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## Hospice and Home Health Agency Characteristics: United States, 1991

## Introduction

The National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS) collected data on hospices and home health agencies (HHA's) for the first time in the 1991 National Health Provider Inventory (NHPI). This report focuses on their numbers, distributing them by State, type of ownership, and type of certification. It also presents data on services provided and volunteers.

The NHPI's predecessor was the National Master Facility Inventory (NMFI). The NMFI has been conducted 10 times since 1963. The first six Inventories included hospitals, nursing and related care homes, and other types of inpatient health facilities that included homes for the blind, deaf, mentally retarded, and emotionally disturbed (1). The 1978, 1980, and 1982 Inventories were limited to nursing and related care homes (1). The 1986 Inventory (known as the Inventory of Long-Term Care Places) included mental retardation facilities in addition to nursing and related care homes (2). The Inventory was expanded in 1991 to include HHA's and hospices. Both provide services in the patient's place of

residence, some having inpatient beds. Including these two providers follows the current effort to view long-term care as a system that gives the chronically ill more options and that uses health care resources more efficiently.

The NHPI provides an up-to-date sampling frame for surveys about health care providers. For example, NCHS uses data collected about nursing and related care homes, hospices, and home health agencies to select samples for the Long-Term Care Component of the National Health Care Survey (3). Another purpose of the Inventory is to provide basic national statistics on nursing homes, residential-care facilities, home health agencies, and hospices.

The appendixes describe how the numbers in the report were obtained. Appendix I describes the process of determining the number of agencies and the method of classifying these agencies either as a home health agency or as a hospice. Appendix I also gives additional background information about the NHPI. The questionnaire used in the 1991 NHPI is shown in appendix II. Definitions of terms are provided in appendix III.

## **Discussion**

Modern home health care in this country began with the founding of a prototype hospital-based home health care program at Montefiore Hospital in New York City in 1947 (4). The modern hospice industry started as a local grass-roots volunteer phenomenon and has grown, over the last 17 years, into an approach reimbursed by insurers (5). Of the 7,804 agencies surveyed in 1991, 6,853 were identified as home health agencies (HHA's) and 951 as hospices.

The number of HHA's and of hospices are shown in tables A and B by geographic region, and tables 1 and 2 by State. HHA's provide services primarily to promote, maintain, or restore their patient's health and hospices provide specialized services to the terminally ill. Table A shows that in 1991 the South accounted for 2,691 HHA's-almost 40 percent of all HHA's in the Nation. The South also had the largest number of hospices—311, or 33 percent of the Nation's total (table B). The Midwest followed closely with 293 hospices, or about 30 percent. The State distribution in table 1 shows that 11 States accounted for half of the 6,853 home health agencies in the Nation, and that only four of these States are located in the South. Texas was ranked first with 8 percent of the HHA's in the Nation. Florida and New York followed, each accounting for 6 percent of all HHA's. Similarly, 11 States, only two of which are located in the South, accounted for half of the 951 hospices in the Nation (table 2). California, Michigan, and Illinois lead the ranking, together accounting for 20 percent of all hospices in the Nation. Sixteen States each had fewer than 10 hospices.

These tables also show the number of HHA's and hospices by number of clients. The most common size for an

HHA in all four regions was 100-299 clients, whereas the most common size for a hospice was 8-19 clients in all regions, except in the Midwest, where hospices had even fewer clients. The average size of an HHA was 180 clients; HHA sizes ranged from no clients to more than 70,000 clients at the time of the Inventory. The average size of a hospice was 34 clients, which was above the 8-19 modal size; hospice sizes ranged from no clients to 2,100 clients at the time of the Inventory. Nationally, only 14 percent of HHA's had 300 or more clients. The Northeast had a higher percent of large HHA's than any other region; 23 percent of its HHA's had 300 or more clients. Table 1 shows that first-ranked Texas had many more small HHA's than second-ranked Florida and third-ranked New York. This is not surprising when Texas' large geographic size and its population spread are considered. Some atypical client sizes, not isolated in the tables, were: 12 HHA's reported 4,000-6,000 clients at the time of the Inventory; one HHA reported approximately 7,000 clients; and another reported over 70,000 clients. Six hospices reported 450-600 clients at the time of the Inventory, and one reported approximately 700 clients. The numbers of HHA's and hospices reporting no clients at the time of the Inventory were 391 and 77, respectively.

