SUBJECT: Maximum Monthly Distribution Rates for Powdered Infant
Formula

This memorandum serves to revise the maximum monthly distribution rates for powdered infant formula. As provided in a recent Food and Nutrition Service memorandum, the decision has been made to discontinue offering the soy-based powdered infant formula in the CSFP. Regarding the milk-based product, infants 0-12 months of age may receive a maximum monthly issuance of ten 12-ounce, nine 14.3-ounce, or five 25.7-ounce cans of powdered infant formula. The maximum monthly issuance of the powdered infant formula ranges from 120 to 128.7 ounces, depending upon weight of the powdered infant formula cans distributed. The variance in weight of the powdered formula cans is attributable to differences in vendor offerings.

FNS Instruction 835-1, Rev. 1 entitled "Authorized Supplemental Foods and Distribution Rates of Foods for the Commodity Supplemental Food Program" provides that, in certain circumstances, children beyond the age of 12 months may qualify to receive infant formula. Such children may not have achieved the developmental level necessary to consume solid foods. Under these circumstances, the CSFP local agency may continue to authorize infant formula, provided that its use is prescribed by a physician and the reason is documented in the child's certification file. Qualified children may receive a maximum monthly issuance of ten 12-ounce, nine 14.3-ounce, or five 25.7-ounce cans of powdered infant formula.

An additional can of powdered infant formula (one 12-ounce can every month; one 14.3-ounce can every month; or one 25.7-ounce can every other month) may be issued to children on an individual basis provided that, per FNS Instruction 835-1, Rev. 1, the need is prescribed by a physician and the reason documented in the child's certification file.

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
