Dr. Goldie Byrd received her BS degrees in Professional Biology and Biology Education at North Carolina A&T State University. She received here Ph.D. at Meharry Medical College in Microbial Genetics. She recently completed a sabbatical at the Duke University Center for Human Genetics, where she initiated a collaboration to study the genetics of Alzheimer Disease in African Americans. Dr. Byrd was previously employed in the biology departments at Tennessee State University and North Carolina Central University. Over her career, Dr. Byrd has been instrumental in developing innovative curricula, conducting research, and mentoring research students on the undergraduate, graduate and postdoctoral levels. She has traveled internationally on fact finding missions to assist with global collaborations in teaching and research. Dr. Byrd's passion for teaching was recognized when she received the University of North Carolina Board of Governors award for Teaching Excellence in 2001.