Table C presents the numbers of clients the HHA's and hospices served by the type of care received. Although an agency may have cared for more than one type of client, this situation was infrequent. For example, in addition to caring for clients receiving only home health care, an HHA may have cared for clients receiving only hospice care, as well as clients receiving both home health and hospice care. Approximately

15 percent of the 6,853 HHA's served clients receiving hospice care and about 14 percent of the 951 hospices served clients other than those receiving only hospice care.

Table 3 presents the numbers of clients the agencies served by State and type of care the clients received. New York, California, Florida, and Texas served the largest number of clients receiving only home health care and the largest numbers receiving only hospice care. Collectively, they served 31 percent of the approximately 1.2 million clients receiving home health care, and 34 percent of the approximately 43,000 clients receiving hospice care. Of the total number of clients receiving home health care, New York served 181,454 clients, more than two-and-one-half times the number of clients than was served by second-ranked California. This pattern is reversed for clients receiving hospice care; California cared for almost twice as many hospice clients as New York.

The NHPI inventoried the provision of 14 types of services. These are shown in tables 4 and 5. The large majority of HHA's offered referral services (80 percent) and high tech care (75 percent). Harrington suggests that the high percent of HHA's offering high tech care may be because their typical client is acutely ill, discharged from hospitals sooner and sicker than before the implementation of diagnosis-related groups (DRG's) (6). Of the remaining 12 services, more than half of all HHA's offered speech therapy (65 percent), occupational therapy/vocational therapy (57 percent), homemaker/companion services (56 percent), dietary and nutritional services (54 percent), and counseling (52 percent). These percents were consistent across the four regions.

Most hospices offered most of the inventoried services. Over 90 percent offered bereavement care and pastoral care, services particular to the care of the terminally ill and their families. Over 90 percent of the hospices also offered counseling and referral services. Of the remaining services, more than half of all hospices offered all of the inventoried services except two. These two exceptions were enterostomal therapy, provided by 44 percent of all hospices, and meals on wheels, provided by only 13 percent of all hospices. As with the HHA's the pattern of services offered was consistent across the four regions, although a slightly larger percent of hospices in the South offered medically oriented services (dietary and nutritional services, occupational therapy/vocational therapy, speech therapy, medications, and high tech care) than did hospices in any other region.

In addition to the 14 services listed in the questionnaire, agencies were asked to specify any others offered: 39 percent of HHA's and 26 percent of hospices offered services other than the 14 listed. Among the most frequently listed were: nursing care, home health aide care, physical therapy, medical equipment, and in-patient services. An interesting finding was that several hospices listed nontraditional services such as counseling services to the community at large, and day care for both hospice and nonhospice ill. A national survey studying hospice programs discovered a trend of hospices offering these "higher visibility services" (7). The explanation offered for this trend is that hospices are trying to survive in the competitive health care service industry (7).

Agency ownership is the subject for the next set of tables. Table D shows the number of agencies by type of agency and table E presents the number of clients by type of care received; tables 6–10 present these data by State. Tables 11 and 12 give the percent of agencies providing services according to ownership. The percent distribution of agencies having volunteers, according to ownership, is given in table 13.

