






Senior Volunteers Trained as Trainers – 17,830

GRANTEE ACCOMPLISHMENTS (Continued)

Complaints Referred for Follow-Up - 2,350

 Documented Medicare & Medicaid Savings – \$51 million

 Contributed to Cutting the Error Rate in Half – Saving Billions of Dollars

NATIONAL ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Medicare Error Rate Cut in Half Since 1996
 - FY 1996 14% or \$23.2 billion in Improper Payments
 - FY 2000 **6.8%** or \$11.9 Billion in Improper Payments
- FY 2000 More Than 1,600 Individuals/Entities Excluded Due to Fraud or Abuse
- FY 2000 213 Criminal Convictions; 209 Civil Actions
