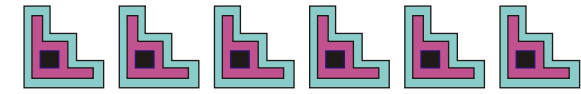
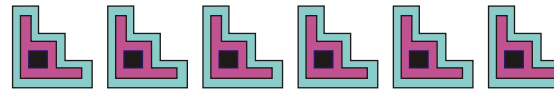

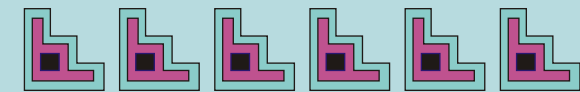

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The postgraduate course on Obstetric, Neonatal, and Gynecologic care is a four-day multidisciplinary course that focuses on practical approaches to the recognition, management, consultation, and referral of health problems of American Indian & Alaska Native Women. The course is geared toward IHS, Tribal, and Urban primary care providers and nurses. Physicians, clinical nurses, nurse practitioners, nurse-midwives, and physician assistants attend a variety of lectures and interactive workshops. Courses are taught by a faculty that has expertise in providing health care to women and children in Indian health care facilities.

The course not only provides a basic overview excellent for any health care provider interested in Indian women's health issues, but also provides recent updates, findings, and trends in women's and neonatal health, and serves as a great refresher for experienced providers.

In addition to presenting important concepts and skills in obstetric, gynecologic, and neonatal care management, this course presents an educational opportunity for American Indian/Alaska Native women's and neonatal health care providers that is personally and professionally rewarding. As it brings together the group of health care providers committed to improving the health of American Indian/Alaska Native women and children, this postgraduate course provides the opportunity for these professionals to exchange information and experiences that address their uniquely similar challenges of developing and managing an effective maternal/infant component at the service unit level.

OBJECTIVES

As a result of attending the course and using the companion reference text, attendees will:

- ◆ Develop an understanding of the principles of women's and neonatal health care as practiced in IHS/Tribal health programs
- ◆ Promote prevention, early diagnosis, and culturally sensitive intervention strategies in the assessment and treatment of women and neonates in primary care settings
- ◆ Identify sick women and neonates who would be best managed in larger secondary or tertiary care centers

COURSE OFFERING

A broad range of topics that place emphasis on the evaluation and management of problems in the context of an IHS, Tribal, or Urban setting is taught. Note that many relate directly to risk management and to IHS GPRA objectives.
