My Deputy Assistant Secretary for Health Studies, Dr. Paul Seligman, is also coordinating with other Department of Energy organizations conducting related joint U.S./Russian programs. I understand the Board is aware of the Nuclear Cities Initiative, a new Office of Nonproliferation and National Security (NN) effort to provide civilian employment for displaced weapons workers in ten closed Russian nuclear cities including the site of current JCCRER studies, Mayak, and the site that Board member, Dr. John E. Mansfield, suggested may hold promise for future radiation health effects studies, Krasnoyarsk-26. We are working closely with NN to share information and explore opportunities to partner in our activities with the Russians.

Thank you again for your interest in the JCCRER studies. We will be certain to keep you apprised of their progress.
