



Harpers Ferry Park Celebrates Black History Month

In conjunction with Black History Month, Harpers Ferry National Historical Park invites the public to attend the opening of a new exhibit, Lafayette M. Hershaw: Pioneer for Freedom, featuring the life and work of Civil Rights activist Lafayette McKeene Hershaw. The opening and reception will be held on Sunday, February 3, 2008, at 2:00 p.m. on the second floor of the John Brown Museum on Shenandoah Street in Harpers Ferry, West Virginia. The program will feature a talk by Mr. George Rutherford, President of the Jefferson County Chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).

Born in Clay County, North Carolina, in 1863, Hershaw devoted his life to making a difference in the lives of fellow African Americans. He received a Bachelor of Arts from Atlanta University, a law degree from Howard University and, as a founding member of the Niagara Movement, helped to shape the modern civil rights era.

The exhibit will be open daily from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. throughout the month of February. For additional information, please call the Park Information Center at 304-535-6029.

National Capital Regional Director, Joseph Lawler, recently announced the recipients of the 2006 National Capital Region Park Employee and Volunteer of the Year.

The Employee of the Year Award was presented to Todd Bolton, Chief of Visitor Services Branch at the park.

This award recognized Bolton's many contributions to the park, in particular, his preservation and promotion of the Niagara Movement Centennial Event.

Bolton organized this event in August, 2006 to honor the 100th anniversary of the 1906 gathering on the campus of Storer College. He recognized the

Niagara pioneers by rekindling their spirit and trumpeting their message so it would not be forgotten. As a result of his vision and leadership, 10,000 people attended the three-day celebration.

The Volunteer of the Year Award was presented to Jim Koenig for his outstanding contributions to Harpers Ferry Park.

Koenig's service to the park included interpretive exhibit projects, such as the fabrication of the 19th century African American residence exhibit; restoration of at 19th century farm wagon, lending his time and talent as an exhibit specialist, trail monitor, maintenance and information specialist. He gave additional support to Visitor Services, Living History, Curatorial Offices, and Maintenance.

His efforts saved the federal government thousands of dollars, made work easier for park staff, and enhanced the experiences of park visitors in untold ways.
