### Small Grants Program Sends Vets To Fatherhood Conference

From June 11-13, 2008, veterans Howard Anthony Cox and Jarma Henson attended the 10<sup>th</sup> Annual International Fatherhood Conference, "Reconnecting Fathers to Families: At Home and Abroad" at the Gallaudet University Kellogg Conference Hotel in Washington, D.C. With funding from the VISN-5 MIRECC Small Grant Program, the men participated in workshops and seminars as representatives of the VA Maryland Health Care System. They networked with other attendees and shared their experiences in combining fatherhood issues with the substance abuse recovery process. They returned with ideas, materials, and renewed energy to help other vets become better fathers. During an evening reception at the conclusion of the first day, Mr. Cox was presented with a "Favorite Father Award", recognizing him for exhibiting the qualities of responsible fatherhood.

## Patient-Centered Approach To Improve Screening For Metabolic Side Effects

Individuals with schizophrenia and other serious mental illnesses (SMI) have a mortality rate at least two times higher than persons without SMI, with the excess mortality largely attributed to higher rates of cardiovascular disease. Second-generation antipsychotic (SGA) medications, which include aripiprazole, clozapine, olanzapine, quetiapine, risperidone, and ziprasidone, are widely used to treat schizophrenia and other psychotic disorders. Although these medications are beneficial in treating symptoms such as hallucinations and delusions, several have been shown to induce

### National Mental Health Conference 2008

The "Continuing the Transformation of VA Mental Health Services: Bridging the Gaps" conference was held from July 21 to July 24, 2008, in Arlington, VA. This conference enabled key leaders, providers, researchers and educators to address implementation and evaluation aspects of the Uniform Mental Health Services in VA Medical Centers and Clinics. This national conference also afforded VHA researchers and clinicians the opportunity to identify strategies to improve the implementation and monitoring of innovative care across the continuum of VHA Mental Health Services.

The conference focused on increasing recovery oriented services, integrating care, promoting a national model for suicide risk identification and prevention, addressing the needs of returning soldiers and their families, preventing homelessness among veterans, increasing safety and access to care, and implementing evidence based treatments. It included several key note speakers, including Ira Katz, MD, Deputy Chief, Patient Care Services, Office for Mental Health, who discussed the Uniform Mental Health Services package, and Colonel Charles W. Hoge, MD, who discussed mental health issues among OEF/OIF returning veterans.

Mr. Cox co-leads a Father's Group in the intensive outpatient addictions program (the ACT Program) at the Baltimore VAMC and both he and Mr. Henson are leaders and members in the aftercare version of the Father's Group. The goals of the Father's Group include strengthening the bond between veterans and their children, breaking the cycle of non-involvement, re-establishing family connections by making amends, and developing meaningful and reliable fathering styles.

metabolic side effects such as weight gain, increases in blood glucose, and increases in cholesterol. These side effects may contribute to the high rates of cardiovascular disease observed in persons with SMI.

Despite the proliferation of clinical guidelines that recommend screening for weight gain and elevations in blood glucose and cholesterol in individuals prescribed SGAs, adherence to these guidelines is inadequate, representing a serious patient safety concern. A number of studies have shown that patient-centered care, characterized by an effective partnership between clinicians and patients that promotes participation by patients in their own care, improves health outcomes and satisfaction. The development of *MyHealtheVet*, an innovative, internet-based tool that enables VA patients to access their computerized medical records and to track their health outcomes, exemplifies the VA's commitment to patient-centered care.

Julie Kreyenbuhl, PharmD, PhD, recently received a Merit Award from the VA Health Service Research and Development Service to conduct an investigation of a computerized, patient-centered intervention aimed at increasing rates of screening for the metabolic side effects of SGAs. Half of the 240 study participants will view a brief computer program that provides personalized health information on how well their care adheres to guidelines for screening for the metabolic side effects of SGAs. The tool will be designed using principles shown to enhance understanding of internet websites by persons with cognitive impairments. The other half of participants will receive printed information on the metabolic side effects of SGAs and general recommendations for screening.

Participants will be exposed to the computerized intervention or written materials up to three times immediately prior to a visit with their prescribing clinician over the one-year study period. At the end of the study, the investigators will determine whether participants in the computer intervention have higher rates of appropriate screening compared to participants who receive written educational materials. Investigators will also study whether patterns of patient-prescriber communication around screening for metabolic side effects differs between the two groups of participants. This innovative aspect of the study will provide much needed information on the extent to which individuals with serious mental illnesses participate in their own medical care decisions.
