Law Enforcement Line of Duty Deaths for 2004

Law enforcement support organizations reported yesterday that of the 154 officers they identified who fell in the line of duty in 2004, nearly half of them died in traffic-related accidents. Reviewing line-of-duty data earlier this month with the Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) Public Safety Officers' Benefits Office, the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund (NLEOMF) and Concerns of Police Survivors (COPS) found that 72 local, state, and federal officers died from traffic-related accidents while another 57 died from shootings. SAMHSA Survey Notes Treatment Offered in Adult, Juvenile Facilities

A first-time survey on substance abuse treatment in the nation's adult and juvenile correctional facilities conducted by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) provides information on the number of facilities providing treatment, the number of inmates receiving treatment, and the types of treatment services offered. Findings of the new report, Substance Abuse Treatment in Adult and Juvenile Correctional Facilities, revealed that 40 percent of the nation's 7,564 adult and juvenile facilities surveyed offered substance abuse treatment to inmates and residents. Residential Substance Abuse Treatment for State Prisoners Program

The RSAT Formula Grant assists states and units of local government in developing and implementing residential substance abuse treatment programs in state and local correctional and detention facilities. Juvenile Accountability Block Grants Program

The Fiscal Year 2005 Juvenile Accountability Block Grants Program (JABG) Guidance and Application Kit is now available online at: www.ojp.usdoj.gov/fundopps.htm. With the Attorney General authorized to provide grants to states and units of local government to strengthen the juvenile justice system, JABG funds can be used for a broad range of activities regulated by the 16 Congressionally approved purpose areas. All JABG applications are due by February 28, 2005.

Integrated Justice Information Systems Institute

The Integrated Justice Information Systems (IJIS) Institute, a membership organization representing businesses providing products and services to the justice community, has a grant from the U.S. Department of Justice to provide technical assistance to jurisdictions planning to implement, or in the process of implementing, justice information systems.
