authority can make appropriate appointments under the
22	statute.
23	So I would ask that the motion be amended
24	just to specify that Commissioners need to inform the
25	officials as in the original motion of any change in
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1	their party affiliation.
2	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I do believe we
3	now have from General Counsel a complete record of
4	beginnings and ends of terms. Is that not correct?
5	MR. BLACKWOOD: To the best we can.
6	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: To the best we
7	can.
8	MR. BLACKWOOD: Which was shared with
9	Commissioners.
10	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Which has been
11	shared with Commissioners. Everybody should have
12	that. I don't think there's a lot of dispute over
13	what these terms are. I mean, I don't mind. I can

1 tackle the issue of concern and you, if you want to, 2 take up convincing the House or the Senate or the D.C. 3 Circuit to resolve that disagreement, then more power 4 to you.

5 VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: But, Michael, what 6 are we gaining with including that information?

7 COMMISSIONER YAKI: I'm not saying we include it. I would say I would move to amend the 8 9 amendment to reinstate that section. But instead of having the General Counsel verify the dates, I would 10 have the General Counsel examine the effective dates 11 12 of every Commissioner appointment, reconcile it in accordance with his or her understanding of the real 13 appointment time and U.S. v. Wilson and if there is a 14 15 discrepancy, communicate such to the appointing 16 authorities in order for these things not to become a 17 problem later on.

The dates become, just to answer your 18 19 question, Commissioner Gaziano, the dates become 20 somewhat important because, for example, one of the 21 issues that we had at the end of the year were a 22 the year appointments that number of the end of 23 Commissioner Commissioner involved Thernstrom, Braceras's expiring appointment which was, of course, 24 25 Commissioner Kirsanow and what the exact dates even

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1	just the dates of those appointments became an issue
2	of inquiry because White House announced one thing.
3	The papers actually went another. That becomes an
4	issue in terms of when you calculate the timing and
5	when the effective date is.
6	So I think that it is important that this
7	be resolved with the assistance of the General Counsel
8	because that's what the General Counsel is supposed to
9	help do.
10	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Sure.
11	COMMISSIONER YAKI: And I think that in
12	addition to that, yes, I agree about that we have to
13	get at the issue of the ping pong registration. But I
14	think we can do that.
15	I think the motion takes care of that. I
16	have no problem with that part. I just wanted to make
17	sure on the second part the General Counsel actually
18	opened up a can of worms that I was unaware of. In
19	terms of my own appointment, I would like to see
20	rather than me go back, someone else go back. I think
21	the General Counsel is perfectly situated as the
22	counsel for the Commission to examine this issue, look
23	at where there may be a potential discrepancy or issue
24	and communicate with the appointing authorities as to
25	resolve that so that there is a safe harbor for all of

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1	us when the question of what the actual appointment
2	date is.
3	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Have you made
4	Has your motion been seconded to amend the amendment?
5	COMMISSIONER YAKI: As you pointed out, I
6	had really set a motion. I know
7	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Well, that's what
8	I'm trying to understand. My preference is
9	COMMISSIONER YAKI: any of the
10	substance of what I wanted to do.
11	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I was confused
12	whether you made a motion. My preference I agree
13	with you that this is important. My preference is we
14	not do it with this motion.
15	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I would like to
16	hear from the General Counsel on this.
17	MR. BLACKWOOD: If I might by way of
18	example, Commissioner Yaki, and I'm reading off the
19	Congressional record. The last line of your
20	appointment says that "you have been granted a six
21	year term expiring May 3, 2011."
22	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Okay.
23	MR. BLACKWOOD: That's directly contrary
24	to the calculation under the <u>Wilson</u> case which would
25	have your term expire December 15, 2010. That's
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1	approximately a six-month discrepancy. Commissioner
2	Melendez, I believe, has approximately seven or eight
3	months that he would lose because Congress
4	specifically picked a date directly contrary to the
5	holding in <u>Wilson</u> .
6	If you're asking who wins, I believe the
7	court controls. We have brought this to Congress's
8	attention. Copies of these binders were forwarded to
9	the appropriate committees, especially with regard to
10	knowing that Commissioner Gaziano's position was
11	coming up and it had no effect.
12	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Okay.
13	MR. BLACKWOOD: But it is an issue. I did
14	talk to Mr. Schmechel, for example. It's something
15	that the Commission is going to have to be aware of
16	three years from now. There were signals
17	COMMISSIONER YAKI: To whom?
18	MR. BLACKWOOD: To Congress that they need
19	to address this before your dates expire.
20	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Okay.
21	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: This is Commissioner
22	Reynolds. Commissioner Yaki brings up an important
23	issue. But I believe that it should be addressed
24	separately. The way I read the motion the motion
25	would require Commissioners to notify the Staff
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1	Director. As it's currently written, it would
2	notify the Staff Director of the appointment date and
3	term. That is problematic because if a commissioner
4	picks a date that's not consistent with <u>Wilson</u> , we
5	have a problem.
6	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: But I believe it
7	is
8	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: With respect to point
9	of clarification, we don't have that problem.
10	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Okay, but I
11	believe there is a motion to, unless I'm confused,
12	strike. There's an amendment to
13	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Yes, I support that,
14	but I'm also making the point that Commissioner Yaki
15	has brought up an important point that we need to
16	address. But I'm saying that we should address it
17	separately.
18	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Yes.
19	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I don't think
20	anybody's in disagreement with the fact that it is an
21	important question obviously if there's a six months
22	discrepancy in Commissioner Melendez's term between
23	the
24	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I just vote the common
25	law rule of squatter's rights after December 2010.
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1	(Off the record comments.)
2	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I think that
3	applies to all of us. Are we ready?
4	(Off the record comments.)
5	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Commissioner
6	Melendez.
7	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Mr. Blackwood, how
8	are the commissioners supposed to report their party
9	affiliation under this motion? Is it their voter
10	registration or their voting or what?
11	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: It can't be their
12	voter registration for those of us who live in the
13	state where there is no party registration.
14	DR. LERNER: Actually, we haven't
15	MR. BLACKWOOD: This is Mr. Blackwood
16	again. I would suggest that the proper way to do it
17	is self certification. As Commissioner Thernstrom
18	pointed out, several states don't require party
19	affiliation to be recorded and therefore any I
20	think it has to be a process of self certification.
21	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Self declaration.
22	MR. BLACKWOOD: Identification. Correct.
23	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I'm a Democrat.
24	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: You are?
25	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Absolutely.
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1	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: That is news.
2	(Laughter.)
3	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I'm self certifying
4	for the record right now.
5	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Bring out the
6	cameras.
7	COMMISSIONER YAKI: of the Democratic
8	National Party.
9	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: All the national
10	media that's here please take note.
11	All right. Are we ready to vote on this
12	and I believe this is a motion that has been amended.
13	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Could you reread the
14	motion?
15	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Before we read the
16	motion as amended, I may have one quick question.
17	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Okay. The motion
18	reads "The Commissioners adopt a policy that the
19	Commissioners notify the Staff Director or his
20	designee of their party affiliation. Under this
21	motion, the Staff Director will ensure that this
22	information is posted on the Commission's website as
23	part of the Commissioners' biographies and any changes
24	to this information will be immediately distributed to
25	Commission and order updated within five business days
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1	of such notice. The Staff Director shall prepare an
2	administrative instruction to implement this policy."
3	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: My one question
4	since I did amend other parts of the original, is an
5	administrative instruction important, valuable? Is
6	that necessary? If we just adopt a policy here, isn't
7	that good enough?
8	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Mr. Blackwood.
9	MR. BLACKWOOD: The instruction is
10	necessary to instruct the staff what to do.
11	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I want
12	clarification of whether that's even necessary. But I
13	appreciate the clarification obviously that the AI
14	doesn't, wouldn't, necessary apply to the Commissioner
15	action. But is an AI even necessary if we have
16	instructed the Staff Director to see that it's
17	properly posted on the website?
18	MR. BLACKWOOD: Well, you need a
19	Commission vote to determine, to order, the staff what
20	to do.
21	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: That's fine, yes.
22	MR. BLACKWOOD: And I think that part
23	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Do we really need
24	then an AI to
25	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: That puts it in the
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1	handbook. It makes it easier for continuity.
2	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: What is your
3	concern here? We have it in the AI. It becomes part
4	of the handbook. Commissioner Melendez. No, it's
5	Commissioner Yaki. Is that right?
6	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Yes, I have an issue
7	with the self certification. I think that if you're
8	in a state where there is no party affiliation listed
9	when you vote, that's fine. But I think that where
10	you do live in a state where party affiliation is part
11	of how you vote that the part of the attestation of
12	your party status. In other words, I just don't want
13	self certification just because a couple states don't
14	require it. I would like tangible proof in those
15	states that do allow for parties certification.
16	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: So you want an
17	inconsistent rule. One rule applies to people living
18	in certain states and another rule applies to people
19	living in states
20	COMMISSIONER YAKI: No. As an
21	accommodating rule. I'm accommodating those who live
22	in those states that don't require party affiliation
23	and for those states that do I think that it's
24	perfectly reasonable to ask for that certification.
25	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Then there's a third
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1	category of states, states that will automatically
2	list you. They will tell you "You may vote in the
3	Republican or Democratic primary." But they don't
4	bother to tell you that if you choose to do so then
5	you'll be automatically listed as a member of that
6	party.
7	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: What is the
8	downside, Commissioner Yaki, to having people identify
9	themselves?
10	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I think the issue is
11	self evident and I'll leave it at that.
12	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I'm sorry. I may
13	be
14	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I will take your
15	advice. Since you haven't put it in the form of a
16	motion, I think that we can take your advice under
17	advisement. Is there any further discussion on the
18	motion?
19	COMMISSIONER YAKI: No, I'm going to make
20	a motion to amend your motion to include that in
21	states where party registration is allowed that
22	attestation of party status through documentation is
23	required. For those states that do not require party
24	identification as part of their voter registration
25	process that self certification will suffice.
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1	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Is there a second
2	on that? I would like to address.
3	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Yes, second.
4	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Okay. Can I just
5	ask how is that going to work? How is that going to
6	work? Who has the responsibility to obtain the
7	paperwork, to provide the paperwork?
8	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: And to enforce it.
9	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I don't know. I've
10	always found it very easy to go down to my local
11	registrar's and get a little printout that says I'm a
12	Democratic.
13	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, it is
14	Look. If you are an in a state like I was like
15	Massachusetts, your party identification which has a
16	category of un-enrolled, otherwise known as
17	Independent, your party identification switches for,
18	let's say, for two weeks and you've taken the ballot
19	of one party or another and then you return to
20	register in whatever party or get back to enrolled if
21	you please. So, you know, there isn't a consistent
22	party registration because the state allows you to
23	move back and forth.
24	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: What is the matter
25	of concern is that you move back and forth without
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1	even realizing it. A person can vote in a primary
2	not realizing that their jurisdiction will
3	automatically by operation of law cause them to be
4	considered a particular party member and might not
5	find out about that for years.
6	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes, that's an
7	even stronger reason.
8	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I suppose. I move
9	the question. I think it's Mr. Yaki's amendment to my
10	amendment to the motion.
11	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: All those in favor
12	of Mr. Yaki's motion to amend.
13	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Commissioner Yaki.
14	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Commissioner
15	Yaki's motion, sorry, to amend Commissioner Gaziano's
16	motion say aye.
17	(Chorus of ayes.)
18	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: All opposed.
19	(Chorus of nays.)
20	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: It fails. We are
21	back to the motion that Mr. Gaziano made which I did
22	read aloud. Do I need to read it aloud again?
23	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: No.
24	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: My question was
25	answered. I move the vote on the motion unless there
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1	is further discussion.
2	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I just want to make
3	a point for the record here is that we're not claiming
4	that any of this has any particular operation of law.
5	We are talking about a motion that would require us or
6	state what we believe our party affiliation to be.
7	But we're not endorsing any particular theory as to
8	how these decisions are made because those are
9	decisions made by a different authority.
10	You know, when the President of the United
11	States appoints someone they may have their view of
12	what constitutes a Republican or a Democrat or an
13	Independent.
14	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Or may not even
15	ask.
16	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Or may forget that
17	this is at issue. We're not. We're not making law
18	here. We're just
19	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Or may explicitly
20	say it doesn't matter.
21	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: It's just a
22	reporting of it.
23	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: And I want to
24	associate myself with those remarks and add that the
25	statutory requirements may be unconstitutional and an
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1	appointing authority may have that view and an
2	appointing authority's judgment is probably non-
3	justifiable.
4	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Or the OLC's memo
5	about how the wall works and that may or may not be
6	anybody else's view of how the wall works. We're just
7	talking about reporting what we consider our party
8	affiliation to be at any time.
9	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I would offer a
10	slightly contrary point of view and that is I think
11	that there's a long statutory history going to the
12	issue that party affiliation was important for the
13	purposes of
14	(Off the record discussion.)
15	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: This is Commissioner
16	Taylor. Do you have a question?
17	COMMISSIONER YAKI: No, I was pausing
18	because the Chair was on the phone.
19	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I'm very sorry.
20	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Was on her cell phone?
21	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I'll take it off.
22	I'm terribly sorry. I forgot to turn it off before.
23	COMMISSIONER YAKI: That's not an issue.
24	It happens to everyone, Madam Chair.
25	I think that this is an important issue.
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1	I think it goes toward issues of balance. I think
2	that to understand that commissioner I speak only
3	for myself, but at least for Commissioner Yaki and
4	perhaps the function that party affiliation changed
5	like a Kleenex for the purposes of complying with the
6	structural requirements is I think contrary to
7	statutory intent and certainly the spirit of the law
8	in which we were created and that is why I have a
9	concern about the self certification and why I have a
10	concern that it's more than just a non-issue according
11	to some other members of the Commission.
12	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I just want to say
13	one thing. Evidently, there's a problem with the
14	rustling interfering with our communication with our
15	three commissioners coming by phone. So everybody try
16	to keep the rustle down.
17	Anyway, anybody else want to
18	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Commissioner Taylor
19	had something to say.
20	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes, Commissioner
21	Taylor.
22	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Yes, I have a
23	question. Is this motion Does this motion require
24	a commissioner to provide their "view" on party
25	affiliation or note the party that they are registered
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1	with if that state has party registration? In other
2	words, could a commissioner have a different view than
3	their registered party affiliation?
4	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Would you read the
5	sentence?
6	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes. The sentence
7	reads, "The Commissioners notify the Staff Director or
8	his designee the party affiliation." So it seems to
9	me this is a matter of self identification. On the
10	other hand, we cannot have more than four members of
11	any one party on the Commission.
12	COMMISSIONER YAKI: This, of course, is a
13	basic question. If Commissioner Melendez and I have
14	some change in medical condition that prompts us to
15	self identify as Republicans right now, that you would
16	out of compliance with the statute as we are sitting.
17	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I'm not sure that's
18	correct, but I
19	COMMISSIONER YAKI: The medical condition
20	
21	(Laughter.)
22	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Which is why I
23	don't think we need to debate the motion.
24	Commissioner Taylor, I am sure you will self identify
25	with all of the proper considerations and I don't know
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1	that we need to specify in the motion anymore what
2	those proper considerations are.
3	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Commissioner Taylor, I
4	think if the President found out that you registered
5	with the Green Party you would be receiving a stern
6	letter or phone call in very short order.
7	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, we do not
8	need to go there, Michael, Commissioner Yaki, I should
9	say. Can we have a vote on the motion as Is there
10	more discussion or can we have a vote on the motion
11	that's on the table?
12	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Let's vote.
13	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: Kirsanow. Please
14	read the motion.
15	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: The motion reads
16	that the Commissioners adopt a policy that they notify
17	the Staff Director or his designee of their party
18	affiliation. Then it goes on to say and with this
19	motion the Staff Director will ensure that this
20	information is posted, etc.
21	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: Thank you.
22	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Can we have a vote
23	on this? All in favor say aye.
24	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Commissioner Reynolds
25	aye.
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1	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: Kirsanow aye.
2	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Taylor aye.
3	(Chorus of ayes.)
4	COMMISSIONER YAKI: No.
5	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Aye.
6	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: No.
7	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Okay. So there
8	are two nos from Commissioners Yaki and Melendez and
9	otherwise everybody has voted aye.
10	V. MANAGEMENT AND OPERATIONS
11	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: We go on to the FY
12	2008 and FY 2009 budgets and that is for our Staff
13	Director to report on.
14	DR. LERNER: Thank you. Basically, 2008
15	is very straightforward. We are proceeding on
16	schedule. If we We have completed the first
17	quarter of our spending. So we have a report from the
18	GSA and we spent approximately the amount of money
19	that we had expected to be so that we're going to be
20	in compliance with the Anti-Deficiency Act and other
21	acts. In other words, we spent about a quarter of it
22	so far which is what we had hoped to do. Obviously,
23	that means the changes that were suggested by our
24	budget director and urged by our former staff director
25	are included which means that none of the new hiring

