The Smithsonian Institution operates 17 museums and the National Zoological Park in the Washington, D.C., area, and 2 museums in New York City. **Most museums are open daily, 10 AM-5:30 PM**; all are closed Dec. 25. The Anacostia Community Museum is open daily, 10 AM-5 PM. The Smithsonian American Art Museum and the National Portrait Gallery are open daily, 11:30 AM-7 PM. Jan. 16, 2009- March 22, 2009	America's New Birth of Freedom: Documents from the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum To celebrate the 200 <sup>th</sup> anniversary of Abraham Lincoln's birth, 10 rare and important documents, including a signed copy of the Emancipation Proclamation, are on display. National Museum of American History
Jan. 23, 2009- April 26, 2009	<b>Orchids through Darwin's Eyes: 15th Annual Orchid Show</b> To mark the 200 <sup>th</sup> anniversary of naturalist Charles Darwin's birth, this exhibition reveals the diversity of orchids through his eyes. <b>National Museum of Natural History</b>
Feb. 4, 2009- Aug. 2, 2009	<b>Artists in Dialogue: Antonio Ole and Aime Mpane</b> Antonio Ole of Angola and Aime Mpane of the Democratic Republic of Congo respond to each other's art with original, site-specific works. <b>National Museum of African Art</b>
Feb. 26, 2009- May 17, 2009	<i>Louise Bourgeois</i> Drawings, prints, paintings, and sculptures by French artist Louis Bourgeois (born 1911) represent most of the avant-garde artistic movements of the 20th century, from Surrealism to Conceptual art. <b>Hirshhorn Museum &amp; Sculpture Garden</b>
March 13, 2009- June 7, 2009	<b>The Art and Craft of Greene &amp; Greene</b> The contribution of brothers Charles and Henry Greene to the American Arts and Crafts Movement is revealed through some 130 objects – including furniture, stained glass, and metalwork. <b>Renwick Gallery</b> of the Smithsonian American Art Museum
March 21, 2009- Sept. 20, 2009	<b>The Tale of Shuten Doji</b> (working title) Modes of visual narration are explored through handscrolls, screens, sketches, and book illustrations telling the <i>Tale of Shuten Doji</i> , a Japanese folktale about the conquest of the monster Shuten Doji by the hero Minamoto Yorimitsu (948-1021). <b>Arthur M. Sackler Gallery</b>
Through March 3, 2009	Accommodating Nature: The Photographs of Frank Gohlke Landscape photographer Frank Golke (b. 1942) has captured the tension between humanity and nature in his images. Smithsonian American Art Museum
Through March 9, 2009	<b>Road to Freedom: Photographs of the Civil Rights Movement, 1956-1968</b> On view are unforgettable images that changed the nation by raising awareness of injustice and the struggle for equality. <b>S. Dillon Ripley Center</b>
Through May 10, 2009	<b>Moonlight and Clouds: Silver and Gold in the Arts of Japan</b> This exhibition features 32 objects in which gold and silver were applied to create a more refined design, a technique developed by Japanese artists in the 17th century. <b>Freer Gallery of Art</b>

Through July 5, 2009	<b>One Life: The Mask of Lincoln</b> The museum reveals the many faces of Abraham Lincoln through images from the collection, including Alexander Gardner's cracked-plate portrait. <b>National Portrait Gallery</b>
Through Aug. 16, 2009	<i>Fritz Scholder: Indian/Not Indian</i> Works in a range of media from the 1960s and 1970s are on view to highlight the career of artist Fritz Scholder (Luiseno, 1937-2005). <b>National Museum of the American Indian</b>
Through Sept. 20 2009	<b>Jubilee: African American Celebrations</b> African American holidays and celebrations from the 18 <sup>th</sup> century to the present are explored through images. <b>Anacostia Community Museum</b>
Through Oct. 29, 2009	<b>Alphabetilately</b> Celebrating its 15th anniversary, the museum documents stamp collecting and the history of the postal service through 26 topics, with each topic represented by a letter of the alphabet in the form of a stamp. <b>National Postal Museum</b>
Indefinitely	Military Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAV) On view are 6 aircraft that represent modern unmanned flight systems technology. National Air and Space Museum.

Permanent James S. McDonnell Space Hangar Hundreds of space history artifacts are on view, including the Space Shuttle Enterprise (OV-101), which flew test landings for the shuttle program in the 1970s. National Air and Space Museum's Steven F. Udvar-Hazy Center