The hospice industry was primarily nonprofit (88 percent), whereas the home health agency industry was more diverse (table D). Thirty-seven percent of all HHA's were nonprofit, with the remaining HHA's being 41 percent proprietary and 22 percent government-owned. Comparing the data from both tables D and E, nonprofit agencies, which were 43 percent of all agencies, cared for 56 percent of the clients. Nonprofit agencies cared for 78 percent of clients receiving only hospice care, 55 percent of clients receiving only home health care, and 56 percent of clients receiving both types of care. Nonprofit HHA's had approximately twice the number of clients receiving home health care as did proprietary HHA's. Also, nonprofit hospices had more clients receiving home health care than did proprietary hospices, but this difference was small.

Despite its low national figure, government-owned HHA's predominated in 10 States (table 6). These 10 States were of a rural character: Alabama, Arkansas, Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota, North Carolina, North Dakota, South Carolina, South Dakota,

and Wyoming. The majority of these States also had more nonprofit HHA's than proprietary ones. Government-owned agencies also enrolled the majority of clients receiving home health care in five of these States (Minnesota, North Carolina, North Dakota, South Carolina, and South Dakota), and in one not listed (Montana) (table 8).

Grouping HHA's by region, those considered more rural (the Midwest and the South) had 31 percent and 23 percent of their agencies under government-ownership, respectively, compared with 17 percent in the West and 9 percent in the Northeast (table F). The South had the greatest percent of HHA's under proprietary ownership (49 percent) compared with the Northeast (40 percent), the West (39 percent), or the Midwest (29 percent).

Tables 11 and 12 show the percent of HHA's and of hospices that provide selected services by ownership status of the agency. Of the 14 services surveyed, the majority were offered by a larger percent of proprietary HHA's than by either nonprofit or government-owned HHA's. Note, in particular,

the percent differences between proprietary and nonprofit HHA's offering occupational therapy and counseling. Such differences may be because it's more profitable to offer a wide selection of services. In contrast, table 12 shows that 11 services were offered by a lower percent of proprietary hospices than by either nonprofit or government-owned hospices. Keep in mind the low numbers of proprietary and government-owned hospices when viewing the hospice distribution in this table.

Table 13 gives the percent of agencies that had volunteers by geographic region according to ownership. Because a Medicare-certified hospice is required to staff volunteers (8), and the majority of hospices in 1991 were certified, the percent of hospices having volunteers was high—93 percent of all hospices had volunteers compared with 21 percent of all HHA's. Most noteworthy about this table, however, is the percent of proprietary agencies versus nonprofit agencies having volunteers. Fifty percent of proprietary hospices and 5 percent of proprietary HHA's had volunteers compared with 96 percent of nonprofit hospices and 39 percent of nonprofit HHA's.

Tables 14–20 present certification data. The agency distribution by State is given in tables 14 and 15 and the client distribution by State is given in tables 16–18. Medicare and Medicaid began covering certain home health care services from the time they were enacted in 1965 (9). Since 1965, the number of Medicare-certified agencies increased most rapidly between 1982 and 1986, after the 1980 legislation permitted States not having licensing laws to certify proprietary agencies (5). Hospice became a Federal program reimbursable under Medicare in 1982 and under Medicaid in 1985.

The agency counts show that the majority of HHA's and hospices were Medicare- and/or Medicaid-certified, but that

larger percents of HHA's were certified than hospices—81 percent versus 63 percent by Medicare, and 81 percent versus 53 percent by Medicaid. The agency counts also show that Medicare- and Medicaid-certification seem to coincide. Some of the more notable exceptions to this were New York and North Dakota, where much higher percents of HHA's were certified by Medicaid than by Medicare, and Arizona where the opposite occurred. Note that in 28 States the number of Medicaid-certified HHA's by two or fewer agencies, and that in 31 States the number of Medicare-certified hospices differed from the number of Medicaid-certified hospices by one or no agencies.

The client counts show that Medicare- and Medicaid-certified agencies cared for the large majority of clients receiving each type of care—home health care only, hospice care only, and both home health care and hospice care. For example, 89 percent of clients receiving only home health care and 86 percent of clients receiving only hospice care were enrolled in Medicare-certified agencies.