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1	and there was a slight diminution of, but not very
2	large one, of some OSSD travel moneys.
3	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I have a question on
4	that.
5	DR. LERNER: Let me just finish and then
6	yes. So that's our situation. So we're doing well
7	with the current constraint of what we have. I'm
8	sorry, Commissioner Yaki. Go ahead.
9	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Wait a minute. Is
10	that the end of the 2008?
11	DR. LERNER: Pretty much.
12	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Okay.
13	DR. LERNER: Well, wait a minute. I do
14	have one more thing.
15	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, let's finish
16	with the 2008.
17	DR. LERNER: I had almost forgotten. I
18	think the staff under fairly difficult situation has
19	actually accommodated admirably and let me just make
20	one point in terms of procedure which is that because
21	of the nature of the number of people that we have
22	left on the Commission staff many people are working
23	more than one job and have many different
24	responsibilities.
25	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: More than one job
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1	within the Commission?
2	DR. LERNER: Yes, within the Commission
3	and they've taken on They're multi-tasking above
4	and beyond in some cases the original responsibilities
5	and their efforts as far as I'm concerned are most
6	appreciated.
7	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Commissioners Yaki
8	and Melendez both have something to say and so do I.
9	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I have a question
10	about your statement about none of the new hiring.
11	It's my understanding that in this quarter, at least,
12	in the last month and a half, there have been two new
13	hires to the Commission now.
14	DR. LERNER: Those were hires that were
15	done under the previous dispensation.
16	COMMISSIONER YAKI: What do you mean by
17	that?
18	DR. LERNER: Well, what I mean by that is
19	they were done before (a) I became Acting Staff
20	Director and (b) they are not part of the list that
21	the previous staff director had actually put out.
22	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I understand that they
23	aren't part of the list. But they are nevertheless
24	two new hires. Correct? Did we not lose one special
25	assistant and then hire another one and did we not
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1	also hire a new attorney advisor?
2	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: We hired a
3	replacement for a special assistant.
4	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Well, the question is
5	Sorry.
6	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: It's just a
7	replacement.
8	COMMISSIONER YAKI: The question is in a
9	budget scenario that was documented by the former
10	staff director the issue was never brought up as to
11	what the impact of (a) hiring a replacement was and
12	(b) hiring the new attorney advisor was in terms of
13	because that was certainly done at a situation and at
14	a time where there was full knowledge that the
15	rescission had indeed been placed upon our agency.
16	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: But there was if
17	you look at Pardon me?
18	DR. LERNER: Both hires are replacements.
19	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes, and if you
20	look at the transcript from February 17 of 2006 it
21	does make it very clear, the record makes it very
22	clear, that we are refraining from hiring additional
23	special assistants. But we are not in any way putting
24	a hold on
25	DR. LERNER: Replacements.
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1	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: On replacements.
2	COMMISSIONER YAKI: But we hired a new
3	attorney advisor.
4	DR. LERNER: Pardon me?
5	COMMISSIONER YAKI: We hired a new
6	attorney advisor.
7	DR. LERNER: No, it was we were replacing
8	one or one that we had previously had.
9	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Well, I think the term
10	"replacement" and "new hire" are being used rather
11	cavalierly in this situation because the replacement
12	actually still works as far as I can tell from the
13	emails I receive within the Office of OSD and so I
14	find that very peculiar.
15	DR. LERNER: Well, with a new person, of
16	course, there are issues of transition. But the
17	replacement is assuming and will totally assume the
18	duties of the
19	COMMISSIONER YAKI: That may be true, Dr.
20	Lerner, but as I recall the person who was being
21	replaced has been supposedly in the other job for more
22	than several months and I'm just wondering what
23	transition we're talking about here.
24	DR. LERNER: Actually, I don't believe
25	that's correct. But okay.
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69 1 COMMISSIONER YAKI: At least, not 2 according to the Staff Director's reports as we qo 3 back in time. Perhaps I can refresh your memory and 4 get you the appropriate citation. 5 VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Commissioner Yaki, I would just like to read from this transcript so that 6 7 we have it in this record as well from the February 17, 2006 transcript. I said, "The point is we would 8 want to be able to replace the special assistant with 9 10 another special assistant and not necessarily the person that is the commissioner." 11 And the Chair 12 Reynolds says, "That's right." And then I go on to say, "But we would want to keep the same number of 13 14 special assistants, the total number, so I would just refrain from hiring additional commissioner special 15 16 assistants so the number, the total number, doesn't go 17 That's my only point. I'm not saying that any down. particular commissioner is entitled to a special 18 19 assistant." And Commissioner Yaki says, "I agree." 20 So I think with respect to the special 21 assistant there's a clear record here. 22 COMMISSIONER YAKI: There is actually -- I 23 agreed because there was some information that was

24 available at the time. My question actually goes to 25 when was the new special assistant actually hired and

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1	did they go through White House clearance. My
2	understanding is that usually took about two months.
3	So I'm just trying to figure out exactly when this new
4	person was put into the system and then actually
5	hired.
6	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: And by the way,
7	the 2007 budget submission includes, contemplated, the
8	Commissioners approved, eight Commissioners, four
9	special assistants. I mean, this was the expectation.
10	This is for FY `08. I'm sorry. This was the
11	expectation we all agreed to.
12	I don't think that there's an issue with
13	respect with the special assistants and the answer to
14	the question of whether the White House, whether the
15	name was submitted to the White House. The answer is
16	yes.
17	COMMISSIONER YAKI: So when was that done?
18	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: The precise date,
19	I don't have that.
20	(Off the record comment.)
21	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: We may have it.
22	We can ask Myrna and Tim Fay can go ask Myrna when the
23	paperwork was submitted to the White House.
24	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I'll take that later.
25	You can move on.
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1	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes, I mean this
2	is You do realize this is an OPM rule. It's not a
3	Commission rule.
4	COMMISSIONER YAKI: And that's exactly my
5	point.
6	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I mean we don't
7	have liberty to simply disregard OPM.
8	COMMISSIONER YAKI: And then that's
9	exactly my point. I think that OPM has no
10	jurisdiction over our special assistants for White
11	House clearance and I'm trying to figure out exactly
12	the time line for when that occurred.
13	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: The Staff Director
14	just said to me that he believes OPM has jurisdiction
15	over everybody.
16	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I believe that's
17	correct.
18	MR. BLACKWOOD: The question is This is
19	Dave Blackwood again. The question has come up
20	several times about process and I'm not the expert on
21	it and unfortunately Ms. Martin is not here. But I
22	will give you my best explanation. OPM is the only
23	source that can process any sort of hire here at the
24	Commission, any, all Schedule Cs and we have the form.
25	We have pulled that up. And we have several

