Hearing Screening Information	
State/territory written guidelines and/or protocols for performing hearing screenings?	Yes As described in the Hospital Policy Manual, every child should receive a physiologic hearing screening for the detection of hearing loss prior to discharge from the birthing facility. For those children who do not pass the initial screening, a second screening should be completed prior to discharge. When a child has not passed two screenings, the child is to be reported to the Indiana State Department of Health as not passing UNHS. The hospital then refers children who do not pass UNHS and those who have risk factors for diagnostic follow-up. The children may be referred to any of the following 1) First Steps Early Intervention, 2) Primary Care Provider and/or 3) Audiologist/ENT.

What happens if a baby does not pass the initial hearing screening(s)?	Children who do not pass UNHS are to be reported to the Indiana State Department of Health. In addition, children are to be referred to 1) First Steps Early Intervention, 2) Primary Care Provider and/or 3)Audiology/ENT. Children are to receive a diagnostic evaluation when not passing UNHS.
Birthing hospitals/facilities/providers required to report hearing screening results to the state?	Yes The birthing facilities are required by law to report to the Indiana State Department of Health 1) any child who does not receive UNHS, 2) any child who does not pass UNHS and 3) any child who has one of three risk factors. In addition for children who do not pass and those who have risk factors, the birthing facilities is mandated to report where referrals were made 1)to First Steps Early Intervention, 2) to the Primary Care Provider and/or 3) directly to Audiology/ENT.

Type of system program uses to track hearing screening and follow-up information	Custom-developed system The EHDI Program currently uses a custom made Access system to track and follow babies who do not receive UNHS, those that do not pass UNHS, and those with risk factors. A custom made web-based system is under development that will allow hospitals and audiologists the ability to enter screening and diagnostic information via a secured web portal.
State EHDI tracking system includes data items to identify infants and children with risk factors for hearing loss?	Yes Hospitals are requested to report 3 risk factors for follow-up through the EHDI Program. 1) Family History of permanent childhood hearing loss, 2) Congenital infection, and 3) Hyperbilirubenemia at a level requiring exchange transfusion. When submitting a Diagnostic Audiology Evaluation form, an audiologist can chose from a list of risk factors.
