



AN AMERICAN LANDMARK REBORN

On September 11, 1941, construction commenced on a building that was to achieve great significance in American history and architecture: the Pentagon.

On September 11, 2001, this building and the people within it were tested by a terrorist attack whose goal was the destruction of stone, spirit and life.

Out of this tragedy was born the Phoenix Project – an extraordinary effort in which the employees of the Department of Defense and hundreds of contractors and workers labored with inspiring dedication and skill to restore the Pentagon in a manner consistent with its status as a National Historic Landmark.

The reconstruction of the damaged wing, using materials, design and craftsmanship that match the original, is only one part of the ongoing Pentagon Renovation Program, an exemplary effort by the Department of Defense to honor its proud past by preserving the building that is both a busy workplace and a world-famous symbol of the nation.
