

## What Nonprofit CEOs and Experts are Saying About AmeriCorps' Pipeline to Public Service

On May 13, 2008, the Corporation for National and Community Service released "Still Serving: Measuring the Eight-Year Impact of AmeriCorps on Alumni," is the most rigorous evaluation done to date about AmeriCorps' long-term impacts on members. One of the key findings of the report is that AmeriCorps alums continue to be highly civically engaged and enter public service careers at a rate of 60%m significantly higher than a similar comparison group. This finding is critical, as the nonprofit and government sectors are facing a looming workforce and leadership crisis.

An extensive study of City Year alumni found that they are more than twice as likely as their peers to be engaged in volunteer activity and to belong to a civic or community organization, and that three quarters of alumni report that their service year prepared them to solve programs in their communities.

"What is remarkable is that important impacts of service have been sustained eight years after participants' enrollment in AmeriCorps. On just about every other research study, early outcomes have quickly diminished over time."
