Some Facts

- Over 1.2 billion people lack access to clean drinking water and almost 2.6 billion people lack access to any kind of improved sanitation services
- Every 8 seconds a child dies of a water-related disease
- During my talk: 150 more deaths

Millennium Development Goal

- By 2015, reduce by 50% the number of people who do not have access to safe drinking water or sanitation
- Requires that each day until 2015, we must provide safe drinking water to about 250,000 people and sanitary facilities to about 500,000 people
- Could do this for about \$16B/year

Hydrohumanity

Definition Humanity: the quality of being humane; kindness; benevolence

Hydrohumanity: expressing kindness or benevolence by helping people meet their water, sanitation, and related needs.

Hydrophilanthropy Definition

Hydrophilanthropy: Altruistic concern for the water, sanitation, and related needs of humankind, as manifested by donations of work, money, or property.

Both hydrohumanity and hydrophilanthropy are often associated with the developing world.