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1 publications from OPM that say all Schedule Cs must 2 be cleared by the White House. We have tried to determine the source of 3 4 that policy. It appears, and I can't say for sure, it 5 is a policy. It is not a rule. It is not a 6 regulation. It is a policy, however, that appears to 7 have been followed by several White Houses going back to the Reagan Administration. 8 9 I don't have the rule. We have requested 10 a copy of the source of the material from OPM and its general counsel and we haven't received a response as 11 12 of this time. So I will tell you this. 13 We have -- I have requested from OPM's counsel. If we submit an 14 15 request to hire someone and don't go through the White 16 What happens? And he said, "We'll cross that House. 17 bridge when we get to it." But we've also been informally been told in essence it's simply not going 18 19 to get processed. We can submit the request and OPM 20 won't do anything. 21 COMMISSIONER YAKI: Okay. 22 VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Anything else? 23 COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Yes, I have a question. 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1	times when we, the Commission, actually approved,
2	we've been before the Commission and we vote on
3	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: We don't vote on
4	particular people. We voted to give you a special
5	assistant.
6	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Okay. But we
7	didn't do that in this situation?
8	COMMISSIONER YAKI: It's a replacement.
9	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: No, it's a
10	replacement.
11	COMMISSIONER YAKI: So the answer is no.
12	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: But my concern is
13	that
14	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Is it your
15	replacement? Is the person assigned to you,
16	Commissioner Thernstrom?
17	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: No, but it
18	specifically said as I read in those minutes that
19	person does not have to be assigned to me.
20	COMMISSIONER YAKI: May I ask a question?
21	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes.
22	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Given my request
23	earlier in the year, why was there no consideration
24	that he'd be given to me?
25	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, Tim Fay was
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1	regarded as my replacement and for complicated
2	reasons we decided to I mean, he is my assistant
3	and I was sharing Lisa with Gail and we're still
4	sharing an assistant. He was replacing the person
5	whom we are sharing.
6	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I'd like the record
7	to reflect that if any individual Commissioners have
8	special assistants individually assigned to them that
9	I would like one.
10	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I agree. Commissioner
11	Thernstrom, my only point is that my understanding of
12	the regs and the law is that the special assistants
13	are to a commissioner. Whether or not that person
14	chooses to assist another commissioner is an issue
15	between one commissioner and another. But that
16	special assistant is assigned to a particular
17	commissioner. I believe that the paperwork for Mr.
18	Fay specifies that he is assigned to Commissioner
19	Heriot. Is that correct?
20	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: That is correct.
21	On the other hand, we have not changed the ratio of
22	special assistants and we are in You know, I mean,
23	the question of whether it is meaningful legally to
24	have had Mr. Fay assigned to Commissioner Heriot

instead of me is a separate issue that we would have

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1	to discuss separately it seems to me. We did not
2	regard it as anything but continuing the sharing
3	arrangement.
4	And in these minutes specifically that I
5	read to you it talked about, we talked about, the
6	question of whether the replacement was for a
7	replacement for a specific commissioner. Look. There
8	are
9	COMMISSIONER YAKI: No. The minutes
10	reflect the placing of special assistants which in my
11	view meant that if you lost one, if your person left
12	you, you would get one. But that is a different
13	situation where the person is no longer assigned to
14	you and is assigned instead to a new commissioner.
15	That's my point.
16	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, I know it
17	is, but we have to resolve the basic disagreement over
18	whether Mr. Fay is still assigned to me or not. I
19	regard him as assigned to me in the same way that Lisa
20	Neuder was assigned to Gail Heriot and that is
21	COMMISSIONER YAKI: You might want to ask
22	OPM on their view of whether that's something that
23	could formally assigned. In other words, if Special
24	Assistant Fay were to say to you, "Commissioner
25	Thernstrom, I'm sorry. I can't do it. I have to do
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76 this work for Commissioner Heriot." You say, 1 "No, 2 we share this." If there were an issue, I think OPM 3 would say, "Commissioner Thernstrom, you lose." 4 VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, luckily, the 5 conditions under which he were hired, I mean, he understood from the very beginning that we were, that 6 7 two of us in effect were, hiring him and all of this boils down to budget issues. 8 We have no money and I'd like to interject 9 10 something here on that question. There are a lot of people on this staff, I know, on the Commission staff 11 who are worried with this kind of discussion going on 12 that there will be layoffs and I would like to say 13 speaking only for myself here, but other commissioners 14 are free to join me, that I will do everything in my 15 16 power to protect layoffs on this Commission and that 17 furthermore I join Dr. Lerner's statement that I know there are people working more than 40 hours a week 18 19 I know that there are people doing excellent here. work and I personally feel very grateful to them and 20 21 in very tough times, they're pitching in and I'm again going to do my best to see that there are no layoffs. 22 additional special assistants would mean 23 And any We cannot in my view go there. 24 layoffs. 25 COMMISSIONER YAKI: I just raise the issue

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1 that when I brought up the desire to have a special 2 assistant because of the workload, because of the 3 immense backlog of reports that are out there and the 4 fact that it is difficult as a full-time lawyer to 5 have the time to devote the reports that come out as 6 they are coming out. At the very time that I raised 7 that with the former staff director he had not yet extended an offer for the new attorney advisor. 8 But as soon as I did, he did that and that we can talk all 9 we like about how our budgets have been. 10 like -- I'm sure the staff 11 But I would 12 knows full well that two years for reasons that are inexplicable, returned \$500,000 13 still we to the Treasury that last year we spent an inordinate amount 14 15 of money on the Hawaii special state advisory

16 committee issues in an attempt to try and juggle a 17 resolution from them which ultimately failed but at an enormous expenditure at the end of the year to the 18 19 Commission and that I think for me any questions my 20 willingness to try and help the staff knows full well 21 that one of the first things I did when I came on board was address this issue very directly with the 22 23 Chair on the issue of the regional offices, on the issue of layoffs. 24

But part of me is extremely skeptical

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1	nowadays because of the fact that at the end of the
2	last two years we have had enormous sums of money, one
3	where we simply gave it back and the other one that we
4	just simply spent as much as we possibly could.
5	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: The attorney
6	advisor is a replacement. Now on the question of
7	COMMISSIONER YAKI: It's not a
8	replacement. It is not a replacement. It is We
9	have two highly paid individuals who all we did is we
10	rotated positions from OSD elsewhere. We have someone
11	working in Atlantic right now who is earning, an
12	attorney advisor essentially position, salary and
13	there were two highly paid people in Atlantic and we
14	have very few in other parts of the country. That
15	person was in OSD and rotated out for reasons
16	unbeknownst. Why that happened, I have no idea.
17	Then we had another person who actually, I
18	think, does a very good job, Mr. Byrnes, who was with
19	OSD and rotated out again to do some other position
20	that was created with a new rubric.
21	So when you say replacement, I get a
22	little hot under the collar because I don't
23	necessarily view it as replacements and when we talk
24	about how hard the staff is working, I know how hard
25	the staff is working. I talk to them as much as I can
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even though pretty much I'm prohibited from talking to them by directive of the former staff director. But I know how hard they are working and I also know that one of the reasons that they are working this hard goes directly to one of the issues that I want to raise later on in this report.

7 VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, I'd like the Staff Director to address what said. 8 you My 9 understanding is that no matter you can nitpick about 10 the budget here and there, the money spent on the Hawaiian SAC meeting or whatever. You are not going 11 12 money without layoffs for to qet the а special assistant for every single commissioner. 13 We're just not going to get there. Dr. Lerner. 14

Let the record reflect 15 DR. LERNER: Yes. 16 all appointments also that the indeed are 17 Mr. Byrnes is replacing a director of replacements. the Regional Program Coordination Unit which is as 18 19 everyone knows here a very important part of the task in managing the Commission having to do with --20

21 COMMISSIONER YAKI: And who was that 22 person and how long was that position vacant? 23 DR. LERNER: We had an acting person there 24 and --

COMMISSIONER YAKI: And why was that

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1	position vacant? In other words, there was an
2	active person, but how long had that position been
3	vacant? I mean, we
4	DR. LERNER: I think
5	COMMISSIONER YAKI: We've can do budget
6	all day long, Dr. Lerner. I know this stuff very
7	well. So why don't we just end it because we should
8	have a discussion offline because we can go into all
9	the vacancies that have been there for years in the
10	agency and then all of sudden hires become
11	replacements for those when we froze a lot of those
12	for the specific purpose of keeping other parts of the
13	agency going.
14	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I mean,
15	Commissioner Yaki, I'm a little confused here. You
16	have said SAC rechartering is a priority, but that is
17	one of the functions of the regional director. Look.
18	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Well, no. I just said
19	SAC priority, SAC rechartering is a priority, but that
20	to me is a substantive issue, not necessarily a timing
21	issue.
22	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: But you need a
23	body to do it.
24	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: You need a body to
25	do it and I am going to be very unhappy if a great
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1	deal of time of Dr. Lerner's is taken up with
2	arguing about was somebody a replacement and exactly
3	the details of this because we are
4	COMMISSIONER YAKI: a long history of
5	the agency.
6	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, hold on a
7	minute.
8	COMMISSIONER YAKI: having only been
9	here for four months.
10	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Hold on a minute.
11	We are in theory I mean, Dr. Lerner has two jobs at
12	the moment. His other job is extremely important to
13	moving the briefing reports, the background of the
14	reports of and getting out a statutory report. We
15	will have a new staff director. It seems to me it is
16	at that point that you want to go over your concerns
17	about how money is allocated.
18	But in the meantime to the best of our
19	ability we should allow Dr. Lerner to do the job he
20	was hired to do in this agency at the start of his
21	tenure here.
22	COMMISSIONER YAKI: We'll address that
23	later on this agenda item. Thank you.
24	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes.
25	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I have no more
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comments.

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2 COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Going back to the budget, I think that is probably the main issue that 3 4 we're talking about here. I have asked in January for 5 a specific line item, some type of budget item 6 actually because really what happened was that my 7 understanding was we ended up with a lot less money, about \$440,000 less, starting October 1 running 8 9 through the fiscal year and the issue that I brought up in January was that we needed to see a commission 10 what that actually looks like and whether those cuts 11 12 are going to be through the 2008 budget and basically have a hand in making some recommendations. 13 But we have to see something as far as line items so that we 14 know where those cuts will actually be for 2008 15 16 because included in those are the -- I think, there is a separate budget to cover SACs' meeting expenses. 17 You know, I'd like to see that budget as far as is it 18 19 still the same as far as the allocation going to the SACs. 20

DR. LERNER: Yes.

22 COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: And how much has 23 actually been expended already in the first quarter 24 which was October 1st through January 1st.

And you had mentioned or Mr. Marcus had

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mentioned that we were going to consider cutting some of the briefings. So this whole issue plays into whether or not we have any money at all and so I'm not sure where we are with this budget as far as spending.

5 So that's really the crux of what we're 6 actually talking about here. Until Ι can see 7 something, some type of budget, that tells me where we're at and I asked for that in January and I think 8 9 it makes us skeptical when -- The real question in budgets is the question of whether or not you should 10 even fill a position and maybe it even goes to special 11 12 assistants because the Commission has to somewhere look at the budget and say, "Well, it's nice that we 13 a position in any thing that 14 can fill we call 15 replacement, not just the special assistants." But 16 the question would be do we have the money to do that 17 and how comfortable are we in looking at something on paper that actually gives us a comfort 18 zone to 19 support.

