Mapping Invasive Plants on Florida's Conservation Lands

The Florida Natural Areas Inventory (FNAI) is contributing to the control of invasive plants by developing The Florida Invasive Plants Geodatabase (FLInv) to map exotic plant infestations on public conservation lands in Florida. Mapping invasive infestations is important because it allows development of management strategies which make the most efficient use of control resources.

The database is populated with existing data submitted by resource managers and supplemented by additional field surveys by Florida Natural Areas Inventory (FNAI) staff.

Why should your invasive plants be in FNAI's database?

- The FLInv database will ultimately be used as a management tool to allocate invasive species control resources within the state
- FNAI will document invasive plants in a <u>standardized</u> GIS format including detailed characteristics of infestations in addition to their location
- FNAI has prepared a suite of forms, templates, and data dictionaries that can be used to quickly document infestations
- FNAI accepts data in a variety of standardized formats that can include infestations mapped using polygons and lines in addition to points
- FNAI biologists can assist with invasive plant identification, surveying, and mapping


