I am a consumer interested in the safety of food that I present to my family. I have been observing the development of the controversy between the National Consumers League (NCL) and the proponents of AMR via the Internet over the past three years. As one outside the food industry, politics, and government, I wish to submit the results of what I have gleaned from by observation.

I am not a scientist, nor am I an expert in the meat industry, but as a well informed consumer, I have to admit that I have lost respect and faith in the process by which our national food sources are kept safe. My disappointment lies in the actions of the NCL and the FSIS.

Although I generally support the efforts of groups who bring to the forefront the highest interests of the consumer, I am very disillusioned by the actions of the NCL concerning AMR. When a consumer group accepts money to fund its activities from a third party, who has their own selfish agenda in mind, the needs of consumers are not served. Instead, what began supposedly as a food safety issue, is really a screen for a large corporation's selfish ambitions to control a segment of the meat industry. The NCL is being manipulated, or is allowing itself to be manipulated, by it's benefactors and in the process has lost its credibility as an advocate for consumers.