20 We talked about whether or not we should 21 hire a human resources person and all those things 22 that we think are major components of operation here. 23 So I think that until we can see a budget and have 24 some input into these key positions I think we're 25 still kind of in the dark as to where we are. But

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1 that's my -- That's something I brought up in 2 January. DR. LERNER: Well, I think I would like to 3 4 reiterate what I said previously. That is we're not 5 engaging, we're not having -- Our budget is in fact --We're on course to spend that money that we've been 6 7 allocated and no other. The direction that the previously staff directors has taken is the one that's 8 9 being pursued now. Tina and I are monitoring it closely to make sure that we're following -- we're not 10 11 going to fall short and we're not. 12 As far as replacing anybody now, unless there are retirements or people leaving the agency, we 13 have no additional funds to replace anybody else. 14 As 15 far as your requests are concerned, we're actually 16 looking at putting responses together to them but we 17 haven't finished them in terms of the memo that you sent us. 18 19 CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: This is Commissioner 20 Reynolds. What's the issue that's on the table now? 21 COMMISSIONER YAKI: No issue. Just discussion of the 2008 budget. 22 23 VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: It's a discussion of the 2008 budget and which Commissioner Yaki has a 24 25 lot of budget related concerns. **NEAL R. 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85 1 We have not yet heard from, Dr. Lerner, on the 2009 budget which are you reporting on. 2 DR. LERNER: Yes, just in the most general 3 4 terms. As you all know, our allocation from OMB is 5 cut back to \$8.8 million as precisely was the year 6 before and we are trying to accommodate the schedule, 7 the program that was voted on and is part of our strategic plan to have a national civil 8 rights 9 conference in 2009, and we've actually worked it out how we'll be able to do it in a scaled-down manner 10 consistent with our budget obligations but I'm not 11 12 ready to share the details with that yet. That's pretty much all. 13 COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: A question. 14 VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: 15 Yes. 16 COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Was there а 17 deadline date to actually submit the appropriations to Congress? I thought it was past already and so what 18 19 are we doing to try to get it in late? It has been the case in the 20 DR. LERNER: 21 past -- right after the State of the Union is the traditional deadline for turning in a budget and we 22 haven't that this year for various reasons. 23 But, in fact, we expect to be able to meet 24 25 it, we expect to be able to turn this in, reasonably **NEAL R. 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soon and I understand from talking to people in
various agencies that the consequences are not
necessarily severe because this is something that many
agencies are in the situation of doing.
CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: No.
COMMISSIONER YAKI: What?
VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I think
Commissioner, Chair Reynolds, has something to say.
CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Hello?
VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes. We recognize
you.
CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: No.
(Off the record discussion.)
VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Chairman Reynolds.
CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: I'm I didn't have a
comment to make at this point.
VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: We heard this no.
CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: It didn't come from
me. Unless my picked up the other line.
(Off the record discussion.)
VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: All right. We'll
disregard. That's a statement.
COMMISSIONER YAKI: Point of intervention.
Is the 2009 budget coming before the Commission at
some point?
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1	DR. LERNER: Yes, absolutely.
2	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Now what is the
3	specific time frame that we would expect this
4	DR. LERNER: I'm hoping we have it by the
5	next meeting.
6	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Okay.
7	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Does anybody else
8	have anything to discuss about the FY 2009 budget
9	because we have a long discussion here of the briefing
10	report on racial categorization of the 2010 census and
11	I'm beginning to fear this meeting will go on for an
12	unacceptably long time.
13	So can we move onto that? We have to vote
14	on each finding and each recommendation with the
15	understanding, of course
16	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Point of order. I
17	think there was an item with regard to Management and
18	Operations regarding in the order of precedence in
19	terms of
20	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: You are right. We
21	did inject that. Okay. Do you want to make motion
22	with respect to that?
23	I just want to answer the question that
24	was raised before about Well, it's about to be on
25	the table about what happens when the staff director
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1	is absent and the deputy staff director or the
2	individual serving as acting staff director who has
3	assumed responsibility to manage the office, what
4	happens when he or she is absent as well and the AI in
5	1-18(b) Order of Precedence says "When the staff
6	director and the deputy staff director are both absent
7	the assistant staff director for the Office of Civil
8	Rights Evaluation shall assume the duties and
9	authority of the acting deputy staff director." And
10	there is nothing else.
11	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Right. And since he
12	was the assistant staff director, that's why we wanted
13	to put something behind him since he has now delegated
14	the authority of the staff director. Correct? Yes. I
15	mean, that was the title.
16	So I move that "the Commission amends its
17	AI 1-18(b) to insert in the Order of Precedence after
18	the assistant staff director that the associate deputy
19	staff director be fourth in order of precedence and to
20	require SES qualifications and Commission vote of
21	approval on any person assuming the duties the
22	administrative head for more than 14 consecutive
23	calendar days." I'm going to amend that to say "or
24	until the next calendar business meeting and to
25	restrict any person who has assumed the duties of

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1	administrative head and otherwise present the same
2	authority for exercising the authority for contracts
3	over 3,000 value without receiving an advanced
4	Commission vote of approval."
5	(Off the record discussion.)
6	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Are you proposing
7	something, Commissioner Yaki?
8	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Is there a second?
9	Has there been a second, Madam Chair?
10	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I'm sorry. I was
11	preoccupied here. Is there an actual motion?
12	COMMISSIONER YAKI: That I just read, yes.
13	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I'm terribly
14	sorry.
15	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Okay.
16	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Could you read it
17	for my benefit again?
18	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I move that the
19	Commission amend its administrative instruction 1-
20	18(b) regarding order of precedence to insert after
21	"assistant staff director" the "associated deputy
22	staff director as fourth in order of precedence, that
23	the associated deputy staff director would have SES
24	qualifications, that Commission vote of approval for
25	that person assuming the duties of the administrative

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1	head for more than 14 consecutive calendar days or
2	the next calendar business meeting of the Commission
3	and to restrict any person who has assumed the duties
4	of administrative head not otherwise possessing
5	assigning authority from exercising assigning
6	authority for contracts over \$3,000 value without
7	receiving in advance Commission vote of approval."
8	That's my motion.
9	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Do we have a
10	second to that motion?
11	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Second.
12	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Madam Chair, if
13	it's all right for me to ask a question. Before I
14	vote, I think there's some aspects of that motion that
15	don't make a lot of practical sense, particularly that
16	whoever has the authority of the staff director only
17	have such a limited budgetary authority. But I'd like
18	to know whether such a motion is consistent with law
19	should we approve it. Is it possible we could get an
20	opinion whether all of the parts of this motion are
21	consistent with law if we were to approve it, that
22	this motion would have any effect?
23	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I think that's an
24	excellent idea.
25	COMMISSIONER YAKI: May I respond, Madam
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VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Of course.

This is sort of the 3 COMMISSIONER YAKI: DEFCON 4 version of what happens when you go down the 4 5 chain of command and you're getting now toward less 6 and less senior albeit SES perhaps qualified 7 individuals who are temporarily heading the agency and I think that it's prudent because such a person will 8 9 have had ostensibly limited experience in terms of 10 running the agency а whole to place as some 11 restrictions on that person from a budgetary point of 12 view simply because of the issue and experience.

13 We're talking about No. 4. We're not talking about No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3. We're talking 14 about the person fourth in order and I think it's very 15 16 appropriate that the fourth person have less carte 17 blanche, shall we say, during that time period. 18 Otherwise, you can get into a situation where you may 19 have No. 4 totally disagreeing whoever was No. 3. No. 3 goes away on vacation and No. 4 signs a contract 20 21 obligating the agency to some insane consulting gig and then we're stuck. 22

23VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM:This is so24academic.

COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Let me just -- If I

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1	can just raise something. Some of my legal
2	concerns, Madam Chair, if that's all right.
3	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Absolutely. But I
4	do want to interject here that I have every hope we're
5	going to get a staff director before too long. I find
6	this unnecessary to address, but I
7	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Well, if you don't
8	
9	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I do want to hear
10	the legal concerns here.
11	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Then I'll just point
12	this out. If Dr. Lerner has a medical emergency in
13	his family, if he needs to attend to some urgent need
14	and needs to go, there is right now nothing in place
15	to deal with the fact that there is anyone here to
16	sign on behalf of the agency. If that happens, God
17	forbid, during but if there is some instance that
18	requires Dr. Lerner's attention elsewhere and outside
19	from the agency where he could not perform the duties
20	assigned to him as the delegated authority of the
21	staff director, then issues such as Commissioner
22	Heriot and Commissioner Melendez's travel could be at
23	issue and there are just simple things that are part
24	of what the staff director does and having no
25	succession for Dr. Lerner I think is imprudent.

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1	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: My legal concern
2	
3	(Off the record discussion.)
4	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Madam Chairman, my
5	legal concerns sort of I think
6	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: May I just say one
7	thing before that? I don't think you are correct to
8	say that, for instance, travel would be a problem as I
9	understand it. But go ahead.
10	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I think
11	Commissioner Yaki's concerns cut against his motion.
12	But skipping those, let me just mention my legal
13	concern is that the President is charged under the
14	Constitution to commission all officers. The statute
15	that organizes our Commission requires the President
16	to appoint Subject, of course, to our approval, it
17	is the President's responsibility to fill, to see,
18	that this Commission has a director.
19	Some of the conditions in Commission
20	Yaki's motion seem to put limits on the President's
21	authority. I don't know all of the body of the
22	Executive law, but I know some of the body of
23	Executive law from when I used to help advise the
24	President on filling in such positions and I am
25	dubious whether some of the conditions in the motion
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1	are consistent with the President's authority. I'm
2	not sure one way or the other.
3	But it seems imprudent, but let me put
4	that aside. I just think that we can make some order
5	of precedence but some of this doesn't make legal
6	sense to me.
7	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Madam Chair, I would
8	just say that I thank Commissioner Gaziano for making
9	the point I'm going to be making later on in the
10	meeting which is that if it is indeed the President
11	who is responsible for doing the appointing authority
12	for the staff director and somehow anything beyond
13	that may be unconstitutional, then the very question
14	of succession here is why I put it on the table.
15	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: You missed
16	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Under Commissioner
17	Gaziano's theory, how can we have any succession
18	whatsoever for this absent Presidential authorization
19	in regulations from OPM?
20	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I think you
21	misinterpret my point.
22	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I don't think I did at
23	all.
24	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: You have to speak
25	up for the
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1 COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Ι think you 2 misinterpret. The President has particular statutory 3 authority in appointing a permanent staff director. He has other authority under the Constitution and a 4 5 number of other laws in filling a vacancy and such an appointment and I think some of the conditions in your 6 7 motion may not be lawful. So until --COMMISSIONER YAKI: So you would rather 8 9 have the agency have Dr. Lerner be required to stay here at all times because we have nothing in hand to 10 alleviate him of his burdens should he be required, 11 12 should his attention be required elsewhere? Is that basically it? 13 14 COMMISSIONER YAKI: No. COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: 15 Then how would you 16 propose to interpret that? Some of the conditions in 17 your motion make no sense. COMMISSIONER YAKI: 18 Why? 19 VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: But also, Commissioner Yaki --20 REYNOLDS: 21 CHAIRMAN This is Chairman 22 just want to go back to Vice Chair Reynolds. Ι 23 Thernstrom's comment that this is indeed an academic We can spin out scenarios where we 24 question. Sure. 25 would have to make some adjustments. But we're not **NEAL R. 3	Dr. Lerner can go back to what he was originally hired
4	to do and we desperately need him in that position and
5	in the meantime, the question is as the Chair just
6	said, as I said, before. It's abstract. I would like
7	to call the question.
8	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Madam Chair, I would
9	just like to add that it may be abstract. I would
10	just remind the Chair and wherever Mr. Chair is that
11	our record of getting timely notation votes in
12	telephone conferences is not exactly terribly
13	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, we have not
14	had an emergency before. I'm sure we could get it

21	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Madam Chair, did
22	you recognize him to speak?

