

Question 23. Comments. Overall, on a scale of (not enough) 1-10 (too much), how would you rate the frequency of facilitation interventions for the Online Dialogue?


There were a total of five responses in the "Comments" section of Question 10. Two of the respondents stated that they thought the frequency of faciliation interventions were "about right."




