NURSERY STOCK DEFINITION

All hardy deciduous and evergreen trees and shrubs, brambles, woody vines, woody florist stock and herbaceous annuals and perennials their roots, cuttings, grafts, scions, buds, fruit pits, sees and plant parts thereof including any collected plants, for and capable of propagation.

GENERAL SHIPPING REQUIREMENTS

All shipments into New Hampshire must be accompanied by a valid authorized nursery inspection certificate affirming that the nursery stock is free of injurious plant pests or diseases. Certificates must include the names and addresses of the consignor and consignee.

QUARANTINES OR ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS

HEMLOCK WOOLLY ADELGID QUARANTINE

PEST: Hemlock Woolly Adelgid (*Adelges tsugae*)

STATES REGULATED:

AK,CA,CT,DE,GA,MA,MD,ME,NC,NH,NJ,NY,OR,PA,RI,SC,TN,VA,WV,WA.

MATERIALS REGULATED: Hemlock seedlings, nursery stock, logs, lumber with bark chips, and uncomposted bark.

RESTRICTIONS: All regulated articles and commodities having originated or previously been held in a quarantined area are prohibited entry into NH. Hemlock seedlings and nursery stock from non-quarantined areas shipped into NH must be

accompanied by a state phytosanitary certificate or certificate of origin. For specific certificate requirements refer to NH HWA Exterior Quarantine, January 2005.

WHITE PINE BLISTER RUST QUARANTINE

PEST: The fungus Cronartium ribicola which causes white pine blister rust.

STATES REGULATED: All

MATERIALS REGULATED: Plants of all species and varieties of *Ribes*. Certain *Ribes spp*. can be planted with permission.

RESTRICTIONS: Issuance of state *Ribes* permit required for all applicants wishing to plant any of New Hampshire's approved list of resistant *Ribes* plants.