2	table carries.
3	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: The motion to
4	table passes. Sorry about that.
5	VI. PROGRAM PLANNING
6	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: We are moving onto
7	the Racial Categorization in 2010 Census. I believe
8	that is the next item.
9	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Correct.
10	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: At the August 24,
11	2007 business meeting, Commissioners tabled the vote
12	on the briefing report on the racial categorization on
13	the 2010 Census which was based on a Commission
14	briefing held on April 7, 2006, a little while ago.
15	When the report came up for subsequent vote at the
16	October 12, 2007 business meeting, Commissioners again
17	tabled the report and requested that it be revised.
18	Commissioners also agreed to submit alternative
19	findings and recommendations on December 13, 2007.
20	OSD distributed a revised draft of the report
21	requesting that Commissioners submit proposed
22	alternatives, findings and recommendations. As of
23	January 24, 2008, staff had not received any proposed
24	alternative findings and recommendations. So OSD
25	circulated the report

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1	(Telephonic interruption.)
2	Chair Reynolds, is that
3	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Yes, that's me.
4	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Okay.
5	(Laughter.)
6	COMMISSIONER YAKI: We are Children's
7	Services right now.
8	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: alternative
9	findings and recommendations by February 15, 2008. On
10	February 29, 2008, OSD distributed a proposed final
11	draft addressing Commissioner's comments received by
12	that date.
13	Could I have a motion that the Commission
14	approve for publication alone with any concurring and
15	dissenting statements submitted by any Commission by
16	March 21, 2008. Part A of the report produced by the
17	staff and reflecting Commissioner and panelist's input
18	on the briefing the Commission held on April 7, 2006
19	on racial categorization in the 2010 Census.
20	Part A distributed in draft form on
21	February 29, 2008 contains a briefing overview and
22	summary of the issue, why the Commission chose to
23	conduct this briefing, summary of the proceeding
24	consisting with a synopsis of the panelists, all
25	statements during the briefing and synopsis of the

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1	question and answer session and copies of
2	panelists' written statements.
3	Under this motion, if a majority of the
4	Commission votes to adopt Part A of the briefing
5	report, the Commission will then open discussion of
6	Part B. If Part A fails to obtain a majority of
7	votes, discussion of Part B becomes moot. This
8	bifurcated vote is taken pursuant to the policy
9	adopted by Commissioners at the April 13, 2007
10	business meeting.
11	So moved by me and I need a second.
12	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Commissioner Reynolds
13	second.
14	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Okay. So changes,
15	discussion, questions? This is regarding the motion
16	to adopt Part A of the Census report. Yes,
17	Commissioner Yaki.
18	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Vice Chair Thernstrom,
19	I would like to amend the date for concurring and
20	dissenting statement to Hang on. Let me check my
21	calendar because I have a trial and this is something
22	that I want to write on. Could we push it to April
23	11 th ?
24	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: That's a motion.
25	Anybody Do we have a second on that?
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1	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Second.
2	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Okay. All in
3	favor?
4	(Chorus of ayes.)
5	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: That was April the?
6	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Eleventh.
7	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Eleventh.
8	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Any opposition?
9	(No verbal response.)
10	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Okay. That passes
11	unanimously. The date now for concurring and
12	dissenting statements is April 11 $^{ ext{th}}$ and if we all get
13	an email that reminded us of that date I would very
14	much appreciate it.
15	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I have a question,
16	Madam Chair, for the staff.
17	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes.
18	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Again delegated
19	authority staff director person. One of the reasons
20	why this was pushed back had to do with the fact that
21	the Census Bureau had completed some of the testing on
22	the questions dealing with Hispanic identification. I
23	know this was one of the reasons why then Commissioner
24	Braceras also supported our pushing it back.
25	Do we have I was looking for something
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in the report that discussed what those findings were and how they may -- what the findings of that particular testing were and how it may affect the findings and conclusions of the report. But I did not see any. I was just wondering what there was with regard to the Census Bureau.

VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, I've just been informed by Dr. Lerner that if there is, whom I should add knows a great deal about the Census I've discovered, much more it seems to me then the rest of us put together. But in any case, he is not aware of such findings.

COMMISSIONER YAKI: Okay. The briefing 13 14 which was in April 2006 discussed testing that was 15 ongoing with regard to some of the variations of the 16 at the moment open ended questions as it pertained to 17 We received information that communicated Hispanics. to the Commission at the time that those questions, 18 19 rather the testing sample, had been completed and that the findings had not been. Since those findings were 20 21 somewhat critical to the discussion of Hispanic identification in the findings of the report that they 22 23 needed to be contacted, discussed and reviewed in the context of the report. 24

That was pretty much -- I remember there

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1	was pretty much unanimous agreement at the
2	Commission at the time that that was important enough
3	to warrant going back and ensuring that we were not
4	putting out a report that was out of date with the
5	most recent testing done by the Census with regard to
6	that.
7	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Commissioner Yaki,
8	two things.
9	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Right.
10	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: One, we must get,
11	that is our household must get, three or four emails a
12	week from the Census. I do not recall but I could be
13	wrong any announcement of such findings.
14	COMMISSIONER YAKI: No, it wasn't like
15	This was part of the testing process
16	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I understand.
17	COMMISSIONER YAKI: that went toward
18	the questions that were raised about
19	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I understand, but
20	there usually are announcements of findings with
21	respect to testing questions. Now what is your bottom
22	line here? What would you like the Commission to do?
23	COMMISSIONER YAKI: My bottom line is that
24	I have it on good authority that those questions were
25	precluded. Now if they have not finished the analysis
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1	yet, if it is something in process, and is at least
2	something that they should know, but they are
3	proceeding. In the testimony of the Census
4	Commissioner, he referenced the fact that they are
5	doing ongoing testing on some of these issues and they
6	are going to be completed by 2006.
7	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, the problem
8	here is we don't have specifics. Dr. Lerner who keeps
9	up with the Census, I kind of keep up with the Census,
10	don't have any specifics and I'm not sure what you
11	would like to do at this point given the absence of my
12	knowledge.
13	(Off the record discussion.)
14	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Well, I am somewhat
15	distressed to hear that in the face of a specific
16	request with a specific reference to And I'm sorry,
17	I don't have it with me at this time, I did have it
18	with me at the first time that this was tabled, but in
19	that instance, I made a specific reference to begin
20	this.
21	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I understand that.
22	But what would you like to do today?
23	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Well, in the absence -
24	- Yes?
25	MR. BLACKWOOD: This is David Blackwood.
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1	If I could, Commissioner, I believe and I was just
2	consulting with Kim Tolhurst who worked on the report.
3	You did make a citation to a specific, approximately
4	10-15 page report. We did look at it. It did not
5	change any part of the report substantively and that's
6	why we did not include it in this version.
7	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Okay. That's what I
8	wanted to know. That's all I wanted to know.
9	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: All right. So the
10	reason I didn't register on these there was no
11	substitute change.
12	COMMISSIONER YAKI: But there was a
13	report.
14	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Okay. Well, it
15	didn't register on me because there was no substantive
16	change. But Commissioner Melendez.
17	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Yes.
18	Administrative instruction 1-6 requires that a
19	checklist be physically sent to the Commissioners on
20	this process. Was that done?
21	(Off the record comments.)
22	MR. BLACKWOOD: No.
23	COMMISSIONER YAKI: That's right. Ken
24	would always send that out.
25	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: A point of order,
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1	Madam Chairman. I'm sorry to ask what I'm sure is
2	maybe a question and an answer which is known to the
3	rest of you. But if we approve Part A and then we
4	have some disagreement about Part B or want to
5	postpone what would the consequence of the vote on
6	Part A be?
7	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Part A does not
8	include the findings and recommendations.
9	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I understand that.
10	I'm just saying if we make some disposition other than
11	approving Part B and we've already approved Part A
12	what would the consequence of that be. I suppose we
13	could revisit that Part A. I just want to know what
14	the consequence of this vote on Part A is if we don't
15	approve at this particular meeting.
16	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Let me add to that.
17	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Sure.
18	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: If we don't approve
19	of quite a few of the findings of fact and the
20	recommendations, are we better off voting no on Part A
21	or should we vote yes on Part A if we find it
22	obnoxious in itself but don't particularly want to see
23	it published but believe there are lots of changes
24	that we might want to make to the findings and
25	recommendations. I mean, are we better off with a
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1	motion to postpone this? Are we better off voting
2	no on Part A?
3	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: It's not going to
4	be published without findings and recommendations.
5	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: That's my question.
6	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: That's part of the
7	question.
8	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: No. It doesn't
9	get published without findings and recommendations.
10	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Well, we have
11	published before without findings and recommendations.
12	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes, I've just
13	been informed by Dr. Lerner that we can do any kind of
14	fixing we want to Part A while we wait for the rest.
15	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Fixing to Part A?
16	DR. LERNER: Whatever changes are
17	necessary. What I meant was whatever changes are
18	necessary can be made in response to the vote on Part
19	A. You can make while we're waiting to hear about the
20	rest from the Commission. That's all I meant.
21	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: We can inspect A now
22	and then just hold that in reserve and then
23	DR. LERNER: Well, if you
24	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: negotiate on B.
25	DR. LERNER: If you approve of it, we can
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1	make sure the report conforms to whatever it is
2	you've approved for that particular part and we'll
3	wait for instructions about the rest of it.
4	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Does that work?
5	(Off the record conversation.)
6	COMMISSIONER YAKI: For the listeners,
7	there's a conference going on.
8	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Commissioner
9	Heriot, are you saying here, and it is certainly a
10	legitimate suggestion, that it makes no sense not to
11	do this as a package vote A and B together? What
12	would you like?
13	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I don't I have
14	disagreements with Part B.
15	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Right.
16	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: My disagreements
17	with Part A are simply that I'm not certain that it's
18	worth our time to deal with Part A if we don't have a
19	Part B.
20	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, we will have
21	a Part B.
22	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I understand that
23	there is some previous agreement to how to proceed.
24	But would you prefer to amend whatever that previous
25	agreement is so that we consider Part A and Part B
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1	together?
2	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I don't know what
3	our previous agreement is. What do you mean?
4	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I think we're
5	proceeding under Part A and Part B based on a previous
6	agreement that Commissioner Braceras suggested.
7	COMMISSIONER YAKI: It's an administrative
8	instruction.
9	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: That's an AI.
10	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Oh, that's an AI.
11	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Yes.
12	(Off the record discussion.)
13	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: We could amend it
14	for this particular report, could we not?
15	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I don't know what's
16	going to be the easiest use of our time.
17	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Sure.
18	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: All right. I've
19	just been reminded of something by Kim Schuld that is
20	important to you which is that this process was
21	supposed to be approved, we have voted on a Part A.
22	Then we move onto a Part B and if we're not going to
23	move onto a Part B today then I think once again we
24	need to postpone this vote.
25	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: That's fine.
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1	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Just a comment.
2	One of the reasons I asked on the administrative
3	instruction A-6 was that the checklist actually kind
4	of gives us some comfort level that it's been looked
5	at and by a pack of people.
6	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I'm not sure who the
7	external reviewers were.
8	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: I'm not sure who
9	that even is or whether or not it's even done. So I
10	think that's part of the process that I'm not sure
11	where we are with that. But I think
12	MR. BLACKWOOD: Commissioner Melendez,
13	this is David Blackwood. It occurs to me and I may be
14	incorrect but you asked about the checklist. This
15	report goes back to 2006 and we can recall several
16	months ago there was a long discussion about when the
17	AI applied and when it didn't. I'm just While we
18	can look into whether the checklist was sent, this may
19	be a report that is so old that the checklist didn't
20	apply.
21	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Okay.
22	MR. BLACKWOOD: I'm not saying it doesn't,
23	but I'm just saying that might be the explanation.
24	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I have a question.
25	I'm sorry. Commissioner Melendez, do you want to
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1	continue?
2	While he's conferring, I have a question
3	here. Suppose this is postponed once again. What is
4	the process going to look like by which we arrive at
5	the and by which we can vote on both Parts A and B?
6	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: This is Commissioner
7	Reynolds.
8	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes.
9	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: I think it would be
10	helpful if individuals would articulate what their
11	concerns are. I mean, it's one thing to postpone
12	this, but I think we would be in a better position to
13	vote on it at the next business meeting if we had, if
14	whatever concerns folks have were articulated.
15	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: At this meeting or
16	as a document circulated to all commissioner?
17	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: During this meeting.
18	I just want to get a better sense of what the issues
19	are.
20	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Well, I sent in my
21	proposed recommendations awhile ago.
22	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: I'm sorry. I didn't
23	hear you.
24	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I sent in my
25	proposed recommendations awhile ago. I thought there
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1	was actually room for a person in negotiations
2	among the commissioners and the differing views and I
3	offered to try to hammer that out and
4	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Can't we do that
5	during this meeting?
6	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: No, I don't think
7	you can draft something like that during a meeting.
8	That's much too complicated.
9	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Just a comment. I
10	think even former Commissioner Braceras I know that
11	she had tremendous concerns on the Hispanic
12	categorizations and all those different things and
13	like Gail Heriot is saying I think that the Part B is
14	really Nobody is really satisfied with that. So I
15	think if we're going to go forward, it seems to me
16	that we're going to have to table this and probably do
17	extensive work on this because nobody seems to be
18	satisfied with Part B.
19	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes, but look.
20	We're not going to get to the point of unanimity on
21	Part B. That is the function of allowing
22	concurrencies and dissents by individual
23	commissioners.
24	I just You know, the way we're going on
25	this Census report it seems to me that
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COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: And I think too the issue is so old and I would recommend that we just go with no recommendations and take what these people said at the hearing and put that together and send it in.

