Community Programs provide funds for infrastructure, essential community facilities, and technology enhancement for medicine and learning. Community Programs also provide funds for infrastructure improvements, providing clean drinking water, sanitary sewer, solid waste and storm drainage facilities, crucial for communities to grow.

Community facility funds were used for the renovation of a city hall and a high school, medical equipment for a clinic, expansion for an assistant care facility, purchase of equipment for a science center, fire truck, and a children's center.



Success of these programs is community commitment and support, as well as partnering with the private sector and non-profit organizations.

HOUSING PROGRAMS







Another priority is providing financing for construction of apartments and other multiple-family housing units in rural communities that lack sufficient safe and affordable units. It provides rental subsidies to low-income people, many of which are elderly. To date, we have provided funding for construction of approximately 4,500 units.



Rural Development also provides funds for home improvement loans and grants to help low-income people, often the elderly people, remove health and safety hazards from their homes.

BUSINESS PROGRAMS

Our business programs promote a dynamic business environment in rural America transforming communities into places of opportunity and growth, providing jobs, and stimulating the economy.

Business programs assisted 31 businesses and created and or saved 551 jobs in rural North Dakota in FY 2006. These programs provide a positive business climate and promote job creation and retention.

Our business programs have provided the following funds to rural North Dakota communities:

Business and Industry Guaranteed Loans (B&I) 9 projects = \$10,777,600; 390 jobs created or saved

Intermediary Re-lending Programs (IRP)

1 project = \$750,000; *15 jobs created*—provide technical assistance for business and community development

Rural Business Enterprise Grants (RBEG)

6 projects = \$1,167,430; 66 jobs created or saved
Projects include a public television educational program, building renovation, business incubator, and technical assistance

Rural Business Opportunity Grants (RBOG)

3 projects = \$293,120; 70 jobs created or saved

Value-Added Producer Grants (VAPG)
3 projects = \$300,000; 10 jobs created or saved

Rural Cooperative Development Grants (RCDG)

2 projects = \$355,027; provide technical assistance for cooperative development to Native American People Cooperative and the ND Association of Rural Electric Cooperatives

Rural Energy and Energy Efficiency Grants (RE/EE)

4 projects = \$613,368; provide assistance to farmers, ranchers, and small rural businesses to make energy efficiency improvements

Rural Electric Program

Administered out of Washington, D.C., this program provides low interest loans to rural electric membership corporations. Last year, North Dakota received six loans totaling \$182.8 million.

Telecommunication Program

Administered out of Washington, D.C., this program provides low interest loans to rural telephone companies. One loan for \$14,077,000 went to United Telephone Mutual Aid Corporation and another for \$14,500,000 went to Turtle Mountain Communications, Inc.

Broadband Program

Administered out of Washington, D.C., this program is to aid rural areas in connecting to the Internet. A grant for \$343,611 was awarded to Precision Diagnostic Services, Inc., and another for \$119,006 went to The Great Northwest Education Cooperative Alexander Public School District.
