



## Click It or Ticket 2008 Quick Facts: Enforce Belt Laws, Save Lives, Make a Difference

Gunfire. Gangs. Stolen vehicles. Armed robbery. As a law enforcement officer, you see it all — and then some. One thing is certain, as the annual *Click It or Ticket* national campaign rolls around this May, you are sure to have more than enough to do in one shift. So where does seat belt enforcement fit in?

## Consider this ...

- The scope of the problem 42,642 people were killed on our Nation's highways in 2006; for young people ages 2 through 34, motor vehicle crashes are currently the leading cause of death, far outpacing crime and disease-related causes.
- Frequency of unbelted deaths as compared to homicide In 2006, approximately 17,000 homicides were reported in the United States, while in the same year, nearly 16,000 passenger vehicle occupants killed in crashes were not buckled up.
- An effective solution Worn correctly, seat belts reduce the risk of fatal injury by 45 percent for front-seat passenger car occupants and by 60 percent for pickup truck, SUV, and minivan occupants.
- **Thousands can be saved** An estimated 15,383 lives were saved by seat belt use in 2006; during the five-year period from 2002 through 2006, seat belts are estimated to have saved the lives of 76,000 people.
- History shows enforcement works High-visibility enforcement of seat belt laws, such as the annual Click It or Ticket mobilization, has been highly effective at raising the seat belt usage rate: the national usage rate increased from 58 percent in 1994 to 82 percent in 2007.
- **Too many still haven't gotten the message** Nearly one-fifth (18%) of motor vehicle occupants still do not buckle up: nighttime drivers, young males, and teens are among those least likely to wear seat belts, which greatly increases the risk of death for these groups.

## What you can do ...

- Renew your support With so many lives at stake, re-commit now to enforcing belt laws and converting the high-risk 18 percent who still don't take these laws seriously.
- Enforce belt laws day AND night In 2006, less than half (46%) of the passenger vehicle occupants killed during the day were unrestrained by seat belts while almost two-thirds (64%) of the passenger vehicle occupants killed during the night were unrestrained by seat belts.
- Take action this May Join thousands of your fellow officers across the country who will again be out on the streets enforcing belt laws during the annual *Click It or Ticket* national mobilization this May 19 June 1, 2008.

The bottom line? We need you to make the 2008 *Click It or Ticket* campaign a success. With paid advertisements and earned media coverage, the public knows about the planned mobilization. But all the hoopla amounts to nothing without strong belt law enforcement by officers like **YOU**.
