Dear Director Gilleran:

Please allow this letter to serve as the formal statement of opposition to the proposed rules changes to the Community Reinvestment Act proposed by your office. The undersigned members of the New York State Assembly are joining with the hundreds of other concerned Americans that have asked your office to withdraw the proposals listed above.

The reasons for our objections are clear and we believe are in the best interest of low- and moderate-income communities across the State of New York. Of utmost importance is our belief that your proposals will result in considerably less community development financing and basic banking services to hundreds of communities across New York.

We are considerably troubled by the Office of Thrift Supervision's plan to allow thrift institutions to design their own watered-down Community Reinvestment Act (CRA) exams. We are concerned that thrifts will eliminate the investment and service parts of the CRA exam, meaning that you would not require them to make investments in or provide branches to low-and moderate-income communities.

At stake is the loss of a community-building tool that has helped improve the lives of millions of New Yorkers in low- and moderate-income communities. Without a strong CRA, we will see depressed communities across New York, suffering an exodus of traditional banks and an explosion of predatory mortgage lenders and abusive payday lenders filling the void left by the banks.

Your proposal threatens to eliminate the investment and service tests presently required by CRA and would reduce the level of community development financing because these tests hold banks accountable for making critical investments and services available in low- and moderate-income communities.

The investment test requires banks to make investments in affordable housing via instruments like Low-Income Housing Tax Credits, in sewer and infrastructure projects via state or municipal bond issues, and in community facilities like child care centers and health clinics. In New York City alone, 24,146 apartments were funded by Low Income Housing Tax Credits.

The service test requires banks to build and maintain branches in low- and moderate-income communities and to offer affordable banking services like deposit accounts and remittances.

We strongly urge you to withdraw your proposal. It is an ill-conceived policy shift that will create economic havoc on low- and moderate-income communities across New York State.