Commissioner 6 COMMISSIONER YAKI: 7 Thernstrom, I think the practical issue is that the concerns expressed by Commissioner Heriot and I can't 8 9 speak for Commissioner Gaziano and the concerns that 10 may be expressed by Commissioners Yaki and Melendez may actually result in a majority being unsatisfied 11 12 with the findings and recommendations as is. So I'm not too certain whether you could even proceed to get 13 14 to the point where you have concurrences and dissents 15 because you may not get any consensus for majority on 16 anything in Part B for varying reasons.

VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, I mean,
there is such a thing as a plurality vote, it would
seem to me, for findings and recommendations.

20 COMMISSIONER HERIOT: You don't have a 21 plurality. You'll have four-four. 22 CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: This is Commissioner

23 Reynolds. If you were to table this at the next 24 meeting I would recommend that we each submit to the 25 extent that we did reach from the current findings and

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1	recommendations that we each submit and circulate
2	our own findings and recommendations and that we sit
3	down at the next business meeting and negotiate and
4	have the written items in front of us.
5	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I just want to say
6	that it's complicated and I think it's best to
7	negotiate at least in part via email where everybody
8	sees what everybody's proposal is and can make
9	comments on it so that we as the Commissioners take
10	more responsibility for our recommendations.
11	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: What if we
12	accepted, Commissioner Heriot, Part A, rejected Part B
13	and then went forward to asking each commissioner to
14	submit a statement with respect to Part B?
15	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Is there any
16	advantage to passing Part A now when we're clearly not
17	going to be able to pass everything?
18	COMMISSIONER YAKI: What you're simply
19	saying is a Part A with eight potential commissioners'
20	statements and no findings and recommendations?
21	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: No.
22	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: No, I think she's
23	just saying pass half now. Get to B later.
24	DR. LERNER: It's just a report.
25	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Yes, but I'm not
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1	sure that there is If we have to move ahead on
2	B, I'd slightly prefer postponing the whole thing.
3	But I'll claim my share of the blame in trying to
4	discern what the process was as a new commissioner in
5	participating in this report and my difficulty was
6	that I saw some findings and recommendations but I
7	understood other commissioners were going to be
8	sending in comments. So I didn't know whether my
9	comments to the findings would be relevant and it's
10	only lately that I've understood the content of one of
11	the other commissioner's comments.
12	So the suggestion that Commissioner Heriot
13	made makes sense to me and I'll be a better boy and
14	hopefully I'll have something more concrete to
15	participate in.
16	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Okay. At this point,
17	this is Commissioner Reynolds, I move that we table
18	this issue until our next business meeting but during
19	the interim that we circulate our proposed findings
20	and recommendations to all the commissioners and try
21	to have negotiations offline if that's acceptable to
22	everyone else.
23	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Second. I'll second
24	it.
25	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Fine. Any
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1 discussion on that proposal? Any further 2 discussion I should say? COMMISSIONER YAKI: No. 3 4 VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: All right. All in 5 favor aye. (Chorus of ayes.) 6 7 VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: We're missing two 8 votes via the phone. 9 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Yes. Commissioner 10 Taylor aye. 12	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: This is Commissioner
13	Reynolds. Vice Chair Thernstrom.
14	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes.
15	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Would we have enough
16	time to make that adjustment?
17	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Yes, isn't it easier
18	to do it my way and that way we may not have to call a
19	telephone meeting if we can't schedule the witnesses;
20	whereas your way we're certain to have to schedule it
21	if we can't get the witnesses?
22	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, we would
23	have enough time provided that the staff director can
24	decide.

19	have jurisdiction possibly on two points. First is
20	the administration of justice. It strikes me that at
21	least debating the proposition that immigration laws
22	of the country are being enforced. And whether or not
23	that's a matter of policy or not, I'm agnostic. But
24	to the extent they're not and they have an impact on a
25	particular community that is a protected class over
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which we may have jurisdiction I think we have jurisdiction.

3 The second is with respect to -- we don't 4 often have visions or assurances on the impact of 5 or practices on certain protected either policies 6 classes and here whether it's a policy or a practice, 7 I'm not sure. But it's one or the other and I do think it has an impact or it may have. We'll see. 8 9 There is at least in the -- reports out there from 10 some credible sources that I've seen that suggest that 11 there is an impact on black workers or low income 12 workers passed the other protected classes. The reason I used -- cohort is I thought we might be able 13 14 to more ably get our arms around that. That's why I chose black workers. 15

VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: It's a disparate impact issue as does the area that immigrants have a disparate impact on equal employment opportunity of African Americans in this country. That seems to me a legitimate Commission topic.

21 COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Wouldn't that 22 apply not just to African Americans, but to everybody 23 in general?

VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, it may have.
 We have -- I don't want to speak for Commissioner

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1	Kirsanow here, but we do have disparities already
2	in wages and wealth between African Americans and
3	other groups in this society. So the question is
4	whether the immigrant population, the integral
5	immigrant population, is continuing to is
6	increasing the problem of reinforcing the problem
7	of those disparities.
8	Commissioner Kirsanow, do you want to
9	expand on that?
10	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: I'm not sure what
11	the question was, but if I understood it, it's why
12	it's not expanded to other categories.
13	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Commissioner
14	Melendez says, well, look, integral immigrants may
15	have an impact on everybody's wages and
16	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: I think that it
17	would be disparate for us to do a credible job on
18	expanding this to every protected class. That's why I
19	thought that using the category of black workers is
20	something we could get our arms around and in addition
21	because I haven't seen at least in a casual view of
22	the literature out there an studies that have been
23	done with respect to the impact of illegal immigration
24	on other protected classes. I am aware of that some
25	studies at least have attempted to address the issue

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1	with respect to black workers.
2	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes, and I would
3	second that. There is quite a bit of scholarship on

4 COMMISSIONER YAKI: Ι think that the 5 statements made by Commissioner Gaziano sort of says it all and that is that if the Staff Director halted 6 action on the April 11th scheduled briefing in favor of 7 finding out if there are speakers available for an 8 9 April briefing on this particular topic then it's a question about why similar calls couldn't have been 10 made about whether the April briefing speakers would 11 12 have been available as well in the case that we did not approve this. It's just an observation at this 13 14 point. You know, you guys are going to do this. Ι 15 just want to get a vote and get it over with.

16 COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I didn't hear him 17 actually say he called the witnesses. Maybe that's 18 wrong. I don't know what preliminarily he did. But I 19 just wanted the record to reflect and he can correct 20 me, but I don't know that calls have actually been 21 made.

22 COMMISSIONER YAKI: I thought I heard the 23 word "calls."

24DR. LERNER: For the previously scheduled25briefing or for the one that's proposed to change?

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1	What are we talking about?
2	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I don't know that
3	that's necessary. I'm just saying that I don't
4	understand that. If you want to clarify it, then
5	you're welcome to.
6	DR. LERNER: Well, we've done a little bit
7	of work on the scheduled topic but we haven't formally
8	invited anybody or anything like that.
9	COMMISSIONER YAKI: But you have made
10	inquiries as to whether people would be available,
11	correct?
12	DR. LERNER: Actually not. We have
13	basically canvassed who would be an appropriate
14	speaker. That's as far as we have gotten.
15	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Okay.
16	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: All right, can we
17	have a vote on this? It's the Heriot motion, I
18	believe, that we are voting on. Do you want to
19	restate it?
20	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Okay, I move that we
21	hold a briefing in the April slot April 4^{th} on the
22	subject that was previously specified in
23	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Illegal immigration
24	and employment opportunities of black workers.
25	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: And that if we are
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1	unable to schedule speakers for the April meeting,
2	that we alternatively hold that briefing in the May
3	meeting slot and move the May business meeting to the
4	April meeting slot.
5	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Right. Is there
6	any further discussion of this or can we vote on it
7	now?
8	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: I had a question.
9	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: We need a second.
10	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: Second
11	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: We have a second.
12	Go on.
13	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Yes, isn't that a
14	real short time frame, now that you're saying April
15	4 th .
16	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: We have just
17	discussed and nauseam this question and Commissioner
18	Heriot's motion takes care of that problem.
19	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: But my concern,
20	also just for the record, is that we just received
21	this list for 2009, I believe, all these priorities
22	for topics and briefings and
23	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: But we've put that
24	off.
25	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: I understand that,
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1	but even when we scheduled for this year, we took a
2	lot of time in setting priorities. We picked the top
3	three all of us and we finally out of dozens of topics
4	get it down and not only that. Because the budget
5	plays into this because I still haven't had an answer
6	whether or not as Staff Director Marcus said that, one
7	of the statements, was that we could end up cutting
8	down to three briefings for 2008. So it makes it even
9	more important as to what three would we actually
10	listen to and if this was one of them, it sure would
11	be important to me to go back and analyze and try to
12	throw my contact with Staff Director and throw one of
13	mine that I think should replace the April meeting.
14	So I'm just saying in the fairness of how
15	to go about doing it anyone of us could connect the
16	Staff Director and say, "Start doing some research so
17	I can present it" and I would be competing to get Mr.
18	Kirsanow's topic also. That's the only point I'm
19	making. It's kind of like we are just interjecting
20	really not consistent with the way the process runs
21	and all the work we get in to prioritizing our top
22	three and all that stuff.
23	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: There is a problem
24	here. There's been a problem of deciding topics too
25	far in advance. We have taken care of that.
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1	The second thing is there is a motion
2	on the floor. It has been seconded and we need to
3	vote on it. All in favor of Commissioner Heriot's
4	motion.
5	(Chorus of ayes.)
6	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Nay.
7	COMMISSIONER YAKI: No.
8	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Commissioner
9	Taylor, are you on?
10	(No verbal response.)
11	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: We lost you? I
12	think Commissioner Taylor is now not participating in
13	the meeting or at least not at this moment and so the
14	ayes do prevail and there were two no.
15	So then we move onto the June briefing and
16	I would like a motion that the briefing on the Patriot
17	Act as it applies to anti-Arab and anti-Muslim
18	discriminations currently scheduled for June 6, 2008
19	be cancelled. The Commission instead will consider a
20	briefing on the efforts of the Justice Department to
21	monitor voting rights enforcement for the 2008
22	Presidential election which I believe was Commissioner
23	Yaki's suggested topic.
24	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Yes.
25	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: So is there a
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1	second on that?
2	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Second it.
3	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: And let's have a
4	discussion on that.
5	COMMISSIONER YAKI: The reason, Madam
6	Chair, that I put this out there was (1), and again
7	Commissioner Gaziano was not here at the time, when we
8	were discussing the briefings for June with the former
9	staff director, I think Commissioner Heriot was here,
10	we were talking about the fact that the June 6^{th}
11	briefing may have had substantial overlap with the
12	domestic surveillance briefing that we had earlier in
13	2005. And in the informal agreement that had been
14	worked out in terms of the Democratic members being
15	able to have a briefing scheduled of their choosing on
16	the calendar that we would have the discretion to
17	substitute. Rather than inject anything overtly
18	partisan, I thought that instead we should simply look
19	at the issues in a preemptive manner of voting rights
20	enforcement for the 2008 presidential election because
21	that is obviously going to be a very interesting and
22	exciting topic.
23	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Anybody else?
24	Yes, Commissioner Gaziano.
25	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: A couple of
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1 questions. Let me just ask you about the topic 2 first. Well actually, let the record reflect that we 3 don't need to say very much, that Ι think this 4 informal agreement as you refer to, this set-aside for 5 certain members of certain political parties is not 6 consistent with the best policies of the commission. 7 But if it is, then I want to know when I get my hearing. And I don't know if Commissioner Heriot may 8 want to know when she gets her hearing, but if it is a 9 10 sort of ideological set-aside, I have a different kind 11 of concern with that. But let me just ask you to 12 elaborate -- the Justice Department is doing great work enforcing the Voting Rights Act, so what is your 13 purpose in devoting commission time, money and energy 14 15 on highlighting their good work. 16 COMMISSIONER YAKI: Well I suppose that any 17 more than highlighting a racially charged issue such as illegal immigration and their impact on jobs. 18 This 19 would have -- the impact would actually have the 20 opposite impact which is that despite your exact 21 characterization which may be correct about what Justice is or is not doing with regard to the voting 22

right enforcement I think the question is not what their performance is but really what they see the trouble issues are, potential issues, what states are

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1 places that they think special attention should be 2 played, where there have been problem opportunities in 3 the past. There have been numerous allegations made 4 about polling places in Ohio in 2004 presidential 5 election. There are questions that abound with regard 6 to how local registrars work and interpret.

