COURSE DESCRIPTION

This year's thirty-fourth annual seminar combines three individualized symposia and is designed to address common medical problems in obstetrics and gynecologic practice. As new diagnostic procedures are developed and therapeutic modalities instituted, the practitioner needs an educational forum to become familiar with these advances. Intended to update practicing obstetricians, gynecologists, primary care health professionals, nurse practitioners and nurses, this three-day program will focus on these specific areas of interest:

- Day 1:** "Cervical Cytology Bethesda 2001 ASCCP Guidelines, Rational and Implementation," followed by a luncheon symposium on "Hormone Replacement after the Women's Health Initiative: What to do now?"
- Day 2:** "New Technologies for Screening and Triage of Cervical Neoplasia" and "Minimally Invasive Surgery for Common Gynecologic Problems," followed by a lunch symposium on "State of the A.R.T."
- Day 3:** "Prenatal Testing and Genetic Screening: What's Hot and What's Not," followed by a lunch symposium offered by the Arizona Section of the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology.

Each symposium, presented by internationally recognized experts in the field, will offer a broad overview of the specific topic. Participants will receive the most up-to-date information on the subject, which will assist in expanding one's skill in providing better patient care.

A combination of didactic lectures, slides and videotape presentations will be utilized. Specific time will be available during the scheduled lectures for questions/answers and panel discussion sessions. In addition, speakers will be available during refreshment breaks and after the completion of the day's scheduled program for one-on-one contact, informal exchanges and case study discussions.
