February and March Sussex Ag Notes

Nutrient Management – <u>Congratulations</u> - Over 625 Sussex County poultry growers and farmers (800 for the state) have signed up for the Session 1 of the nutrient management workshops. We received so many requests there had to be 4 more workshops added for Session 1. The ag community can boast that they are meeting the challenge of the state nutrient management program by becoming certified nutrient generators and nutrient handlers.

February 12-9:00 to noon - still has open seats February 13-6:00 to 9:00 p.m. has open seats. Both of these sessions are being held at the Research and Education Center. You need to register with Jeanie Johnson at 856-2585, Extension 305.

We will be starting Session 2 in early March. There are three different types of the Session 2 meetings. One is for poultry operations, one is for large animal operations and the third is for farm operations, that just use commercial fertilizer. The reason for three different sessions is an animal operations need to have animal waste plan.

Nutrient handlers can signup for any one of the Session 3 workshops that fits their schedule, because all of the Session 3 workshops are the same.

There will be more Session 1 workshops. We may be offering Session 1 once a month until fall, when we will again offer all three sessions. Because of planting season, we probably will wait until harvest for Sessions 2 and 3.

The Nutrient Management Commission wants the producer to complete their certification within a year of taking the Session 1.

The pros and cons of bias-ply and radial tires will be reviewed in addition to demonstrations of proper tire inflation and its affect on traction, compaction and tire wear.
