show focused on *Radiology and Research* – *The Next Generation*.




Baltimore

Activities included oral presentations by administrators and researchers, posters and video displays, refreshments, clinical exam demonstrations, and dissemination of research studies, papers, and publications.

The **Bronx** celebrated research day on April 22nd. Opening remarks were presented by Dr. Mary Sano, Director of the Center's Research and Development Program, followed by twelve research presentations in the afternoon. A tour of the Research Building was conducted at the end of the day.

Cincinnati's research day was reported as a great success. Celebrated on April 24th, their annual research fair began with a breakfast at 8 a.m. in the auditorium, followed by award presentations to all research committee members. Exhibits, posters, and videos were displayed describing the center's ongoing research programs. *Congressman Steve Chabot* addressed the audience and appraised the VAMC for all its efforts to support veterans and a successful research program. A tour of the newly opened General Clinical Research Center was available to all who attended.



Cincinnati

At the VAMC in **Columbia**, Missouri, research posters were displayed in hallways throughout the research area during research week. Tours were also conducted of the newly opened research laboratory sections.

Staff filled the auditorium at the **Gainesville** VA medical center to hear research presentations on April 21st. "Inside the Brain" was presented by three research investigators and included the topics of how to use MRI imaging to see brain function in psychiatric illnesses (Dr. Lewis Baxter); reorganization of brain systems during language rehabilitation (Dr. Bruce Crosson); and, new methods of seizure prediction in eplipsy (Dr. Chris Sackellares). An hour training credit was awarded to employees who attended the seminar. In addition, research posters lined the auditorium walls and refreshments were served.



Gainesville

A total of thirteen research posters were displayed in the auditorium at the **Houston** VAMC. A suspended treadmill, used in a rehabilitation research study, was demonstrated in the hospital lobby. Refreshments were served and a one-hour education credit was given to employees who scanned their badges. Dr. Nelda Wray spoke about the new directions for VA research, followed by a speech by *Congressman Chris Bell*. Dr. Laurence McCullough presented *Ethical Challenges in Laboratory and Clinical Research*.



Houston

Research day was celebrated on May 2nd at the **Miami** VA medical center to coincide with the 50th anniversary of their affiliation with the University of Miami. It was also the official opening of the new General Clinical Research Center. Speakers for the occasion noted the importance this center will bring in helping to rapidly transfer clinical research results into patient care.

"Identify the VA research star" was the name of a poster contest at the Louisville VA. The correct entry won a \$20 gift certificate to the local T.G.I. Friday's. In addition, research accomplishments were listed daily during VA research week on their e-mail news announcements. A research open house was held at both Pittsburgh VA medical centers. In addition, researchers were available at information tables to discuss their research with other staff and veterans. Additional research educational materials and handouts were available to attendees. An appreciation luncheon was held on Friday for all research coordinators.

The seventh annual luncheon in honor of veterans at the **Richmond** VAMC took place on April 25th. This event is a part of research week that highlights researchers' and administrators' gratitude to veterans for their participation in research studies. Patients and doctors mingle to discuss various research studies. They found it works much better than formal presentations and information dissemination. Vendor exhibits also provide stimulating dialogue with veteran subjects and their families.

The **Salisbury**, North Carolina, research service sponsored a 'lunch and learn' lecture series by local researchers. Daily e-mails reported on local projects during research week and a sign was placed on the medical center marquee.

The second annual research training day was held at the **San Diego** Healthcare System on April 2nd. More than 450 investigators, research staff, and lab technicians attended. Hundreds of mandated training hours were logged into the medical center's tracking system.
