

DESIGN

What are the key features of our redesigned outreach effort?

- A clearinghouse of Q&As
- Joint training for plants and FSIS
- Validation support to meet specific small plant needs

What outcomes are expected from redesigning our outreach efforts?

- Small and very small plants have a full range of scientific and technical support and assistance needed to compete by demonstrating safe and effective HACCP systems
- Enhanced food safety and food defense protection
