LSP's Farm Beginnings® Sample Class Outline

The first two classes and the last class are all-day Saturday classes. All subsequent classes will be held from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. on Thursdays. Once the formal classes are completed, a series of on-farm education sessions will be announced, based on participants' interest.

This is a participatory class. The expectation is that you make use of the resources presented to the fullest potential. The Farm Beginnings organizers encourage input and ideas from the participants. With this input we are able to tailor the sessions to your educational needs. The sessions will have resource people sharing their expertise. This is your opportunity to **ASK QUESTIONS AND GET AS MUCH GUIDANCE AS YOU POSSIBLY CAN.**

<u>Session #1 — Building Networks, Values Clarification and Goal Setting</u> (10 a.m. - 4 p.m.)

We will introduce the framework of the Farm Beginnings course and sustainable agriculture. An important part of your planning is establishing and using a decision-making process, which will be highlighted. You will use your three-part goal that you determined in the first session to practice a decision making process that takes into account biologically sustainable agriculture principles, your values and goals, and sound economics. In this session, you will also be introduced to the concepts of Whole Farm

Planning and on-farm observation, along with the LSP monitoring toolbox. You will participate firsthand in on-farm monitoring with a visit to a local farm.

Session #3 — Creating the Plan - Nuts and Bolts (6:30 p.m. - 9:30 p.m.) Presenter:

Most people don't plan to fail, but fail to plan. In this session, you will have the opportunity to see real numbers from Chris' operation. Chris is willing to share the tips he has learned over the years. Additionally, you will experience the processes he uses to determine financial projections. Tools will be introduced to begin assessing and developing a financial plan for your enterprise.

Chris will discuss his perspectives and ideas on creating a financial plan and the foundation points he uses to make important decisions, taking into account quality of life, economic, and environmental sustainability. Time will be spent reviewing, discussing and answering questions about the financial plan you put together after the last class, and you will learn how to use that plan to create a target for profit.
