

The National Shoreline

The National Shoreline provides critical baseline data to manage coastal resources and define America's territorial limits, including the Exclusive Economic Zone. The National Shoreline is fundamental to the growth of the Nation's shipping, manufacturing, export, coastal development, and insurance industries.

An accurate, consistent, and up-to-date national shoreline can provide and improve:

- Charts for navigation and harbor docking
- Storm surge, coastal flooding, and pollution trajectory modeling
- Land and marine geographic information systems
- Environmental analysis and monitoring

NGS delineates the shoreline through stereo photogrammetry, using tide-coordinated aerial photography controlled by kinematic Global Positioning System (GPS) techniques. This process produces a seamless, digital database of the national shoreline and a database of aerial photography.

NGS is exploring the use of new technologies and methodologies to map the shoreline including:

- Interferometric Synthetic Aperture Radar (IFSAR)
- Light Detection And Ranging (LIDAR)
- Imaging spectroscopy (Hyperspectral)
