Dear Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs Hunt:

The "OMB Draft Guidelines for the Conduct of Regulatory Analysis and the Format of Accounting Statements" determines that saving the life of an elderly person is worth less than the life of a younger person.

As an American citizen who is a relative, I find that devaluing an elderly person's life is unethical and unmoral.

The analysis proposal to devalue the life of a human over 70 to 2/3 of the rest of the population and lowers the established EPA price tag of human life from \$6.1 to \$3.7 million.

This is a mere pretext to cut the value of health and safety standards in order to protect the industries that stand to gain from this White House initiative.

The OMB's conclusion that lives of our senior citizens are less valuable raises serious ethical and moral and scientific questions.

If analysis is fully applied, regulations for air pollution, toxic waste cleanup, food labeling and other quality of life issues could be weakened or not at all implemented--and our senior citizens will feel the brunt of it since their health is the most vulnerable to dirty air and unhealthy food.