Table 19 shows the number of agencies by certification and ownership, and table 20 gives this information for clients. According to table 19, nonprofit and government-owned HHA's were more likely to be certified than proprietary ones were. For example, 89 percent of all nonprofit agencies compared with 71 percent of all proprietary agencies were certified by Medicare. Unlike HHA's, approximately the same percent of nonprofit, proprietary, and government-owned hospices were certified. According to table 20, clients receiving home health care, hospice care, or both were most likely to receive their care from a certified nonprofit agency.

## **Appendixes**

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## Appendix I Technical notes

### Creation of a mailing list

The NHPI was a mail survey conducted by NCHS. The mailing list of home health agencies and hospices for the 1991 NHPI contained 14,089 records. These were records of all agencies that NCHS was able to identify as potentially being either a home health agency or a hospice. The list was constructed using NCHS's Agency Reporting System, which is an ongoing system designed to periodically update the NHPI listings (10). The sources for the mailing list included the names and addresses of providers obtained from the most recently published directories and listings from different national and State organizations, both private and public. The data set and collection procedures for hospices and home health agencies were developed and tested in the study, "Feasibility of Studying Hospices and Home Health Agencies" (11).

## Mail survey

The U.S. Bureau of the Census, under an interagency agreement with NCHS, served as the data collection and data processing agent.

Three questionnaire mailouts, plus a field followup, were used to complete the Inventory. On April 5, 1991, all facilities in the mailing list universe were mailed a questionnaire. About a week later, a reminder/thank you letter was mailed. Two additional mailings at 6-week intervals were made to the nonresponding agencies and to the Postmaster Returns (PMR's). At the end of the mail survey, refusals, PMR's, and nonresponses were contacted by telephone. Interviewers contacted these providers until either the information was collected or a firm refusal was received. This final followup ended on November 1, 1991.

Questionnaire items 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, and 8 were considered critical to determine whether an agency was in scope for the NHPI and for stratifying the long-term care sample. These items ask for the agency's address, telephone number, county, current operating status, and primary service category; and whether the agency was certified under Medicare, respectively. Appendix II includes a copy of the questionnaire used. If any of these items were not completed on a returned questionnaire, the agency was contacted by telephone either to obtain the information directly or to arrange for a personal interview. If a nonrespondent was reluctant to provide information either over the telephone or through personal interview, the interviewer made a final attempt, by telephone, to determine these

critical questionnaire items (2, 3, 4, 5, 7, and 8), plus items 6 (type of agency ownership), 10 (number of clients), and 13 (number of visits in the last calendar year).

## Results of mail survey

Of the 14,089 agencies to which questionnaires were mailed, 7,804 were either an HHA or hospice. Of the remaining 6,285 agencies, 116 were nonrespondents and 6,169 were out-of-scope or not in operation (questionnaires were returned by the U.S. Post Office and/or field interviewers were unable to locate them by telephone).

The 6,169 agencies that were out-of-scope or not in operation fit into two major categories. The first category included: 4,501 agencies that were not yet open, no longer provided home health or hospice care, or were out of business; 99 agencies that were home offices only; and, 1,352 agencies that were duplicates in the mailing list. The second category consisted of 217 agencies that were not classified as home health agencies or hospices. This classification scheme is described in a later section. The majority of agencies in the first category were removed from the list of eligible agencies by the U.S. Bureau of the Census during the mailings and field followup; 566 of the duplicate agencies in the first category were removed by NCHS. Agencies in the second category were also removed by NCHS.

The overall response rate was 98.5 percent. The numerator is 7,804 (number of responding agencies). The denominator is 7,920 (number of responding agencies plus 116 refusing agencies and nonresponding agencies).