7 This is not meant as an attack on the Justice Department. It is meant more for the Justice 8 9 Department to illuminate us and the Congress and other they 10 effected people, sort of what areas are highlighting, what areas they are focusing on and 11 12 quite frankly if there are those with differing opinions on where that emphasis should be they would 13 14 be part of the hearing as well.

15 COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Since we don't have 16 a concept paper, if we're going to vote on this at 17 all --

18 COMMISSIONER YAKI: We do have a concept 19 paper. Richard, do you want to pass this out? That 20 we have.

21 COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I'd like to look at 22 the concept paper, but do I have your personal 23 agreement that I get to pick a hearing, either later 24 this year, or before it's your turn again?

COMMISSIONER YAKI: I have no problems

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1	with that, Commissioner. The fact is that
2	Commissioner Melendez and I come to agreement on what
3	we would ask for in terms of our briefings, when we've
4	had situations where briefings had to be cut back, and
5	whenever those couldn't get in, then we would make a
6	decision which one would proceed. I mean, it's
7	something that
8	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Actually, I think
9	it makes no sense for you to agree to that, to mine.
10	But I might want to exercise that if
11	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, we have not
12	agreed as a Committee on how to proceed going forward.
13	Let's put that off for another day.
14	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I'm just raising
15	the issue that I do want to
16	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I mean, if your view
17	is simply that whatever ideological event you have to
18	simply be the turn of every single hearing that we
19	have, that's fine, if you just want to eliminate it to
20	our ability to have any that's fine, if that's what
21	you're stating, go ahead and do that. I was
22	proceeding under a set of understandings that we
23	worked with the Chairman, Commissioner Taylor,
24	Commissioner Kirsanow, Commissioner Braceras, and
25	Commissioner Thernstrom. You, obviously, have a
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1	different you have your own way of doing about
2	it. Whatever you want to do, fine. Fine with me.
3	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I want to take up
4	your topic on the merits, too. Did you email this to
5	the other Commissioners on the call?
6	COMMISSIONER YAKI: No, we just brought it
7	up. Wait, wait, wait. On the other on the
8	however, the subject matter was emailed, the first
9	paragraph was pretty much emailed in my proposed
10	motions email of last week.
11	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I don't think this
12	content was in your proposed email. I can pull it out
13	and
14	(Simultaneous speakers.)
15	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Commissioner
16	Taylor is back on the line. We've got a full
17	complement.
18	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Could we email this
19	to the other Commissioners.
20	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Sure.
21	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: And perhaps move
22	another month while we all have an opportunity to
23	consider it? I'm just asking if that would be
24	inconvenient for anyone.
25	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Actually, Commissioner
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1	Thernstrom, I guess Commissioner Gaziano raises a
2	good point. And because we have just heard from the
3	delegated authority's system staff director that it
4	only takes a month to put together a briefing, I'm
5	willing to table discussion of this until the next
6	meeting. Okay? Does that meet with your approval,
7	Commissioner Gaziano?
8	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: It meets with mine,
9	if it meets with others.
10	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: This is Commissioner
11	Reynolds. I will defer to Commissioner Yaki on this
12	point. We do have an understanding this phone call
13	set aside, I believe this issue was raised by
14	Commissioner Braceras, the understanding was reached,
15	and while I do have concerns about it, it does have a
16	beneficial effect in that it assures that there is
17	diverse viewpoint, ideological viewpoint.
18	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Does it make more
19	sense to set it now?
20	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes. Commissioner
21	Yaki, I think you've got the votes for this briefing.
22	I mean, I don't like these set-asides period, and I
23	think we do need to address that whole question down
24	the road whether we go forward with this set-aside
25	arrangement. But I think you've got the votes, and it

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1	would be in the interest of the staff to simply
2	settle this.
3	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Otherwise, it will
4	just go on like another meeting.
5	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Today. I mean,
6	I'm going to support you on this topic.
7	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Well, I was just
8	trying to be accommodating to the new Commissioner.
9	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, I think the
10	new Commissioner
11	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I can if you
12	give me three minutes, I'll
13	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Let's vote on this.
14	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Commissioner
15	Heriot is saying let's vote on it. I suspect
16	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Why don't we proceed
17	to the SACs and get that over with.
18	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: We're not done with
19	this topic.
20	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: No, I want to get
21	done with this topic. I want to vote on this. I
22	think you've got your votes to hold this briefing.
23	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Fine. I'm ready for a
24	vote. And I think we may have a proposal for July
25	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Okay. Let us vote
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on this proposal, that the June 6th meeting will be 1 a briefing on the efforts of the Justice Department to 2 monitor 3 voting rights enforcement for the 2008 Presidential election. All in favor? 4 5 (Chorus of ayes.) CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Commissioner Reynolds, 6 7 aye. VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: And Taylor? 8 9 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Taylor, aye. 10 VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: And aye from me, as well. 11 12 COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Nay. VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: And Commissioner 13 14 Gaziano votes nay. So it has passed. That is going to be the June 6th briefing. And we can address in the 15 16 future, and I hope we will, the question of set-asides 17 for --COMMISSIONER YAKI: It's just a remedy for 18 19 disparate impact. COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Yes, for the record 20 21 I'd like to say that I basically object to set-asides. If there are going to be set-asides, I want my own 22 23 set-aside. 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1	this topic, what kind of evidence data we can rely,
2	whether we can rely upon, and how we can get our
3	arms around the whole subject. And, so I would just
4	like I'd like to stare as you are spinning this out
5	as interested as I am in that topic.
6	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Well, I can't write
7	something in right away.
8	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: No.
9	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I would much prefer
10	to have it voted on today, so that is not my
11	preference.
12	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Right. But we are
13	talking this time, we're talking about July. We do
14	have a little time. We could vote on that.
15	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Again, this is not
16	my preference.
17	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Would that be your
18	preference to every other topic that anyone else
19	suggests today for July?
20	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I do have a second
21	(Simultaneous speakers.)
22	COMMISSIONER YAKI: It's a business
23	meeting.
24	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: In July?
25	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Yes.
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1	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: That's why I want
2	it to be
3	COMMISSIONER YAKI: And then we're hitting
4	the magic four.
5	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes. Well,
6	depending on what happens with and the question is
7	whether we're going to need a business meeting in
8	July. I don't know.
9	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Well, I did propose
10	to you that I was willing to do this motion as a group
11	to include all the things that we have now approved.
12	And I didn't do that, because you didn't want me to.
13	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Yes. I think we
14	should have a vote on that. But it's also what is
15	this magic four? Does that include the statutory
16	report briefing? I didn't think so, so we've got now
17	one for April, you all approved one for June, or we
18	approved one for June with me voting in the negative.
19	This would be the third briefing for the year.
20	COMMISSIONER YAKI: No, but the fiscal
21	year started in October. We had a briefing in
22	December, as well.
23	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I would move to
24	reconsider the April motion then. In reliance upon
25	your statement, Abby, I shouldn't do this as a group,
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1	I didn't.
2	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, because I
3	thought we couldn't do it as a group. People had
4	views on individual topics that we had to allow a
5	discussion, we had to allow the discussion that has
6	taken place.
7	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: You didn't mention
8	that you were not in favor of doing this without a
9	written statement.
10	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Look, nobody has
11	to go along with me on this. I would like to see the
12	topic spelled out so that I can connect the dots and
13	see how we're going to do this, exactly. The rest of
14	the Commissioners are free to disagree with me on
15	this. I can't quite get my arms around
16	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Can I ask if we can
17	just vote to put it on, and then we can always take it
18	back off, if the concept paper isn't persuasive to us.
19	Would that be a satisfactory solution to the Chair?
20	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Sounds like a good
21	compromise.
22	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, I am just
23	told that July is traditionally the month when we take
24	a vote on the statutory report.
25	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Well, I assume we
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1	can take a vote on the statutory report after a
2	hearing, can we not? After a briefing, can we not?
3	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: That usually takes
4	a really long time. It's a big report. It's
5	complicated.
6	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Well, we did it by
7	telephone last time. And we didn't do it in July last
8	time.
9	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Several times.
10	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: And, again, I think
11	it's abusive to bring this up to me now.
12	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I don't know our
13	Chairman was joining in my compromise. My compromise
14	is that we vote today, we get the concept paper. And
15	we're always free at our next business meeting to
16	revise that if the concept paper is not persuasive. I
17	thought I heard Chairman Reynolds
18	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: It's a compromise in
19	words, and provides us with the flexibility to really
20	look at the issue. If for whatever reason any the
21	majority of Commissioners have a problem with the idea
22	as spelled out on paper, we would have the flexibility
23	to revisit the issue. At the same time, though, we
24	could move forward.
25	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Commissioner Yaki.
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1	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: And we could
2	also move the date of this July hearing, possibly, if
3	that becomes an issue.
4	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: That is correct.
5	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Commissioner Yaki.
6	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Yes, Madam Vice Chair.
7	My question when we talked about one of the
8	reasons I voted for the motion to table the
9	discussions on the 2010, 2009, and the 2008 briefing
10	schedules had to do with the issue of resource
11	allocation, timeliness, ripeness, staleness. One of
12	the things that we found is that we have sometimes
13	we just decide to do topics like when we voted on the
14	Patriot Act issue, and that's superseded by other
15	events. I assume that's the rationale behind the
16	April briefing, and perhaps for the proposed July
17	issue, as well.
18	But I would just like to say that if the
19	issue is one of submitting concept papers for
20	consideration at the next meeting, I would be in favor
21	of that, because there are other issues and briefings
22	that I believe are of a timely nature that I would
23	like to see the Commission consider as a whole, which
24	I think are non-partisan, which are within our
25	statutory mandate. And if we're going to be starting

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1	to add or change around briefings for the remainder
2	of the year, I would like that to be in the context of
3	everyone having the opportunity to do that, rather
4	than just simply one topic you would consider for
5	July.
6	There are issues that one of the, I
7	think, serious issues that I think that we need to
8	look at, and probably should have looked at a long
9	time ago is the what appears to be, and maybe I'm
10	wrong - but just simply by looking at the reading
11	the news, and other kinds of reports, the issue of,
12	for example, racism on college campuses that stems
13	beyond anti-semitism, but to issues where people are
14	holding parodies of Martin Luther King Day, where
15	there are hate topics, not hate topics, hate crimes
16	being committed by people of all races against others.
17	It's something that I think is extremely important and

23 COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Could you yield for24 a minute to my question to you?

I would rather --

COMMISSIONER YAKI: Yes. I will yield.

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timely. And although it's not directly connected,

that we know of, to the two campus hearings yesterday,

I think that it's something that's very important.

And I would want to present a concept paper for it, as

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well.

