## MORE PEOPLE WORKING FOR MORE FISH

The National Fish Habitat Action Plan is a national investment strategy to maximize the impact of conservation dollars on the ground. Under the Action Plan, Federal, state and privately-raised funds will be the foundation for building regionalpartnerships that address the Nation's biggest fish habitat problems.

This is the most comprehensive effort ever attempted to address the causes of fish habitat decline, not just the symptoms.

# By 2010 the National Fish Habitat Action Plan will:

- Assess the condition of all fish habitats in the United States
- Prepare a Status of Fish Habitats in the United States Report
- •Establish 12 or more Fish Habitat Partnerships in priority areas
- Fund projects to protect, restore, and enhance priority habitats.

By 2015 the Action Plan will protect all healthy and intact fish habitats.

By 2020 the Action Plan will improve the condition of 90% of priority habitats and species targeted by Fish Habitat Partners.

#### **Success Stories**

## NFHAP ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The NFHAP Board held its first meeting during September, 2006. Since that time, a great deal has beenaccomplished in support of the National Fish Habitat Action Plan. Here are a few highlights:

#### Coordination

- •The 22-member Board has met a total of 12 times. It has approved a charter, developed an operational budget, and provided guidance on a many issues related to implementation of the Action Plan.
- •The Board's Legislative sub-committee is overseeing the development of draft legislation to authorize the work of, and funding for, the Action Plan through the offices of Senators Lieberman (CT) and Bond (MO) Kind (WI).

### Fish Habitat Partnerships

- •The FHP's are the foundational or core work units for implementing the Action Plan. To date, 20 FHP's have submitted letters of intent to seek full recognition by the Board and six of them have been formally endorsed by the Board (see next page for details).
- •The Board has developed guidance for the FHP's in terms of structure, administration, strategic planning, and science and outreach. The six approved FHP's are engaged with prioritizing projects for USFWS funding -- 3.2 million dollars was put on the ground in FY08.

#### Science and Data


- •The Science and Data Committee has drafted the report, "The Framework for Assessing the Nation's Fish Habitat." The final draft will be presented to the Board at its October meeting.
- •The Science and Research Data Team Committee, in collaboration with Michigan State University, is hard at work developing a national assessment of aquatic habitat condition. The first assessment, which includes both freshwater and coastal systems will be completed in 2010. The framework prototype for the assessment will be completed this Fall.

#### **Communications**

- •The Board has hired a Communications Director and recently unveiled a brand new web site.
- •NFHAP signage has been devleoped and has become the feature focus of the National Casting Call which included the presentation of First Annual NFHAP Awards.
- •The Board has also announced the second "10 Waters to Watch" continuing the initiative established in 2007, generating Nationwide media attention.

#### PARTNERSHIPS BUILT ON SUCCESS

Regional Fish Habitat Partnerships are the work units of the Action plan. This is where it all happens - the assessment of regional needs, the planning and prioritization, and the leveraging of resources to implement local projects to protect, restore, or enhance fish habitat and population. National efforts logistical and some financial support for the Partnerships, but decisions are always made at the regional level.

The Action Plan envisions 12 Fish Habitat Partnerships by 2010. Six regional partnerships are already demonstrating that we can produce real results. They are:


www.fishhabitat.org provides viewers with up to date news about the National Fish Habitat Action Plan and the Partnerships it supports.

The National Fish Habitat Action Plan has benefited from the direct funding support of several entities including the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Fisheries and Habitat Conservation and Federal Assistance Divisions, and five state agencies (Christopher, please insert the names of the states). In addition, the National Marine Fisheries Service, the U.S. Geological Survey, the Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies, and several state agencies, notably Alaska and Michigan, have provided staff support to the Board.

### National Fish and Wildlife Foundation: \$72,000.00

These funds are nearly all expended. They were used to support a state detail at the Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies for development of the Action Plan, Board support, and coordination with emerging Fish Habitat Partnerships.

#### Multi-State Conservation Grants: \$639,054.00

The Board has received two Multi-State Conservation Grants (managed by AFWA) to support the full range of Board activities. The first grant (nearly expended) was used to support development of the Action Plan, the science and data framework, and the fishhabitat.org website, as well as the hiring of a communications coordinator. The new, or second, grant is focused on support to Fish Habitat Partnerships, completion of the fish habitat assessment, and public/partner outreach.

### U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service: \$9,105,000.00

Over the past three fiscal years the USFWS has obligated more than 9 million dollars in support of the Action Plan. The funds have gone to support Board administration (via a cooperative agreement with AFWA), Board staff, Fish Habitat Partnership development, the fish habitat assessment, web site maintenance, and the delivery of aquatic habitat projects. The selection of habitat projects has been driven by Fish Habitat Partnership priorities, coordinated by the USFWS in consultation with the Board through a formal ranking and selection process.

### U.S. Geological Survey: \$650,000

USGS has provided funding (approximately \$150,000) for the National Fish Habitat Assessment and is guiding the development of the assessment. In addition the USGS/BRD has rediredcted its funds (\$500,000) to support the NFHAP by issuing a Request for Proposals for USGS scientists to provide research in direct support of the Fish Habitat Partnerships.