## Classification of agencies

There were 7,804 agencies classified as either a home health agency or a hospice. NCHS examined two ways to classify the agencies: one by using "type of client" (question-naire items 10 and 11) and one by using "PRIMARY service category" (questionnaire item 7). The client data were used because they permitted classification of the largest numbers of agencies into either the home health agency category or the hospice category, with only 64 agencies remaining in the category of agencies providing both home health and hospice care. Classifying the agencies as either a home health agency or hospice was important for sampling purposes for the National Home and Hospice Care Survey (12).

When questionnaire item 7 is used, the number of agencies in each category is different than when the client classification system is used (table I). There are two primary reasons for the discrepancy. First, there were inconsistencies between the answer to question 7 ("PRIMARY service category") and questions 10 and 11 (the client data). For example, if an agency indicated "Home Health Agency" as its primary service category, but it served clients receiving hospice care and no clients receiving home health care, NCHS classified the agency as a hospice. The second reason for the discrepancy occurred when an agency answered "Neither" for question 7 because home health and/or hospice services were only part of the range of services it provided. Of the 6,142 agencies that indicated their "PRIMARY service category" as home health care, 34 were classified by NCHS as a hospice. Of the 863 agencies that indicated their "PRIMARY service category" as hospice, 12 were classified by NCHS as HHA's. The most notable difference between the two classification methods is that the client system classifies only 64 of the agencies as being both a home health agency and a hospice and no agencies as being neither. In contrast, the "PRIMARY

service category" classifies 348 agencies as both a home health agency and 451 as being neither.

The classification process for the 7,804 agencies is shown in figure 1. The first step resulted in 4,991 HHA's, 722 hospices, and 2,089 agencies being classified in the "both" category. These 2,089 agencies had both HHA and hospice clients that were either "active," were served in 1990, or were discharged in 1990. That is, these agencies indicated that they had HHA clients in either question 10.b, 11.b, or 14.b, and hospice clients in either questions 10a, 11a, or 14c. These 2,089 clients were reclassified in steps 2-4 and 62 agencies remained. These 62 agencies indicated that: (1) they had no active clients, no 1990 clients, and no discharges in 1990; and (2) they did not indicate their "PRIMARY service category" (question 7). The 62 agencies, plus the two agencies classified as "unknown," were placed in the home health agency or hospice categories case-by-case, using other information in the record. Clients (active clients, 1990 clients, and client discharges) were the determining factors in the classification, and question 7 was used only as a last resort in step 5.

## **Editing procedures**

In addition to eliminating the out-of-scope agencies, other edits were necessary to prepare the file of in-scope facilities. Edits were made to correct inconsistencies between data items; for missing items, data were imputed from existing information when possible. For example, a total of 59 missing data items were imputed for questions 6–9 by allocating the missing items proportionally to the answered items.

## Appendix III Classifications and definitions

## Types of agencies and institutions

Home Health Agency—An agency providing health services to individuals in their place of residence for the purpose of (a) promoting, maintaining, or restoring health; or (b) maximizing the level of independence while minimizing the effects of disability and illness (including terminal illness).

Hospice—An agency providing specialized services for terminally ill people and their families, including medical services, social and emotional support for patients and families, volunteer support, and bereavement services for families following the death of the patient.

### Characteristics of agencies

Ownership—Ownership designates the type of organization that owns the agency. Proprietary indicates control by individual, partnership, or corporation. Nonprofit ownership includes ownership by a religious group or by a nonprofit corporation. Government ownership refers to agencies operated under Federal, State, or local government auspices.

Certification—Facility certification by Medicare and/or Medicaid.

*Medicare*—The medical assistance provided in title XVIII of the Social Security Act. Medicare is a health insurance program administered by the Social Security Administration for persons aged 65 years and over and for disabled persons who are eligible for benefits.

*Medicaid*—The medical assistance provided in title XIX of the Social Security Act. Medicaid is a State-administered program for the medically indigent.

*Current clients*—Clients who were reported to be currently on the rolls of the agency at the time of the survey.

*Geographic regions*—The U.S. Bureau of the Census groups the 50 States plus the District of Columbia into the following regions:
