Protect America's Oceans and Marine Fish Populations - Withdraw Flawed Environmental Review Proposed Rule

Dear Dr. Balsiger,

We the undersigned organizations represent millions of Americans who are commercial fishermen, seafood consumers, environmentalists, divers, beach lovers, anglers, scientists, boaters, surfers, and sailors. Above all, we are Americans who deeply value our country's natural heritage and the bedrock environmental laws that seek to protect this heritage for the future – especially the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). For us, NEPA compliance is crucial for ensuring that our nation's oceans are sustainably managed by requiring fishery managers to thoroughly consider potential impacts of their actions before proceeding, and giving individuals and local communities a voice in management decisions.

We are calling on you to withdraw your proposed NEPA regulations because they do not meet these critical criteria. When Congress reauthorized the Magnuson-Stevens Act (MSA) in 2006, it directed the National Marine Fisheries Service to update its environmental review procedures for compliance with NEPA and the regulations of the Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ). Unfortunately, the proposed regulations NMFS has produced fail to comply with this Congressional directive and would instead seriously weaken environmental review and public participation in fisheries management.

The proposed NEPA rule:

- > Invents a complicated new process to replace environmental impact statements, effectively discarding thirty years of established case law and practice by managers and the public.
- Allows individuals with financial interests to control the environmental review and public participation process. The proposed rule enables the regional fishery management councils a majority of whose appointed members have financial interests in the fisheries they manage to control the environmental review and public participation process.
- > Enables fishery managers to circumvent environmental review with new loopholes.
