A Brief History

- Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002
 - Established a Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Pilot in four states; IN, MS, OH, IA and an ITO (in NM)
- Child Nutrition and WIC Reauthorization Act 2004
 - Permanently authorized the program and added 4 states (PA, MS, NC, WA) and 2 ITOs (in SD and AZ)
- Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2006
 - Expanded to include UT, WI, NM, CT, TX and ID

A Brief History

The Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2008, P.L. 110–161

Appropriated funds to add non-participating States to operate the FFVP and also allowed FNS to reallocate recovered FFVP funds to the six states under P.L. 109-97

The Food Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008 (Public Law 110-234), the Farm Bill

- New Section 19 of the National School Lunch Act, the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program
- Beginning July 1, 2008 the FFVP became a nationwide program



School Selection Criteria

- Must be elementary school
- Schools must operate the NSLP
- Interested schools must submit an application
- Each selected school must have 50% or more F/RP

School Selection Criteria

- Highest priority must be given to schools with highest % of low income students
- Total enrollment of all schools must result in a per-student allocation of \$50-\$75



Determining Number of Students *Example*

\$184,101 July allocation

\$500,000 October allocation

\$684,101 Total

<u>-\$25,000</u> Administrative funds

\$659,101 Available to schools

Range

\$659,101 / \$50 = 13,182 students

\$659,101 / \$75 = 8,788 students



Outreach to Low-Income Schools

- SAs must inform elementary schools with highest proportion of F/RP enrollment, including Native American schools, of their eligibility for participation in the FFVP
- And the likelihood that they will be chosen to participate due to high F/RP eligibles

Transition of Existing Schools to the New FFVP

- > SY 2008-09
 - any school selected for the SY may participate for the SY
- SY 2009-10
 - except that participating secondary schools may continue for this school year
 - Schools must meet all other selection criteria



School Applications

At a minimum, an application must include

- Total number of enrolled students and % eligible for F/RP meals
- Certificate of support for participation signed by School Food manager, school principal and district superintendent




School Applications

At a minimum, an application *must include*

- Plan for implementation of FFVP that includes effort to integrate the FFVP with other efforts to promote sound health and nutrition, reduce overweight and obesity or promote physical activity
- Description of partnership activities undertaken or planned

National FNS Partners

- Centers for Disease Control and Prevention
- National Cancer institute
- United Fresh Produce Association
- Produce for Better Health
- Fruit and Vegetable Program Coordinator (formerly called the 5-A-Day Coordinator)



General Program Parameters

- FFVP operates under an addendum to the permanent Federal/State agency agreement
- States must have properly executed State/local agreements
- States must operate program on a monthly reimbursement basis
- Available during the school day in one or more areas of the school
- Provided separately from lunch or breakfast
- Required to widely publicize availability within the school



General Program Parameters

- Intent of the program
 - To provide children fresh fruits and vegetables
- Non-allowable items
 - Nuts
 - Trail mix
 - Dried fruit

Allocation of Funds to States

- SY 2008-09 funded through two separate allocations
- The Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2008
- Section 19 of the NSLA



Funds for State Administrative Costs

- SAs may retain a portion of their total FFVP grant allocation
- Amount of funds that may be retain is the lesser of:
 - 5 percent of SA's total grant for the year, or
 - the amount required to pay costs of one full-time coordinator for the FFVP

SY 08-09 Initial Allocation

- Available through Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2008 for the 50 States and D.C. on July 1, 2008
- Each State received approximately \$184,101
- States must distribute the funds, along with Section 19 funds, to a number of schools which results in a total per student allocation of \$50 to \$75
- States will follow requirements of Section 19 of the NSLA in selecting schools for participation
- \$184,101 available for obligation by schools through September 30, 2008; close-out by December 30
- Funds recovered by FNS after close-out will be available for reallocation

SY08-09 Second Allocation

- \$40 million provided through The Food Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008 (P.L. 110-234) on October 1, 2008:
- Minimum Grants
 - 1% minimum grant to each of the 50 States and DC
- Proportional Allocation based on Population
 - Proportionally allocate remaining funds among the 50 States, D.C., Guam, Puerto Rico and Virgin Islands based on population of State compared to U.S. population
- Federal Administrative Funds
 - Set aside \$500,000 for Federal administrative costs

Funding Maintenance for Previously Participating States

The resulting allocations for each of the previously participating States will be compared to the amounts received by these States in School Year 2007/2008 to determine the total amount of funds needed to provide these States at least the same amount they received in SY 2007/2008



Future Funding

- ▶ July 1, 2009
 - \$65,000,000
- July 1, 2010
 - \$101,000,000
- July 1, 2011
 - \$150,000,000
- July 1, 2012 and beyond
 - based on previous years allocation as adjusted by annual change in the Consumer Price Index (CPI)

Allocation of Funds To Schools

- Includes previously selected schools
- One unified program
- Minimum \$50 to maximum \$75
- Not all schools must have same per student reimbursement level
- Determine actual per student \$



Reporting

- Food Programs Reporting System
 - on a quarterly basis
- > SF 269A
 - set up for all states: CN-FFVP
 - ITOs-SD, AZ, NM: CN-FFVP-ITO



Claim for Reimbursement

Schools must submit monthly claims to the State agency for reimbursement



Recordkeeping

Same recordkeeping requirements as other Child Nutrition Programs



Program Oversight and Monitoring

- Critical that State agencies ensure FFVP operating properly
- State agencies should review FFVP claims for reimbursement
- State agencies should ensure that FFVP schools are reviewed as part of any oversight or monitoring activity

Program Evaluation

- Section 19 of the National School Lunch Act requires evaluation of FFVP
 - due September 30, 2011
- The evaluation will consider FFVP results
 - Increased consumption of fruits and vegetables
 - Other dietary changes (such as decreased consumption of less nutrition foods)



Program Evaluation

- State agencies required to maintain and provide information that will assist FNS in completing the evaluation
- Additional information on the evaluation provided at a later date
