


# **2002 Census of Agriculture County Profile**

#### **Number of farms**

287 farms in 2002, 345 farms in 1997, down 17 percent.

#### Land in farms

12,828 acres in 2002, 14,850 acres in 1997, down 14 percent.

#### Average size of farm

45 acres in 2002, 43 acres in 1997, up 5 percent.

#### **Market Value of Production**

\$30,272,000 in 2002, \$18,427,000 in 1997, up 64 percent. Crop sales accounted for \$21,823,000 of the total value in 2002. Livestock sales accounted for \$8,449,000 of the total value in 2002.

## Market Value of Production, average per farm