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1	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I'm very
2	interested in that topic. Would you consider
3	substituting the campus racism topic for the DOJ?
4	COMMISSIONER YAKI: No, because I think
5	the DOJ
6	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Okay. I want the
7	record to reflect that you have now that you've
8	gotten your DOJ one, you're promoting one that I find
9	more interesting.
10	(Simultaneous speakers.)
11	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I'm taking back the
12	floor from you.
13	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Certainly, go
14	ahead.
15	COMMISSIONER YAKI: The I'm not going
16	to sit here and defend one a priority, and the other
17	is not. I do believe that the 2008 election as it
18	pertains to
19	(Static interference.)
20	COMMISSIONER YAKI: campus racism is
21	one that I believe is not partisan, is one that I
22	would bring up for the entire Commission to look at.
23	There are others, as well, and I would just propose
24	that if we're looking at first of all, I think
25	there are two questions that have to be asked. One,
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1	if we're refiguring our 2008, I think that we
2	should do it all at one time for the remainder to
3	decide, but what is out there, when is the
4	(Static interference.)
5	COMMISSIONER YAKI: And, number two, and
6	more importantly is, I think the Staff Director has to
7	do an analysis before we commit ourselves any further
8	as to what are resources available for the remainder
9	of the year through October. It's not December, it's
10	the end of September, that we have resources for. And
11	I would just put that out there.
12	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Commissioners
13	Kirsanow, Taylor, and the Chairman, do you have
14	anything to say on this whole question?
15	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: I guess I have mixed
16	feelings. The bottom line is, a Commissioner is free
17	to submit a concept paper, and submit a motion asking
18	to replace the scheduled briefings, so I am
19	comfortable with Commissioners Yaki and Heriot
20	circulating concept papers, and at least in the case
21	of Commissioner Yaki, then having a I assume he
22	would move to replace a scheduled briefing with one
23	that he's recommending.
24	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, we're
25	talking about July here. We don't have any concept
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1	paper, I believe, for either topic.
2	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Nor a briefing
3	schedule for that.
4	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Madam Chairman, can
5	I ask, I suppose maybe it's the Acting Staff Director
6	one question. Is it conceivable that we have money in
7	the budget for a September briefing? What is your
8	best thought?
9	STAFF DIRECTOR LERNER: Actually, in the
10	schedule that was handed out by the previous Staff
11	Director, there is a September briefing.
12	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: If we have a July
13	briefing, and a business meeting at the same time, is
14	there enough money in the budget to do a briefing in
15	September?
16	STAFF DIRECTOR LERNER: I'm not 100
17	percent certain. I'd have to find out. I think so.
18	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I thought that was

7	say it before, but I didn't.

16	I've got your name wrong, Jonathan D. Orent, James
17	Vincent, Darrell Waldron. And once again, these
18	members will serve as uncompensated government
19	employees. The Commission appreciates the hard work
20	they will, no doubt, contribute to the SAC. Under
21	this motion, the Commission authorizes the Office of
22	Staff Director to execute the appropriate paperwork
23	for the appointment. So I need a second on the Rhode
24	Island SAC.
25	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Commissioner Reynolds,

1	second.
2	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Okay. Any
3	discussion? Hearing none, all in favor?
4	(Chorus of ayes.)
5	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Commissioner Reynolds,
6	aye.
7	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: Kirsanow,
8	absolutely, unequivocally, definitively yes.
9	(Laughter.)
10	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: Yaki is not the
11	only one
12	(Laughter.)
13	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: It's only the
14	double negatives that turn affirmative. The double
15	affirmatives don't turn negative, so it's only the
16	double negatives I have a concern with.
17	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Commissioner Yaki,
18	are you on the phone? Commissioner Yaki?
19	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Yes.
20	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Have you voted?
21	Oh, you voted yes. There's a unanimous
22	COMMISSIONER YAKI: No, you asked is
23	Commissioner Yaki on the phone.
24	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Oh.
25	COMMISSIONER YAKI: To which I answered
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	184
1	yes.
2	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: How do you vote,
3	Commissioner Yaki?
4	COMMISSIONER YAKI: On Rhode Island
5	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Now, don't break
6	your record.
7	COMMISSIONER YAKI: No, I think I will
8	holding my nose vote yes.
9	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: And would you like
10	_
11	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Now we closed the
12	voting. No, this is Commissioner Reynolds. Are you
13	holding your nose because you're voting with the
14	majority, or is the problem with the candidates?
15	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I leave that to your
16	interpretation.
17	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: You don't ask why.
18	We have a unanimous vote on the Rhode Island SAC.
19	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: They'll be glad to
20	hear that.
21	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: And we move on to
22	the Texas SAC. And I move
23	COMMISSIONER YAKI: This will not be
24	unanimous.
25	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I thought you had
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1	had an episode here that wasn't going to last long.
2	I move the Commission re-charter the Texas SAC.
3	Under this motion, the Commission appoints the
4	following individuals to that Committee based on the
5	recommendations of the Office of Staff Director;
6	Russell B. Casey recommended as Chair, Elise M. Allen,
7	Charles Z. Burchett, Bill Calhoun, Lisa A. Callahan,
8	Francis A. Connot, Jason P. Casales, Cecilia R.
9	Castilio, Norvell D. Glenn, Vino M. Granya, Merrill
10	Matthews, Harriet Miller, Martha Orosko, Bobby Singe,
11	Leslie G. Carroll, Barbara J. Walters, and if I've
12	pronounced anybody's name wrong, please forgive me
13	once again. These members will serve as uncompensated
14	government employees. The Commission appreciates the
15	hard work they will, no doubt, contribute to the SAC.
16	Under this motion, the Commission authorizes the
17	Office of Staff Director to execute the appropriate
18	paperwork for the appointment. So I am making a
19	motion, and I need a second.
20	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Reynolds, and I second
21	the motion.
22	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Okay. Discussion.
23	We've certainly got discussion, I've already
24	understood from Commissioner Yaki.
25	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Madam Chair?
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1	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes.
2	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Could the Staff
3	Director illuminate me about the qualification of
4	Russell Casey?
5	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: He's putting on
6	his microphone.
7	STAFF DIRECTOR LERNER: Would it be more
8	appropriate for Chris?
9	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Whoever.
10	STAFF DIRECTOR LERNER: Okay. Judge Casey
11	is a Justice for the Peace in Tarrant County, Texas.
12	He's also on the Real Estate Advisory Board, and has
13	been active in a number of capacities. He has been on
14	the City of Hurst Traffic Commission, the HEBISD
15	District Level Improvement Committee, Tarrant County
16	Election Judge, Delegate to the State Republican
17	Convention, Member of MENSA, Northern Tarrant County
18	Right-to-Life Education Advisory Board, Tarrant County
19	College Real Estate Advisory Board, and past
20	Republican Representative of the Tarrant County
21	Elections Signor Verification Committee.
22	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Okay. So what are his
23	qualifications, again to sit on a State Advisory
24	Committee for Civil Rights, other than the Right-to-
25	Life group?
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1	STAFF DIRECTOR LERNER: He's a Justice
2	of the Peace, and I consider that
3	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: He's done election
4	process
5	STAFF DIRECTOR LERNER: He's actually done
6	quit a bit about elections and election process, which
7	I think does, indeed, qualify him to be on this
8	Committee.
9	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Other discussion?
10	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: Yes. Commissioner
11	Melendez
12	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Are you serious,
13	that's your rationale?
14	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: We're proposing
15	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: We're serious.
16	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: To be the chair?
17	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Well, he's your guy.
18	Don't hold me accountable for him.
19	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Thank you, emphatic
20	no.
21	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Commissioner
22	Melendez.
23	COMMISSIONER MELENDEZ: The proposal is to
24	have him to become the Chairman of the SAC. Is that
25	right? Okay. I just, for the record, this lady by
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I	

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1	the name of Mara Orosko, she's one of the returning
2	members of the SAC, so she would have been a good
3	Chairwoman.
4	The other issue is the Mr. Lino Graglia.
5	Is he taken off, or is he still on there, because my
6	understanding was that he had already served on, for
7	13 years on the Texas SAC from 1985-1998.
8	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: What are the rules
9	about coming back after an absence? We don't seem to
10	know whether that conflicts with any rule that the
11	Commission has established. Evidently, the question
12	of a break in service has not been addressed. It
13	should be.
14	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Do we have the
15	wording of the rule?
16	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: We can take a vote
17	today, and if there is and look into this question.
18	And if there is a violation of the term limit, he has
19	to step down off the SAC. I suspect there will not be
20	any language that's going to answer the question for
21	us.
22	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: There might be.
23	There are also cases on this.
24	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, we can look
25	into it. We can vote on this pending inquiry into the
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1	question of term limits, and if Professor Graglia
2	runs into a problem, Professor Graglia then steps off
3	the SAC.
4	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I think we're going
5	to have to rebalance the SAC. Maybe what we should do
6	is vote pending whether or not this is a problem. And
7	if it is a problem, then we've got to rebalance the
8	SAC, rather than just have a SAC without Lino Graglia.
9	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Why is one person
10	stepping down going to weigh the balance of, any of
11	you?
12	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: He's a pretty
13	assertive guy. I think it's a different SAC without
14	Lino Graglia.
15	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Pardon me?
16	COMMISSIONER YAKI: What balance, we want
17	view point balance.
18	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: I'm sorry. What?
19	COMMISSIONER YAKI: We want view point
20	balance.
21	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Ideological.
22	COMMISSIONER YAKI: We definitely want
23	view point balance. I don't know that that's a
24	problem.
25	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: A lot of outspoken
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1	people on this SAC.
2	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I don't know which
3	way they're speaking, though.
4	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well
5	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I'm happy to vote
6	for it now.
7	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: What would you
8	like to do, Commissioner Heriot?
9	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: One possibility is
10	just to vote for it pending whether or not this is, in
11	fact, a problem. If it is, find a substitute for him,
12	and we go back
13	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: How is that
14	different from what I just suggested?
15	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: I thought you were
16	suggesting that the SAC would carry on without a
17	substitute for him.
18	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Well, we can
19	always add people to these SACS. But, fine, I'm happy
20	to go along with then that's a seat that we have to
21	find a substitute for. That's fine. I'd like to move
22	that we approve this SAC, but that Professor Graglia's
23	appointment to the SAC is dependent, his continued
24	service on the SAC is dependent upon the outcome of
25	research on breaks in research on the question of
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1	term limits, and that if he cannot serve, we find a
2	substitute. Got a second on that?
3	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Taylor, second.
4	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Okay. All in
5	favor?
6	(Chorus of ayes.)
7	CHAIRMAN REYNOLDS: Reynolds, aye.
8	COMMISSIONER KIRSANOW: Kirsanow, aye.
9	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Taylor, aye.
10	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: And let the record
11	show that Commissioner Melendez is opposed. And we
12	are and Commissioner
13	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Wait, wait, wait.
14	Hello!
15	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes, I was about
16	to say you weren't on it, but you are.
17	COMMISSIONER YAKI: Commissioner Yaki says
18	no way, partner.
19	COMMISSIONER HERIOT: Commissioner Yaki,
20	is that the best you could do on that one? You're not
21	helping yourself.
22	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes. Commissioner
23	Yaki, I was
24	COMMISSIONER YAKI: I'm in the middle of
25	talking to
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1	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Yes, I was
2	about to say Commissioner Yaki was not on the phone
3	for the record, but you are on the phone. I was not
4	overlooking you. I was about to announce your absence.
5	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: And he's worried
6	about the double negative, so I'm glad for that.
7	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Okay. I'm going
8	to move on. I move that the Commission re-charter the
9	Vermont State Advisory Committee. Under this motion,
10	the Commission appoints the following individuals to
11	the Committee based on the recommendations of the
12	Office of the Staff Director; Curtiss G. Reed,
13	recommended as Chair, Frances Bazluke, John H.
14	Bloomer, Luther M. Brown, Ellen Mercer Fallon, Ann H.
15	Hagman, Leslie Ann Holman, Gary A. Kowalski, Terrance

19	Stewart R. Wood. And, again, my apologies to anybody
20	whose name I got wrong. These members will serve as

15	- I buried some of my papers. What's the number that							
16	we're voting on today, the total number?							
17	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Of this SAC?							
18	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: Yes.							
19	VICE CHAIR THERNSTROM: Seventeen. The							
20	previous SAC had 14.							
21	COMMISSIONER GAZIANO: I just understand
