Recreation fees returned for public benefits



The fees contributed by recreation users and retained for recreation improvements, made a significant difference on the Umpqua National Forest in 2004.

In the area of campground operations, several accomplishments were made in "catching up" with needed maintenance of facilities. These campground improvements enhanced the camping experience for visitors.

The fees derived from the Northwest Forest Pass were partly used to install fee tubes at various locations and safeguard the funds that will be retained to enhance trailhead facilities. Some funds supported increased coverage for law enforcement patrols to improve safety for people recreating on the public lands. The North Umpqua River Users Guide was revised and printed for anglers, boaters and others.

Cabin rentals are a unique offering provided to those who want a "rustic" Forest experience like the "good ole days." Historic lookouts received paint, and interpretive signs were installed using fee receipts. Enjoy your outdoor recreation adventure! Thank you for your support of the Umpqua National Forest.
