

Notification of Function Claim for Marketed Dietary Supplement

Dear Sir/Madam:

Natures Remedies Ltd, a registered UK company, will begin marketing Zolite™ in the USA on March 4, 2003 as a dietary supplement intended to promote weight loss in otherwise healthy individuals. Among the statements that appear in the "Direction Circular" enclosed in each package of Zolite™ is one that may be construed to constitute a "function claim" as defined in section 403 (r) (6) of the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act. Therefore, we respectfully submit this notification in accordance with the requirements set forth in 21 CFR 101.93, "Notification Procedures for Certain Types of Statements on Dietary Supplements."

The statement in question reads as follows:

"-A study using ultrasound showing that the Zolite™ formulation slowed the rate of stomach emptying. (The effect is thought to be that, as food stays in the stomach longer, you feel full faster. In this way, Zolite™ can help reduce overall food intake from meals and snacks.)"

The referenced study, as featured in a scientific paper published in the Journal of Human Nutrition and Dietetics, 14(3), 243-250, June 2001, addresses the herbal formulation used in Zolite™ consisting of Yerba Mate, Guarana, and Damiana.
