- Provide technical and/or financial assistance to private landowners interested in the conservation of migratory species and federally listed species.

- Prevent, or identify and mitigate, harm or injury to fish and wildlife resources caused by environmental contaminants.

## **Activity Highlights**

- Responds to over 2,400 requests each year for information and technical assistance involving threatened and endangered species, migratory birds and wetlands.
- Assists public school systems and non-government organizations in environmental outreach activities.
- Provides planning assistance to Federal installations throughout the State of Tennessee.

- Geographic Information Systems (GIS) - Works in concert with Federal, State, and local agencies to develop, maintain, and disseminate digital spatial data products in the State of Tennessee.
- Leads Statewide effort to protect, recover, and enhance endangered and threatened species of plants and animals in Tennessee.

### Questions and Answers

What does Ecological Services do?

The Ecological Services program encompasses four major activities:

- Habitat Conservation involves assisting various Federal agencies in analyzing impacts to fish and wildlife resources of the projects that they either perform, permit, license, or fund.
- Endangered Species involves listing species under the Endangered Species Act, encouraging the recovery of species listed, and assisting Federal agencies and others in complying with the Act.
- Environmental Contaminants involves the identification and prevention of harm to fish and wildlife resources caused by environmental contaminants, and assistance in the recovery of damaged habitats that support these species.
- Partners for Fish and Wildlife involves assisting private landowners in habitat enhancements/restoration activities that benefit fish and wildlife resources.
